

Vaisseaux, having attackt a Castle beyond *Strasbourg*, they were repulst with considerable loſs, and the Marquis de *Gaudelin*, Son of the Duke de *Gefures*, and Colonel of the ſaid Regiment des *Vaisseaux*, was dangerously wounded; We do not hear any other particulars. Monsieur de *Nancie*, Governor of *Arras*, is lately dead. The Marquis de *Louvain* has had two Fits of an Ague ſince Sunday laſt.

Edinburg, March 28. On the 25th inſtant the Convention ordered a Warrant to be given for Quartering the Regiments which came from *England*, under the Command of Major-General *Mackay*, in *Leith*, and the Suburbs of this City. It was ordered likewiſe, That the Preſident give Thanks to the Officers of the *Glasgow* Men for their Service in attending the Meeting of the Eſtates.

On the 26th the Convention ordered, That the Militia of Horſe and Foot over the whole Kingdom be brought together immediately, to the moſt convenient places in the reſpective Shires, and continue together ſix days, and thereafter that they be in a readineſs, on Adverſement from the Colonel of Foot and Captain of Horſe, to march with 20 days Proviſions; and that the Herctors be all preſent at the Rendezvous with their beſt Horſes and Arms. After which the Lord Preſident moved a Committee might be named to ſettle the Government, which, after ſome reaſoning, was reſolved on; and that the ſaid Committee ſhould be compoſed of 8 Lords, 8 Knights, and 8 Burgeſſes.

The 27th the Convention Ordered, That Warrant be given to Major-General *Mackay* to beat Drums through the Kingdom, for recruiting four Regiments of Foot and one of Dragoons. That the Magiſtrates of *Edinburg*, furniſh ſuch Horſes and Carriages as ſhall be required by the ſaid Major-General for carrying his Arms, Ammunition, &c. And that the Earl of *Morre* furniſh likewiſe ſuch Artillery as he ſhall require. The Committee was named for ſetting the Government.

This day the Convention gave a Commiſſion to Major-General *Mackay* to be Commander in Chief of ſuch Militia or other Forces as ſhall be raiſed for the ſafety of the Kingdom in the preſent Juncture. A Letter directed to the Lord Preſident from the Lord *Livingſtone* was read in the Meeting, giving an account of the Cauſes of his retiring from *Edinburg* at this time. Another Letter from the Viſcount of *Dundee* to the ſame purpoſe, was likewiſe read. An Act approving the good ſervice of ſuch Men from *Argyle*, *Glasgow*, and the *Western* Shires, as were in Arms and kept Guard in *Edinburg*, under the Command of the Earl of *Levin*, ſince the meeting of the Eſtates, with an allowance to ſuch of them as have not Liſted themſelves in the Earl's Regiment, to return with their Arms to their reſpective Homes, was brought in, Conſidered, and Approven. A Letter from the Earl of *Perth* deſiring ſome Perſons and Servants might be allowed Access to him in the Caſtle of *Stirling*, was read; and his Ordinary Servants were allowed to ſtay with him. Ordered, That the Earl of *Crowford*, &c. do ſee the Magiſtrates of *Edinburg* give their Oaths of Fidelity to the Eſtates this Afternoon. The Houſe Adjourn'd till Saturday. And the Committee for ſetting the Kingdom is to ſit in the mean time.

This Afternoon a Chapter being held of the moſt Noble Order of the Garter, Duke *Frederick*, Marſchal de *Schomberg*, General of His Maſteſties Forces, and Maſter-General of the Ordnance, and the Right Honourable William Earl of *Devonſhire*, Lord Steward of His Maſteſties Houſehold, were Elected Knights Companions of that Order, and were inveſted with the Garter and *George*, having been firſt Knighted by the Sovereign, with the uſual Ceremony. And the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Biſhop of *Salisbury* was ſworn and admitted Chancellor of the ſaid Order.
