WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of a share or portion of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Paulton in the county of Somerset and in the diocese of Bath and Wells.

“Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Paulton is vested for an estate of fee simple in possession in the vicar or incumbent of the parish of Chewton Mendip in the said county of Somerset and in the said diocese of Bath and Wells for the time being and in his successors.

“And whereas the Reverend Richard Stamper Philpott, clerk in holy orders, is now the vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Chewton Mendip, and Richard Price Philpott, of Number 37, Elgin-crescent, Notting-hill, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, is now the patron of the vicarage or incumbency of the same parish, that is to say, he is the person who would be entitled to present a clerk to the said vicarage or incumbency if the same were now vacant.

“And whereas a certain benefaction, to wit the rectorial tithe or tithe rent charge of the parish (or parochial chapelry) of Paulton hath been tendered to and accepted by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in augmentation of the said benefice of Paulton, and the same benefaction hath been so tendered upon condition (amongst other things) that the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Paulton shall in the manner and

to the extent hereinafter expressed be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

“And whereas the said Richard Stamper Philpott and Richard Price Philpott are respectively willing that the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Paulton now vested in him the said Richard Stamper Philpott as vicar or incumbent of Chewton Mendip as aforesaid should be so transferred in the manner and to the extent hereinafter expressed.

“And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles now Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells is willing to accept for himself and his successors the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Arthur Charles Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas it appears to us that under the circumstances aforesaid the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Paulton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or parochial chapelry of Paulton being the parish or district in or in respect of which the said right of patronage and advowson arises and exists.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Richard Stamper Philpott and Richard Price Philpott (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Arthur Charles Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order one half part of the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Paulton that is to say every alternate turn or right of nomination and presentation to the same benefice shall be transferred from the said Richard Stamper Philpott or other the then vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Chewton Mendip and from his suc-

cessors in the same vicarage or incumbency to the said Arthur Charles or other the then Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells and his successors in the same Bishoprick and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Arthur Charles or other the then Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells and by his successors Bishops of that diocese for ever But so nevertheless as that the turn or right of presentation to the said vicarage or incumbency of the said benefice of Paulton which shall arise in respect of the vacancy in the same benefice happening first after the day of the date of such publication as aforesaid shall be exercised by the then vicar of Chewton Mendip and that the second turn or right of presentation to the same vicarage or incumbency and every alternate turn or right thereafter shall be exercised by the Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and sixty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say,

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-

four; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and sixty, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Saint Jude, Gray's Inn-road, and out of the parish of Saint Peter, Regent-square both within the original limits of the parish of Saint Pancras in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, and for effecting an apportionment of the income of the rectory of Saint Peter le Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed in the city of London and in the said diocese of London.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Jude, Gray's Inn-road, and of the said parish of Saint Peter, Regent-square which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district so to be taken out of the parishes of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road and Saint Peter, Regent-square as aforesaid any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Pancras have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts or of some of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted as soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act and to his successors, a grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum and also so soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district and shall have been approved by us and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district, and such district shall have thereupon become a new parish within the meaning of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act to make to the incumbent of the said new parish and his successors a further grant from the said fund of fifty pounds per annum.

"And whereas such grants as aforesaid will be made by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our Common Seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London are the patrons of the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed, the endowments of which said rectory and perpetual curacy are of considerable amount and comprise certain annual sums of money payable in lieu of tithes which amount together to one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five pounds per annum or thereabouts.

"And whereas under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the ninth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two and published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of the same month and ratifying a scheme prepared by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and bearing date the eleventh day of July in the

same year, the income of the said rectory and perpetual curacy was from and after the date of the avoidance of the said rectory and perpetual curacy which should happen next after the date of the said lastly mentioned scheme, charged by way of apportionment with the payment of certain annual sums in favour of the several cures in the said order mentioned.

“And whereas the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed was avoided on the seventeenth day of April now last past and the said rectory and perpetual curacy are at present vacant.

“And whereas the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul have expressed to us a desire and it appears to us to be expedient that arrangements should be made for further apportioning in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed the income of the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed between the incumbent thereof and the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted as aforesaid and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish.

“And whereas in consideration of the said further proposed apportionment of the income of the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed, it has been proposed to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the whole right of patronage of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish, as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“Now therefore with the consent of The Right Honourable and Right Reverend John Bishop of the said Diocese of London (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Saint Paul in London as such patrons of the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed, as aforesaid (in testimony of which consent the said Dean and Chapter have affixed their common or corporate seal to this scheme). We the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Jude, Gray's-Inn-road, and of the said parish of Saint Peter, Regent-square which are mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Holy Cross in Saint Pancras.’

“And we further recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published order there shall be charged upon all and singular the said sums of money payable in lieu of tithes as aforesaid and other the endowments and revenues of the said rectory of Saint Peter-le-Poer with the perpetual curacy of Saint Benet Fink annexed in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said district of Holy Cross in Saint Pancras so hereinbefore recommended to be constituted

as aforesaid and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish the annual sum of one hundred pounds and that the same annual sum shall be payable to the said incumbent by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year and that the first of such half-yearly payments or a proportionate part thereof shall become due and payable upon the first day of May or the first day of November as the case may be next following the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid and that the incumbent of the said district or new parish of Holy Cross in Saint Pancras and his successors shall have all legal remedies for enforcing payment of the said annual sum or any part thereof that may at any time be due and unpaid.

“And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish of Holy Cross in Saint Pancras and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said dean and chapter of the said cathedral church of Saint Paul in London and their successors for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Holy Cross in Saint Pancras being:—

“All that portion of the parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road within the original limits of the parish of Saint Pancras in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded on the south by the parish of Saint Peter Regent-square also within the original limits of the parish of Saint Pancras aforesaid on the south-west by the parish of Saint Pancras aforesaid on the north-west by the parish of Christ Church Somers Town also within the original limits of the said parish of Saint Pancras and on the remaining sides that is to say on the north-east and on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Christ Church Somers Town from the parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road aforesaid at the point opposite to the Midland Railway Terminus Hotel where the Euston-road is joined by Argyle-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said street to its junction with Manchester-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street thereby passing along the southern side of Argyle-square to a point opposite to the northern end of the fence or wall which divides the house called or known as No. 26 Argyle-square aforesaid and the building situate in rear thereof from the building called or known as “New Jerusalem Chapel” otherwise called or known as “The New Christian Church” and extending thence southward to and along the said fence or wall to its southern end at the northern extremity of Riley-street and continuing thence

still southward to and along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary at the junction of the same street with Cromer-street which boundary divides the said parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road from the parish of Saint Peter Regent-square aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Saint Peter Regent-square which is bounded on the south-west by the parish of Saint Pancras aforesaid on the north-west and on the greater part of the north-east by the said parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road (including the hereinbefore described portion of the last-named parish) and on the remaining part of the north-east by the parish of Saint Bartholomew Saint Pancras within the original limits of the parish of Saint Pancras aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Bartholomew Saint Pancras from the parish of Saint Peter Regent-square aforesaid at a point in the middle of Gray's Inn-road opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Black Horse-yard and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the said yard to its south-western end and continuing thence still generally south-westward along the wall or fence which divides the buildings and premises abutting on and opening to the southern side of Cromer Street aforesaid from the buildings and premises abutting on and opening to the northern side of Harrison-street to a point in the middle of the eastern end of the street or footway called or known as Greenland-grove and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-named street or footway to its junction with Cromer-street aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary at the junction of the same street with Judd-street which boundary divides the said parish of Saint Peter Regent-square from the parish of Saint Pancras aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Vicarage of the said parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road and of the Vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter Regent-square out of which Cures it is intended that the District recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and the Patrons and the Incumbent of the said Vicarage of the parish of Saint Jude Gray's Inn-road and the Patrons of the said Vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, Regent-square, have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the Incumbent of the said Vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, Regent-square, aforesaid, has offered certain objections to the same Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has notwithstanding such objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate at or in the townships of Westoe and Harton in the parish of Jarrow, in the county of Durham and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-third day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and made or expressed to be made between Frances Mary du Quaire of number 14 Wilton-street Grosvenor-place in the county of Middlesex, Widow, of the one part, and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part, certain lands and hereditaments situate at or in the townships of Westoe and Harton in the parish of Jarrow in the county of Durham, more particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, became, with their appurtenances, and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in our possession but some portions thereof, on account of their character and situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale, from to time as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or

of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a prospective transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Saint Mary at Kilburn in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Saint Mary at Kilburn is vested for an estate for life in possession in the Honourable Arthur Upton a General in your Majesty's Army and is vested in remainder expectant upon the determination of that estate in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London and his successors.

"And whereas certain persons have paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of one thousand and one hundred pounds for the benefit of the said benefice of Saint Mary at Kilburn but upon condition that the transfer of the patronage of the same benefice which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall be effected, and it has been made to appear to us that by means of the said sums so paid to us and of other monies and of certain land now being conveyed to us by way of gift, a house of residence for the incumbent of the said benefice can and will be provided to our satisfaction forthwith which house will be of the value of not less than two thousand pounds and will stand upon a site (being the land aforesaid) valued at one thousand pounds.

"And whereas under the circumstances last aforesaid the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, now Bishop of the said diocese of London is willing that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Mary at Kilburn which is hereinbefore mentioned and is hereinafter recommended shall be effected; and he the said bishop hath accordingly executed this scheme as hereinafter is mentioned in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate at Old Hill as aforesaid.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Reddal Hill which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate at Old Hill as aforesaid and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Old Hill.’

“And with the like consent of the said Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Old Hill, being:—

“All that part of the new parish of Reddal Hill in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Worcester which is bounded on the south-east by the parish of Halesowen in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid on the north-east partly by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul Blackheath situate partly in the said county of Worcester and partly in the said county of Stafford and wholly in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid and partly by the parish or chapelry of Rowley Regis in the last-named county and diocese, on the north-west by the new parish
