

of Colombia, dated the 23rd March last, increasing the duties on merchandize imported into that Republic.

The following is a translation of the Articles of the Decree:—

ARTICLE 1. The import duties for each kilogram of foreign merchandize introduced into the country shall be:—

2½ cents for the 1st Class.	
3½	2nd "
15	3rd "
40	4th "
60	5th "
6 cents for salt.	

NOTE.—The following articles are excepted from the dispositions of the above article, and will remain free of duty:—

- Articles belonging to the National Government.
- The effects of Public Ministers and Diplomatic Agents, treated of in the 9th section of 1st paragraph of the 359th Article of the Fiscal Code.
- Machines and implements for constructing and repairing roads.
- Iron bridges.
- Rough stones, bricks, and clay tiles for roofing and flooring, and
- The natural productions of other countries, which enjoy freedom of entry in conformity with public treaties.

ARTICLE 2. The duties on salt forwarded into the interior for consumption will be 4 cents the kilogram.

ARTICLE 3. The provisions of this Decree will be applied to merchandize arriving at the ports of the Union after its receipt in the respective custom-houses.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 48.)—IRELAND—WEST COAST.

(1.) *Revolving Light, Aran Island.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 91, of 12th July, 1876, on the exhibition of a temporary light, during alteration of the permanent light, on Aran Island:—

The Commissioners of Irish Lights have given further notice, that the new light was exhibited on 1st April, 1877, on Rinrawros Point, Aran Island (Aranmore).

The light is a *revolving* light, showing alternately *red* and *white* flashes of equal intensity, the interval between each flash being *twenty seconds*, elevated 233 feet above the level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 25 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

Also, that from the same tower, 32½ feet below the principal light, a fixed *red* light is shown as heretofore in the direction of Stag Rocks, visible between the bearings of S.W. by W. ¼ W. and W. by S.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

EAST COAST.

(2.) *Light-vessel near South Rock, and Discontinuance of South Rock Light.*

Also, that with reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 8, of 10th January, 1877 (2) and (3), on the intended establishment of a light-vessel near South Rock, and discontinuance of South Rock Light:—

Further notice has been given, that on 1st April, 1877, a light was exhibited from a light-vessel moored about 2 miles E. ¾ S. from South Rock Lighthouse, and one mile eastward of the outer edge of Ridge Shoal. Also, that South Rock Light was then discontinued.

The light is a *revolving* white light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every *minute and a half*, elevated 58 feet above the level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 10 miles.

The vessel has three masts, is painted *black* with white stripe, has the words *South Rock* on the sides in white letters, is distinguished during the day by a *black* ball at the main mast head, and is moored in 30 fathoms with:—

Burial Island, N. ¼ W., 5½ miles.

Portaferry Windmill in line with South Rock Lighthouse, W. ¾ N.

Position, lat. 54° 24' 40" N., long. 5° 22' 20" W.

NOTE.—During thick and foggy weather a gun will be fired from the light-vessel every *fifteen minutes*.

CAUTION.—Vessels should not pass between Ridge Shoal and the light-vessel; attention is also called to danger-signals used in light-vessels on the Irish Coast.
