The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will

observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card

above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it

"shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid; but if such incumbent or incumbents shall not have so consented thereto, this last-mentioned provision shall not come into operation until the next avoidance of the benefice by the incumbent objecting thereto, or by the surviving incumbent objecting, if more than one shall object thereto, and in such case the last-mentioned provision shall forthwith after such avoidance come into operation, and shall be binding on all persons whatsoever."

Whereas the Lord Bishop of Lichfield hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend George Augustus, Lord Bishop of Lichfield do hereby represent to your Grace that to the rectory and parish church of Morley in the county of Derby and my diocese of Lichfield belongs an ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Smalley the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the latest returns of the population made under the authority of Parliament the population of the parish of Morley exclusive of Smalley is 226 and the population of Smalley is 693.

"That there is in Smalley a church or chapel distant from the parish church of Morley about two miles wherein divine service is performed by the rector of Morley or by his curate appointed thereto.

"That the said chapelry of Smalley appears to have been from time immemorial treated as a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes and baptisms churchings marriages and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the church or chapel of the said chapelry and in the burial ground thereto belonging.

"That the said chapelry has its own church-

wardens overseers and other parish officers and is in no way connected with the said parish of Morley in respect to rates of any kind.

"That the net annual value of the said rectory of Morley exclusive of the said chapelry of Smalley is £548 or thereabouts and the net income derived from the said chapelry of Smalley arising from glebe land and tithe rent-charge is £374 or thereabouts.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to the said rectory of Morley. There is no such house belonging to the chapelry of Smalley but I have reason to believe that in the event of Smalley being as hereinafter proposed separated from Morley and constituted a separate benefice means will be provided for the erection of a suitable house of residence for such separate benefice.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of the parish of Morley possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the said church or chapel of Smalley or that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Smalley possess any such legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church of Morley.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry of Smalley have always been exclusively liable to rates for the repair of the said chapel of Smalley.

"That the rector or incumbent of the said rectory and parish church of Morley with the said chapelry of Smalley is the Reverend Henry Holden Bradshaw, Clerk, and the patronage thereof belongs to John Gilbert Crompton and Meynell Horton Mundy, Esquires, as Trustees under the will of the late Edward Degge Sitwell of Stainsby House in the county of Derby, Robert Sacheverell Sitwell of Morley in the county of Derby Esquire, being equitable tenant for life under the said will.

"And I, the said George Augustus, Lord Bishop of Lichfield, do hereby further represent to your Grace that to the vicarage and parish church of Horsley in the county of Derby and my diocese of Lichfield belongs an ancient township known by the name of Woodhouse within which there is no church or chapel and the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That a part of the said township of Woodhouse hereinafter described, that is to say that part of the said township commencing at the junction of a certain foot road leading from the village of Smalley to Wood-lane (and which foot road commences in Smalley near the east lodge of Stainsby House) and terminates in Wood-lane near the west lodge of Stainsby House with the boundary of the township of Smalley and bounded towards the north by the said foot way to Wood-lane and bounded thence to the west by the said road called Wood-lane to other parts of the boundary of Smalley and bounded thence by the boundary of Smalley to the starting point, is contiguous to the said chapelry of Smalley and the inhabitants residing within the limits of such part of the said township have for many years been in the habit of resorting to the chapel of Smalley for the purposes of public worship by reason of their distance from the mother church of Horsley.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage and parish church of Horsley belongs to the said John Gilbert Crompton and Meynell Horton Mundy, Esquires, as Trustees under the will of the late Edward Degge Sitwell of Stainsby House in the county of Derby and the said Robert Sacheverell Sitwell being the first tenant for life under the said will, and the Reverend Grammer Thompson, Clerk, is the incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and in the second and third years of the same reign chapter 49 the said chapelry of Smalley may be advantageously separated from the said rectory and parish church of Morley and a certain part of the said township of Woodhouse may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Horsley and united to the said chapelry of Smalley and that the said chapelry and such part of the said township may be together constituted a separate parish or benefice.

"That pursuant to the directions contained on the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of the patrons and incumbent of the said vicarage of Horsley and of the patrons and incumbent of the said rectory of Morley with the said chapelry of Smalley I do submit to your Grace, to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme, certify the same and such consent by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the scheme and consents are in the words and figures following:—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

"The said chapelry of Smalley shall be separated from the said rectory and parish church of Morley and a part as above described of the said township of Woodhouse shall be separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Horsley and united to the said chapelry of Smalley and the said chapelry and such part of the said township shall together be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of 'the Perpetual Curacy of Smalley' of which the said church or chapel in the said chapelry of Smalley shall be the parish church.

"The said proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory of Morley and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"Two churchwardens shall be annually chosen in the customary manner and at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed in and for such separate parish and benefice and every person so chosen shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within the said separate parish and benefice.

"All glebe lands and glebe houses of and belonging to the said rectory of Morley situate within the limits of the said chapelry of Smalley and all tithe rent-charge and payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes belonging to the said rectory and arising and accruing or payable within or in respect of the said chapelry of Smalley shall belong and be attached to the said proposed separate benefice of Smalley for the use of the incumbent thereof for the time being but no change or transfer shall be made of any of the endowments of the said vicarage of Horsley.

"All fees and payments for churchings, marriages, burials, and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Smalley and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed

separate parish or benefice save and except any such payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes belonging to the said vicarage of Horsley as arise and accrue or are payable within or in respect of the said part of the said township of Woodhouse which shall belong as heretofore to the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Horsley) shall belong to the incumbent of the said proposed separate parish or benefice.

"The first fruits and yearly tenths which are chargeable upon the said rectory of Morley with the said chapelry annexed shall henceforth be paid in equal moieties by the rector of the rectory of Morley aforesaid and by the incumbent of the said proposed separate benefice of Smalley.

"The patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of Smalley shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Her Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, be absolutely vested in the persons who under the will of the said Edward Degge Sitwell would be entitled to the patronage of the rectory of Morley.

"The parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not hereafter be entitled to accommodation in the church of Morley or in the church of the said parish of Horsley nor shall the parishioners of Morley or of Horsley be entitled to any accommodation in the church or chapel of Smalley.

"Given under my hand this first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

"In witness whereof we have hereunto respectively set our hands this twenty-third day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of the said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered that the said scheme be carried into effect.

**B**YE-LAWS and REGULATIONS made by the Hull Street Tramways Company, under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870:—

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company, and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make bye-laws or regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do, to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the



Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein, otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage, when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

17. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter, or mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive, or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage, in breach of this regulation, shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded firearms.

21. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connexion with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

22. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

23. Any person offending against, or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

24. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company, and having charge of a carriage.

25. There shall be placed and kept placed in conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 19th day of April, 1877.
