said church of Saint Jude situate within the limits of the parish of Charles Plymouth as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Jude Plymouth.'

"And with the like consent of the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of Excter (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Jude situate within the limits of the parish of Charles Plymouth as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of the said banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being : Provided always that so long as the Reverend Henry Addington Greaves, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Charles Plymouth, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of the same publication of banns and solemnization or performance of Church offices, for or on behalf of the inhabitants of that portion of the said district chapelry of Saint Jude, Plymouth, which shall have been taken out of the said parish of Charles Plymouth shall be paid by the minister of the said district chapelry to the said Henry Addington Greaves; and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect there:o as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Jude, Plymonth, being as follows :---

"All that portion of the parish of Charles Plymouth in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls and also all those two contiguous portions of extra-parochial territory in the said county and diocese which said portions of such parish and of such extra-parochial territory respectively are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Sutton-on-Plym in the said county and diocese from the parish of Charles Plymouth aforesaid at the point where the street called or known as Briton Side is joined by Moon-street and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Moon-lune and extending thence westward along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Hill-street and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Ham-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with North-street and extending thence northward for a distance of two chains and a quarter or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with the street or road called or known as Gascoyneplace and extending thence first castward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-

road and extending thence for a distance of sixtynine chains or thereabouts first north-eastward then north-westward and then again north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road to a point on the southern side of the line of the South Devon Railway upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Charles Plymouth from the district chapelry of Emmanuel Compton Gifford in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence southward for a distance of half a chain or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary to the point where the roadway leading from Lipsonroad aforesaid to the house called or known ss Lipson Marsh Cottage bends sharply to the south and where the same last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said district chapelry of Emmanuel Compton Gifford from the extra-parochial territory wherein thesaid house called or known as Lipson Marsh Cottage is situate and extending thence for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts first north-eastward then southward and then eastward along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the parish of Egg Buckland in the said county and diocese from the last described extraparochial territory and extending thence for a distance of fifty-five chains or thereabouts first eastward and then northward and then again eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby passing along the backs of the houses situate on the northern side of the road at Laira Green called or known as the Avenue to the point on the western lank of that part of the River Plym which is called or known as the Laira a little to the o the of the house called or known as the Laira Inn where the said boundary strikes the high water mark of ordinary spring tides as laid down on the map of the ordnance survey and extending thence south-westward for a distance of about one mile along the said high water mark (thereby passing under the line of the South Devon Railway and following the south-eastern side of Exeter-road) to the point opposite to the Embankment Tollgate where the said high water mark bends towards the south-east and continuing thence that is from the said high water mark still south-westward but in a more westerly direction for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts to and along the middle of the said Exeter-road to a point a little to the cast of Lockyer's-cottages where the boundary which divides the said extra-parochial territory wherein the said Embankment Toll-gate is situate from the new parish of Sutton-on-Plym aforesaid joins, the boundary dividing the lastnamed new parish from the parish of Charles Plymouth aforesaid and extending thence generally westward for a distance of seventy-six chains or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following the course of Exeter-road aforesaid of Jubilee-street of Exeter-street, and of the street called or known as Briton-side aforesaid to the first described point at the junction of the last-named street with Moon-street as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."
