

should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

WESTBURY-SUB-MENDIP.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Westbury-sub-Mendip, Somerset; and in that part of the churchyard directly south of the church,—except in now existing vaults and walled graves,—each coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except also in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of the widows or widowers of those previously buried therein.

OLD SWINFORD.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Old Swinford, in Amblecote Church, and also in the Independent, Presbyterian, and Roman Catholic Chapels, and in the Friends' Meeting House, in the same parish.

WIMBLEDON.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Wimbledon; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except also in family earthen graves, each coffin buried in which shall be covered with at least four feet of soil.

THURSFORD.—In the church and churchyard of Thursford, Norfolk, on and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

CLIFTON-UPON-DUNSMORE.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Clifton-upon-Dunsmore; and in the churchyard, except in now existing family vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stone or brick work properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the eighteenth day of June next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be

affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said eighteenth day of June.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

2. The Animals Order of 1875 shall be read and have effect as if Barrow-in-Furness, Bristol, Cardiff, Dartmouth, Grangemouth, Littlehampton, Penzance, North Shields, and Shoreham were not named in Article 63, and Glasgow, Littlehampton, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and North Shields were not named in Article 71, of that Order.

3. The Orders described in the Schedule to this Order are hereby revoked.

4. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Orders, or any of them, before the date when this Order takes effect, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Orders, or any of them.
