

"That the Right Reverend James Russell Lord Bishop of Ely having represented to us that the rectory of Fulbourn Saint Vigors and the vicarage of Fulbourn All Saints both in the county of Cambridge and diocese of Ely being in contiguous parishes and of which parishes the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Master Fellows and Scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge patrons of the said benefices of Fulbourn Saint Vigors and Fulbourn All Saints were consenting to such union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying our inquiry and consent to your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the church of such benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing to us the said Archbishop against such union.

"That on the nineteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six the several parties desiring and objecting to such union appeared before us and were respectively heard by counsel.

"That no sufficient cause has been shown against such union.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Ely our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of the circumstances in reply thereto the consent of the patrons of the said benefices and the copies of the representation and notice affixed to the principal outer door of the church of the said benefices are hereto annexed.

"And we do certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to the intent that your Majesty in Council may if your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for the uniting the rectory of Fulbourn St. Vigors and the vicarage of Fulbourn All Saints into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness our hand this third day of July one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and doth hereby order that the said rectory of Fulbourn Saint Vigors in the county of Cambridge and diocese of Ely and the vicarage of Fulbourn All Saints in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of

the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter situate at Windmill Fields, in the district parish of Tunbridge Wells in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter situate at Windmill Fields as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Archbishop of Canterbury and with the consent of the Reverend Edward Hoare the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells (in testimony whereof they the said Archibald Campbell Archbishop of Canterbury and the said Edward Hoare have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Peter situate at Windmill Fields as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Windmill Fields, Tunbridge Wells.'

"And with the like consent of the said Archibald Campbell Archbishop of Canterbury and of the said Edward Hoare (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.
