REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE Earl of Derby, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at St. Petersburg the following Decree, which has been issued by the Russian Government for the guidance of the Russian authorities during the present war in matters relating to the Government's and subjects of Turkey and of the Neutral Powers, and defining the articles which are to be considered contraband of war:—

Saint-Petersbourg, 13 Mai.

LE Bulletin des Lois publie dans son No. 41 l'Oukase Impérial suivant au sénat dirigeant en date du 12 Mai :

En présence de l'état de guerre qui existe entre la Russie et la Turquie, S. M. l'Empereur ordonne à toutes les autorités et à tous les fonctionnaires militaires et civils que les présentes concernent de se conformer, pendant la guerre actuelle, aux dispositions ci-après, à l'égard de la puissance ennemie et de ses sujets, ainsi que des Etats neutres et de leurs sujets :

I. Les sujets de la Porte qui résident dans l'Empire sont autorisés à continuer pendant la guerre leur séjour et l'exercice de professions paisibles en Russie, sous la protection des lois Russes.

II. A l'égard des navires de commerce Turcs que la déclaration de guerre a trouvés dans des ports et havres Russes, confirmation est faite de la disposition en vertu de laquelle ils sont libres de sortir de ces ports et de prendre la mer durant le délai nécessaire pour leur permettre de charger des marchandises ne constituant pas des objets de contrebande de guerre.

III. Les sujets des Etats neutres peuvent continuer sans obstacles leurs relations commerciales avec les ports et villes Russes, en observant les lois de l'Empire et les principes du droit international.

IV. Les autorités militaires sont tenues de prendre toutes les mesures nécessaires pour assurer la liberté du commerce légitime des neutres, pour autant qu'elle est permise par les conditions des opérations de guerre.

V. Aux termes de la Déclaration de Paris du 4 (16) Avril, 1856, la course est considérée comme abolie et la délivrance de lettres de marque est interdite.

Conformément à la même déclaration, les règles suivantes doivent être observées à l'égard du commerce des neutres :

1°. Le pavillon neutre couvre la marchandise ennemie, à l'exception de la contrebande de guerre ;

2°. La marchandise neutre, à l'exception de la contrebande de guerre, n'est pas saisissable sous pavillon ennemi ;

3°. Les blocus, pour être obligatoires, doivent être effectifs, c'est-à-dire maintenus par une force suffisante pour interdire réellement l'accès du littoral de l'ennemi.

Ces dispositions de la Déclaration de Paris sont applicables à toutes les puissances, sans en excepter les Etats-Unis de l'Amérique du Nord et l'Espagne, qui jusqu'à présent n'ont pas adhéré à cette déclaration.

VI. Sont réputés contrebande de guerre les objets suivants :

Les armes portatives et d'artillerie, montées ou en pièces détachées ; les munitions d'armes à feu, telles que projectiles, fusées d'obus, balles, amorces, cartouches, tubes de cartouches, poudre, salpêtre, soufre ; le matériel et les munitions de pièces explosibles, telles que mines, torpilles, dynamite, pyroniline et autres substances fulminantes ; le matériel de l'artillerie, du génie et du train, tels que affûts, caissons, caisses de cartouches, forges de campagne, cantines, pontons, etc. ; les objets d'équipement et d'habillement militaire, tels que gibernes, cartouchières, sacs, cuirasses, outils de sape, tambours, selles et harnais, pièces d'habillement militaire, tentes, etc., et en général tous les objets destinés aux troupes de terre ou de mer.

Ces objets, lorsqu'ils sont trouvés à bord de navires neutres et destinés, à un port ennemi, peuvent être saisis et confisqués, sauf la quantité qui est nécessaire au navire sur lequel est opérée la saisie.

VII. Sont assimilés à la contrebande de guerre les actes suivants, interdits aux neutres : le transport de troupes ennemies, celui de dépêches et de la correspondance de l'ennemi, la fourniture de navires de guerre à l'ennemi.

Les navires neutres pris en flagrant délit de semblable contrebande, peuvent être, selon les circonstances, saisis et même confisqués.

VIII. Pendant la durée des opérations militaires sur le Danube et sur les rives de ce fleuve, le commandant supérieur de l'armée active Russe est tenu de prendre toutes les mesures en son pouvoir afin de laisser libres autant que possible la navigation et le commerce licite des neutres sur ce fleuve et de ne les soumettre qu'à des restrictions temporaires nécessitées par les exigences de la guerre ; ces restrictions doivent être levées aussi promptement que possible.

IX. L'autorité militaire prêtera en outre sa protection particulière aux constructions, aux travaux et au personnel de la commission Européenne du Danube, couverts par le pavillon neutre spécial de cette commission.

X. Conformément à la convention de Genève du 10 (22) Août 1864, relative aux militaires malades ou blessés, les commandants des armées belligérantes sont tenus de respecter les dispositions de cette convention qui stipulent l'inviolabilité des hôpitaux, ambulances et personnel

médical de l'ennemi, à la condition de réciprocité de la part de l'ennemi.

Remarque.—Lorsque le gouvernement Turc aura, avec consentement préalable de la Russie, adopté, au lieu du pavillon de Genève avec la croix rouge, un signe distinctif particulier pour ses hôpitaux et ambulances, les commandants des armées belligérantes prendront toutes les mesures nécessaires pour assurer l'inviolabilité des établissements et des personnes placés sous la sauvegarde de ce signe distinctif, conformément à la convention de Genève, si les stipulations de cette dernière sont observées par les autorités Ottomanes.

XI. Conformément à la déclaration de Saint-Petersbourg du 29 Novembre (11 Décembre), 1868, l'emploi de projectiles d'un poids inférieur à 400 grammes qui seraient ou explosibles ou chargés de matières fulminantes ou inflammables est absolument interdit.

XII. Afin d'atténuer les calamités de la guerre et de concilier autant qu'il est possible et sous réserve de réciprocité les exigences de la guerre avec celles de l'humanité, l'autorité militaire se conformera dans ses actes à l'esprit des principes posés par la conférence de Bruxelles en 1874, en tant qu'ils sont applicables à la Turquie et s'accordent avec le but spécial de la guerre actuelle.

St. Petersburg, May 13.

THE Bulletin des Lois publishes in its 41st No. the following Imperial Ukase to the Directing Senate, dated May 12 :—

In view of the state of war existing between Russia and Turkey, H.M. the Emperor commands all the authorities and all military and civil functionaries concerned to act during this war in accordance with the hereinafter mentioned dispositions, with regard to the hostile power and its subjects as well as neutral states and their subjects.

I. The subjects of the Porte who reside in the Empire are authorised to continue during the war their stay and the practice of peaceful professions in Russia under the protection of Russian laws.

II. With respect to Turkish merchantmen which at the time of the declaration of war happen to be in Russian ports and harbours, the regulation is confirmed in virtue of which they are free to leave these ports and to go to sea during the period necessary to enable them to load goods not comprising articles which are contraband of war.

III. The subjects of neutral states may continue uninterrupted commercial relations with Russian ports and towns, on condition that they observe the laws of the Empire and the principles of international law.

IV. The military authorities will take all the measures necessary to ensure the freedom of legitimate neutral commerce as far as is permitted by the state of the war operations.

V. In the terms of the declaration of Paris of the 4th (16th) April, 1856, privateering is considered as abolished, and the issuing of letters of marque is forbidden.

In conformity with the same declaration, the following rules should be observed with respect to neutral commerce.

1. The neutral flag covers the enemy's goods with the exception of contraband of war.

2. Neutral goods, with the exception of contraband of war, are not liable to capture under enemy's flag.

3. Blockades, in order to be binding, must be effective, that is to say, maintained by a force

sufficient really to prevent access to the coast of the enemy.

These dispositions of the Declaration of Paris are applicable to all the powers, including the United States of North America and Spain, who up to now have not adhered to this declaration.

VI. The following articles are considered as contraband of war :—

Small arms and artillery, mounted or in detached pieces ; ammunition for fire-arms, such as projectiles, fuses for shells, balls, priming, cartridges, cartridge cases, powder, saltpetre, sulphur, explosive materials and ammunition, such as mines, torpedoes, dynamite, pyroniline, and other fulminating substances ; artillery, engineering, and transport materials, such as gun-carriages, caissons, cartridge boxes, campaigning forges, canteens, pontoons, &c., articles of military equipment and attire, such as pouches, cartridge boxes, bags, cuirasses, sappers' tools, drums, saddles and harness, articles of military dress, tents, &c., and generally everything destined for military or naval forces.

These articles, when found on board neutral ships, and destined for an enemy's port, may be seized and confiscated, except the amount necessary for the use of the ship on which the seizure is made.

VII. The following actions, forbidden to neutrals, will be treated in the same way as the carriage of contraband of war, the transport of enemy's troops, of despatches and correspondence, and the furnishing of ships of war to the enemy.

Neutral ships taken while committing such contraband acts may be, according to circumstances, seized and even confiscated.

VIII. During the military operations on the Danube and on the banks of the river, the Commander-in-Chief of the active Russian army, is instructed to take all the measures he can to allow the navigation and legitimate commerce of neutrals on the river to be as far as possible free, and only to subject them to such temporary restrictions as the exigencies of war may render necessary, which restrictions are to be removed as quickly as possible.

IX. The military authorities will, moreover, specially protect the constructions, works, and staff of the European Danube Commission, covered by the special neutral flag of this Commission.

X. In accordance with the Convention of Geneva of the 10th (22nd) of August, 1864, with respect to the sick or wounded soldiers, the commanders of the belligerent armies are to respect the dispositions of this Convention, which render the enemy's hospitals, ambulances, and medical staff inviolable, on the condition of the enemy's reciprocity.

Remark.—When the Turkish Government shall have, with the previous consent of Russia, adopted in place of the Geneva red-cross flag a special distinctive badge for its hospitals and ambulances, the commanders of the belligerent armies will take all the measures necessary to ensure the inviolability of establishments and persons placed under the protection of this distinctive badge, in conformity with the Geneva Convention, if the stipulations of the latter are observed by the Ottoman authorities.

XI. In accordance with the declaration of St. Petersburg of November 29 (11 December), 1868, the use of projectiles of a less weight than 400 grammes which are either explosive or charged with fulminating or inflammable matter is absolutely forbidden.

XII. With the view of lessening the calamities

of war and of bringing as much as possible, and under the reservation of reciprocity, the demands of war into harmony with those of humanity, the military authorities will conform with the spirit of the principles laid down by the Conference of Brussels in 1874, as far as they are applicable to Turkey, and agree with the special object of the present war.

THE Earl of Derby, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Saint Petersburg, the following Decree which has been issued by the Russian Government, on the subject of certain regulations to be enforced in localities where a state of siege is proclaimed :—

UN oukase impérial adressé au sénat dirigeant en date du 12 mai porte les dispositions suivantes :

Notre oukase au sénat dirigeant en date du 28 avril a fixé a titre de mesure provisoire un mode de responsabilité particulière pour les civils qui, dans les localités soumises à l'état de siège, se rendraient coupables de crimes d'une haute gravité dirigés principalement contre la sécurité ou les intérêts de l'Etat et de l'armée. Ayant jugé opportun de porter au nombre des crimes spécifiés au § 1er de l'oukase susmentionné ceux dirigés contre la sécurité de la flotte, Nous ordonnons de livrer à la justice militaire, pour être jugés selon les lois militaires en temps de guerre, les civils qui auraient commis les méfaits suivants dans les localités déclarées en état de siège: la destruction intentionnelle par le feu ou par tout autre moyen, de navires, docks, entrepôts, ou autres constructions navales, ainsi que la destruction intentionnelle ou l'altération des phares ou signaux de reconnaissance.

AN Imperial Ukase addressed to the Directing Senate, dated the 12th of May, adds the following regulations :—

Our Ukase to the Directing Senate, dated the 28th of April, has settled, under the head of a provisional measure, a method of imposing special responsibility on civilians who, in places in a state of siege, might be guilty of crimes of great gravity, principally directed against the security and the interests of the state and the army. Having thought it desirable to number amongst the crimes specified in section 1 of the above-mentioned Ukase those directed against the safety of the fleet, we order that civilians who shall have committed the following crimes, in the places declared to be in a state of siege, shall be handed over to military authorities, to be judged in accordance with martial law in time of war, namely :—the intentional destruction by fire, or any other means, of ships, docks, depôts, and other naval buildings, as well as the intentional destruction or alteration of lighthouses or signals.

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland in General Assembly convened, acknowledge with profoundest respect your Majesty's most gracious letter, and the expression therein contained of your determination to uphold all the ancient rights and privileges of the Church of Scotland, of its ministers, and of the congregations committed to their charge.

Your Majesty's firm reliance on our loyalty and affectionate attachment to your Royal person and Government it shall be our earnest care to justify. The zeal and prudence which your Majesty has been graciously pleased to ascribe to the deliberations of former Assemblies, we trust, in dependence on the Great Head of the Church, will characterize the deliberations of that also which is now convened. Our prayer is that, in all our proceedings, we may be guided by the Wisdom that cometh from above, and be enabled to advance the glory of God and the sacred interests of His Church, and to promote still further the present and eternal welfare of your Majesty's subjects in our beloved land.

It affords us sincere gratification again to welcome as your Majesty's Commissioner and representative in this Assembly the distinguished Scottish nobleman, Alan Plantagenet, Earl of Galloway, whose courtesy and kindness has won our cordial regard. His presence among us, as your Majesty's representative, we hail as not only a recognition of our right of assembly, but as a becoming expression of homage to the King of Kings, and of that happy union between the Church and the State, which we hold to be in full accordance with the Word of God and eminently promotive of the best interests of the nation.

Your Majesty's most gracious recognition of the eminent success which has attended the efforts of the Church of Scotland, farther to extend the blessings of religious ordinances to destitute and remote parts of that portion of your Majesty's dominions, affords to the General Assembly the most lively and grateful satisfaction; and cannot fail to encourage the Assembly in those efforts towards Church extension which have been already successfully made; and in which they rejoice to be assured of your most gracious Majesty's interest.

Your Majesty's donation of two thousand pounds for extending the benefits of the Reformation to the Highlands and Islands we receive with great thankfulness, and we beg to assure your Majesty that it shall be our endeavour, by the faithful application of your Majesty's gift, to promote the important purpose for which it is bestowed.

That Almighty-God, the God and Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, may enrich with all spiritual and temporal blessings your Majesty, your children, and your childrens' children, and long preserve you in health and strength in this present world, and after a prosperous reign on earth, may confer on you a heavenly crown, is the earnest prayer of

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions in which School Attendance Committees may be appointed by Guardians under the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1876;—

To all School Attendance Committees so appointed;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order bearing date the 14th day of April, 1877, and addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions in which School Attendance Committees may be appointed by Guardians under the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1876, and to all School Attendance Committees so appointed, the Local Government Board made regulations with respect to such School Attendance Committees and their Officers;

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the appointment of School Attendance Officers for limited periods only :

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the several Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The School Attendance Committee may, if they think fit, with the assent of the Guardians and of the Local Government Board, direct one or more of their Officers, or appoint a person or persons, to discharge the duties of a School Attendance Officer prescribed by the said Order, for a limited period only, anything in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE II.—In this Order,—

The term "Guardians" includes any body of persons performing the functions of Guardians within the meaning of the Acts relating to the relief of the Poor.

The term "Union" means any Union or Incorporation of Parishes under any General or Local Act, and any single Parish having Guardians as above defined, under any General or Local Act.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board, Amending their Order of the 14th of April, 1877, prescribing Regulations as to proceedings of Guardians under the Elementary Education Act, 1876:—

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions named in the Schedule to this Order;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order bearing date the 22nd day of March, 1877, and addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions named in the Schedule to this Order, the Local Government Board made regulations with respect to the proceedings of the Guardians under the Elementary Education Act, 1876;

And whereas by Article IV of the said Order it is provided that every person appointed as Inquiry Officer under that Order shall hold office until he shall die, or resign, or be removed by the Local Government Board, or by the Guardians with the assent of that Board, or be proved to be insane by evidence which that Board shall deem to be sufficient;

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the appointment of Inquiry Officers for limited periods only :

Now, therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the several Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of each of the Unions named in the Schedule to the said Order may, if they think fit, with the assent of the Local Government Board, appoint a person or persons, or one or more of their Officers, to discharge the duties of an Inquiry Officer prescribed by that Order, for a limited period only, anything in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE II.—In this Order,—

The term "Guardians" includes any body of persons performing the functions of Guardians within the meaning of the Acts relating to the relief of the Poor.

The term "Union" means any Union or Incorporation of Parishes under any General or Local Act, and any single Parish having Guardians as above defined, under any General or Local Act.

5. No person in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed notice, or writing on the panels, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation, shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, be further liable to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. No person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, shall be permitted to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage; and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the same upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

11. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps or driver's platform of any carriage, or stand on the roof, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage.

12. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage.

13. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no

additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage, when warned by the conductor not to do so.

19. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.
