#### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will

observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

*By Her Majesty's Command,*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be

present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, on a representation of the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education in Scotland, to appoint James Blaikie, Esquire, M.A., Edinburgh University, and B.A. Fellow of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, and William Bathgate, Esquire, M.A. of the University of Glasgow, and B.A. Balliol College, Oxford, to be two of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

AT the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 7th day of *February*, 1877.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the bishop of any diocese, or by the bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value

"shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty, as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to your Majesty in Council that the Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage of Stowey in the county of Somerset and the perpetual curacy of Bishops Sutton in the same county having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop being the patron or person entitled to collate or nominate to the said benefice of Stowey and also to the said benefice of Bishops Sutton if the same respectively were now vacant has signified his consent in writing to the union of the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to your Majesty in

Council we caused copies in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union.

"That having received various representations from inhabitants and other persons interested in the welfare of the parishes to be affected by the proposed union showing cause against such union we made further enquiry into the circumstances of the case but in our opinion no sufficient cause has been shown against such proposed union.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness our hand this twenty-eighth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and doth hereby order that the said vicarage of Stowey in the county of Somerset and diocese of Bath and Wells and the perpetual curacy of Bishops Sutton in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice for the cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more

"conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme, in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent, in writing, under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid; but if such incumbent or incumbents shall not have so consented thereto, this last-mentioned provision shall not come into operation until the next avoidance of the benefice by the incumbent objecting thereto, or by the surviving incumbent objecting, if more than one shall object thereto, and in such case the last-mentioned provision shall forthwith after such avoidance come into operation, and shall be binding on all persons whatsoever."

Whereas the Lord Bishop of Worcester hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend

Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Worcester do hereby represent to your Grace that to the vicarage and parish church of Dodderhill in the county of Worcester and my diocese of Worcester belongs an ancient chapelry known by the name of Elmbridge the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the last census the population of Dodderhill exclusive of the said chapelry of Elmbridge is one thousand seven hundred and thirty-three and the population of the said chapelry of Elmbridge is three hundred and ninety-one.

"That there is in the said chapelry of Elmbridge an ancient church or chapel distant from the parish church of Dodderhill about three miles wherein Divine service is performed by the incumbent of Dodderhill or his curate and which church or chapel affords sufficient accommodation for the inhabitants of the said chapelry.

"That the said chapelry of Elmbridge is a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes and baptisms, marriages, churchings, and burials have been for a very long period and are now solemnized and performed in the said church or chapel of the said chapelry and the burial ground thereto belonging.

"That the gross annual value of the vicarage of Dodderhill with the said chapelry of Elmbridge exclusive of fees (which amount on an average to twenty-five pounds per annum) is five hundred and forty-six pounds and six shillings of which three hundred and forty-two pounds four shillings and sixpence arises from title rent-charge within the limits of the chapelry of Elmbridge.

"That the rates and taxes on the income of the said benefice are about twenty-two pounds per annum.

"That there is a good and sufficient house of residence belonging to the said vicarage of Dodderhill.

That there is no house of residence for the minister of Elmbridge but in the event of the separation hereinafter proposed being effected the patron of the said vicarage of Dodderhill has signified to me his intention of acquiring a convenient site near the church of the said chapelry and of building a fit house for the residence of the incumbent of the separate benefice of Elmbridge to be constituted as hereinafter proposed.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Dodderhill possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church or chapel of the said chapelry of Elmbridge or that any of the inhabitants or landowners of the said chapelry of Elmbridge possess any such legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the parish church of Dodderhill.

"That the patronage and right of presentation of and to the said vicarage and parish church of Dodderhill with the said chapelry is vested in John Corbett of Impney in the said parish of Dodderhill Esquire, M.P. and that the Reverend Henry Nicholson is the present incumbent of the said vicarage and parish church with the said chapelry.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and in the second and third years of the same reign chapter 49 the said chapelry of Elmbridge may be advantageously separated from the vicarage and

parish church of Dodderhill and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which with the consent thereto of the said John Corbett as patron of the said vicarage with the said chapelry I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if upon full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consent as aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"H. Worcester."

And whereas the scheme and consents are in the words and figures following:—

"The SCHEME above referred to.

That the said chapelry of Elmbridge shall be separated from the said parish and parish church of Dodderhill and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice under the style of the perpetual curacy of Elmbridge of which the church or chapel within the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That such proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Dodderhill and that the incumbent for the time being of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That two churchwardens shall be annually chosen in and for the said separate parish and benefice in the customary manner and at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed and every person so chosen shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within the said separate parish and benefice.

"That such of the tithe rent-charge belonging to the said benefice of Dodderhill and arising or accruing within the said chapelry of Elmbridge as is specified in the schedule to this scheme shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said separate parish and benefice of Elmbridge and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being for ever.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall as heretofore be performed in the church of the said separate parish and benefice of Elmbridge and the burial ground thereto belonging and that all the fees and payments for such offices and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said separate parish and benefice of Elmbridge shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said separate benefice of Elmbridge shall belong to and be vested in the said John Corbett his heirs and assigns.

"That the parishioners of the said separate parish and benefice of Elmbridge shall not be entitled henceforth to any accommodation in the parish church of Dodderhill nor shall the parishioners of Dodderhill be entitled henceforth to any accommodation in the church or chapel of Elmbridge except any person or persons who may possess a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either the said church or the said chapel and who may not be willing to relinquish the same.

"Given under my hand this twenty-eighth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered that the said scheme be carried into effect.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Peterborough hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury accompanied by a scheme and consent which representation scheme and consent are in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"We the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Leicester and my diocese of Peterborough the

rectory of Glenfield cum Braunston and Kirby Muxloe.

"That contiguous to the parish of Glenfield aforesaid are three extra-parochial places known by the names of 'Kirby Frith' 'Glenfield Frith' and 'Leicester Frith.'

"That the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial places resort to the parish church at Glenfield.

"That the population of the said parish of Glenfield (exclusive of the hamlets of Braunston and Kirby Muxloe) is five hundred and fifty-three.

"That the population of the said extra-parochial places is as follows vizt

"That it appears to me that [the said three extra-parochial places known as Kirby Frith Glenfield Frith and Leicester Frith may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her present Majesty chapter 106 with advantage be permanently annexed to the said rectory and parish of Glenfield for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration may best be effected and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consent of the patron to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to Her Majesty in Council.

That baptisms churchings marriages and burials of the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial places shall be performed in the said church of Glenfield and that the fees for all such offices and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said extra-parochial places and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice and the clerk and sexton shall belong to the incumbent clerk and sexton respectively of Glenfield and the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial places known as Kirby Frith, Glenfield Frith, and Leicester Frith shall be entitled to pews or sittings in the said church of Glenfield.

"Whereas by the authority of an instrument made under the provisions of the Acts known as the Church Building Acts or of some of them and bearing date on or about the fourteenth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight a part of the said parish of Saint George Ramsgate was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church called Christ Church situate within the limits of the said parish of Saint George Ramsgate, and the same particular district was called 'the Particular District of Christ Church, Ramsgate.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Christ Church Ramsgate has by the operation of an Order made under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, authorizing the publication of banns of matrimony and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, and bearing date on or about the ninth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, become in accordance with the provisions of the lastly-named Act a new parish of the character contemplated by the same Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the same date, that is, the date of the publication of such Order of your Majesty as aforesaid the boundaries of the same new parish shall be further altered so as to dis sever therefrom all that portion thereof which is described in the second schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the said map hereunto appended and is thereon coloured yellow, and that from and after the day of the same date, and without any other assurance in the law the said portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Ramsgate so to be dis severed therefrom as aforesaid shall be re-annexed to and shall again become and be and form part of the said parish of Saint George Ramsgate, so that from and after the day of the same date the said new parish of Christ Church Ramsgate will consist of and comprise the territory, neither more nor

less, which is described in the third schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and which is thereon coloured green as aforesaid as to the one portion described in the first schedule hereunder written, and as to the other that is the remaining portion is coloured pink.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church Ramsgate some time part of the parish of Saint George Ramsgate in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury being:—

Ch. “Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William Michael Tufnell (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Hatfield Peverel now vested in the said William Michael Tufnell and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said William Michael Tufnell and from his heirs and assigns to the said Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester as such Bishop and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester and his successors Bishop of the same diocese for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said

**SIMPSON, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church of Simpson, Buckinghamshire; and in the churchyard, except in vaults or graves, in which each coffin shall be entombed; and except in earthen graves

which can be opened to the depth of four feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of entire bones.

**BAPTIST BURIAL GROUND, LION STREET, ABERGAVENNY.**—Forthwith wholly in the Baptist Burial-ground, Lion-street, Abergavenny, unless every coffin buried therein be embedded in concrete or otherwise entombed in an air-tight manner.

Now, therefore, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after this thirteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1875.

2. This Order may be cited as The Cattle-Plague Order of 1877.

3. This Order extends to Great Britain only.

4. The provisions of this Order are supplemental to and not in substitution of those of The Animals Order of 1875, and of The Metropolitan Cattle-Plague Order of 1877.

5. A Local Authority may, from time to time, with the view of preventing the introduction or the spreading of cattle-plague within their district, make regulations for the following purposes; or any of them :

(1.) For prohibiting the holding of markets, fairs, exhibitions, or sales of cattle within their district, except as follows :

a. Cattle belonging to the owner or occupier of premises not in an infected place may be sold on those premises if the cattle are not affected with cattle-plague and have been on those premises in possession of the owner or occupier thereof not less than 28 days immediately before the sale.

b. Cattle within a defined part of a port, which have been delivered to the owner or his agent, may be sold within such defined part.

c. Markets, exhibitions, and sales of cattle may be held under licence of the Privy Council.

(2.) For prohibiting or regulating the movement into their district of cattle from the district of any other Local Authority, and for prohibiting or regulating the movement of cattle within their district : Provided that any such prohibition or regulation shall not restrict the moving of any cattle by railway through or out of their district.

If any cattle are sold, or exposed or put up for sale, or exhibited in contravention of this Article or of a regulation made by a Local Authority thereunder, the seller thereof, and the auctioneer putting the same up for sale, or the person exposing the same for sale or exhibiting the same, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order; and if any person holds a market, exhibition, or sale in contravention of this Article or of a regulation made by a Local Authority thereunder, or fails to comply with any of the conditions, provisions, or regulations of any licence for the holding of a market, exhibition, or sale, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order; and if any cattle are moved in contravention of a regulation made by a Local Authority under this Article, the owner thereof, and the person directing or permitting their removal, and the company or person removing or conveying them, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

6. Cattle exposed for sale in a market, the holding whereof for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter is licensed by the Privy Council, may be kept alive for a period of 10 days after such exposure, and no longer.

If any person keeps any cattle alive in contravention of this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

7. The owner, consignee, or other person exposing any cattle in a market, the holding whereof for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter is licensed by the Privy Council, shall, at his own expense, mark them as follows:

By clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and by clipping a broad arrow, about 5 inches long, on the left quarter.

If any person fails to comply with the provisions of this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.
