**T**HE Earl of Derby, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received a Telegram from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, reporting the issue of the following Notification, which has been communicated to him by the Turkish Government:—

“AVIS aux navigateurs concernant le mouillage de leurs navires dans le détroit des Dardanelles, de la Mer Noire, dans le port de Smyrne, et celui de la Sude, Isle de Crete.—Détroit des Dardanelles, Côte d'Anatolie. Les navires ne pourront mouiller que sur les points ci-dessus indiqués:—Nagara.—Hartahane Hôpital au bas de Nagara.—Kephes.—Pointe des Barbiers, et au bas de Itekirjoiz à Caravlik. Côte de Roumelie.—Kille, près Maidos, au dessous de la Batterie de Boghali, Havouzlar et Eski Hissarlek. Détroit de la Mer Noire:—Le mouillage des navires est défendu à partir de la batterie dite Madjar Tabiassi, sur la Côte d'Anatolie, et celle dite Tell i Tabia, sur la Côte de Roumelie, jusqu'à la hauteur de Roumeli et d'Anatoli Feneri. Le mouillage des navires n'est permis qu'en deça des dites batteries—Madjar Tabiassi et Tell i Tabia. Port de Smyrne.—Les navires ne pourront mouiller que dans l'intérieur du Port de Smyrne. Le mouillage sur les points compris à partir d'un mille avant d'arriver en face du fort Yenikali jusqu'à l'entrée du port même de Smyrne est défendu. Port de la Sude:—Les navires ne pourront mouiller sur aucun point à partir d'un mille de distance du port de la Sude jusqu'à l'entrée du dit port. Le mouillage n'est donc permis que dans l'intérieur du port même. Les navires qui traverseront les points interdits au mouillage des bâtiments auront le soin de ne pas laisser leurs ancres à la traine mais les avoir au haut de l'écubier et bien caponnées.”

(Translation.)

**NOTICE** to captains concerning the anchorage of their vessels in the Straits of the Dardanelles and of the Black Sea, in the Port of Smyrna, and that of Suda, in the Island of Crete:—

“Straits of the Dardanelles, Coast of Anatolia.—Vessels will only be allowed to anchor at the following points:—Nagara, Hasta Hane Hospital, below Nagara, Kephes, “Pointe des Barbiers,” and below Itekirjoiz, at Caranlik.

Coast of Roumelia.—Kille, near Maidos, below the battery of Boghali, Havowslar, and Eski Hissarlek.

Straits of the Black Sea.—Vessels are forbidden to anchor within the following limits:—From the battery called Madjar Tabiassi, on the coast of Anatolia, and that called Telli Tabia, on the coast of Roumelia, and up to Roumeli and Anatoli Feneri. Vessels are only allowed to anchor beyond the said batteries, Madjar Tabiassi and Telli Tabia.

Port of Smyrna.—Vessels will only be allowed to anchor within the port of Smyrna.

It is forbidden to anchor at all places within a distance of one mile before arriving opposite the fort of Yenikale and the entrance of the port of Smyrna itself.

Port of Suda.—Vessels will not be allowed to anchor at any place within a mile from the port of Suda up to the entrance of the said port. Anchoring is therefore only allowed within the port itself.

Vessels crossing points where it is forbidden to anchor will be careful not to let their anchors trail, but to have them hauled up above the hawser-holes and properly catted.”

INTIMATION having been received from Ontario, Canada, "that the country around that town is swarming with the Colorado Beetle," the following Memorandum of the Canadian Minister of Agriculture on the subject of this beetle, which was published in the newspapers of November last, is reprinted.

MEMORANDUM of the Canadian Minister of Agriculture, upon reference of a Despatch of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the Subject of the Colorado Beetle.

The undersigned, in accordance with a request of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, having carefully examined the Despatches of Lord Carnarvon, respectively bearing date the 3rd of March, 1875, and the 28th of August, 1876, has the honour to report as follows:

The occasion of considering measures for the prevention of the introduction of the Colorado potato beetle into other countries from Canada has not yet presented itself, and the information from the German authorities, conveyed to Her Majesty's Minister at Berlin, on the capture of the insect on board ships and at Bremen, as well as other information given by newspapers relative to its introduction into Sweden, shows that the beetles had come from the United States, having been shipped at ports, the neighbourhoods of which were invaded by them.

The document furnished to Her Majesty's Minister at Berlin, a copy of which forms part of the Despatch of the 28th August last, contains the following remark:

"It may be considered an almost insoluble problem in regard to transatlantic ships traffic to prevent by more extensive supervisory measures the introduction of these beetles into Europe."

The difficulty thus foreseen by the German authorities cannot but be but self-evident when the habits and modes of progression of the insect are examined; for not only does it move by flying, and by navigating, so to speak, smooth water, but also travels on common vehicles, railway carriages and platforms, on decks of vessels, &c., especially during the months of August and September.

In localities fully invaded, the beetles may be seen creeping on side walks, bridges, and wharves, crawling up buildings, occupying fences, lodging themselves in every crevice, penetrating houses and dwellings, ascending and occupying vehicles of all sorts, finding their way into boats and vessels, placing themselves on any and every

article, and being found alive after a long sojourn in situations where there would seem to exist no chance for them to find any subsistence.

Such a short but correct *exposé* of the habits of the beetle as connected with the possibility of its penetrating almost anywhere, and by almost any means of transport, renders indeed insoluble the problem of absolutely preventing its inroad into new fields of devastation, no matter how remote or by what obstacles they may be separated from the regions already invaded.

It may be remarked in this respect that potatoes and their covering are neither more nor less apt to harbour the insect than anything else.

But if the absolute repelling of the invader is unfortunately beyond reach, the extent of the disaster is fortunately in a very great measure under control, involving, of course, care and expense.

The remedies which necessity has taught on this side of the Atlantic are such as to require for their application the joint effort of the community at large, kept alive to its interests and duties by the authorities, and men of devotedness to the common welfare.

These remedies are,—

1st. Searching for and crushing every potato beetle wherever found.

2nd. Frequent visits to the potato fields, and searching for the eggs deposited on the under side of the leaves of the potato vine; and

3rd. Watching for the presence of the larvæ on the buds and on the leaves of the plant, in order to destroy them by means of *Paris Green*, the only substance yet discovered to be effectually operative on a large scale for the destruction of the insect in its larva state.

By these means, and by these means only, the invaded American States, and the western part of Canada, have been able to secure potato crops in a measure commensurate with the care and energy bestowed, and by similar means only can the invasion be retarded and lessened in its effects.

No measure has been taken in Canada, for reasons given, to prevent the falling or creeping of individual insects on board ships loading in Dominion seaports.

There is, however, almost a certainty that the environs of Montreal will be invaded next year, and with that prospect in view, general orders may be given to public officers and employés of the ports to look for and destroy any beetles which might be observed on the wharves, on sheds, on packages of goods to be embarked, or on board ships. A general appeal might also be made to all persons having to deal with the shipping for assistance in the execution of such preventive measures.

The undersigned respectfully recommends the adoption of such precautions, beyond which he does not see that there is anything within the power of the Canadian Government to do.

And whereas on application of the Justices of the Peace for the county of Norfolk, I, by Order dated the 13th day of February, 1877, ordered to the effect that the time during which the killing, wounding, or taking of wild fowl is prohibited by the said Act, should, so far as relates to the killing, wounding, or taking of snipe only, in the county of Norfolk, be varied, so as to be from the 15th day of March up to and inclusive of the 10th day of July in each year:

And whereas since the making of the said Order, the Justices of the said county of Norfolk in Quarter Sessions assembled, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made rescinding the said Order of the 13th day of February, 1877, as to snipe, and directing that the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl as defined by the said Act (inclusive of snipe), is prohibited shall be varied in the county of Norfolk so as to be from the 1st day of March up to and inclusive of the 10th day of July in each year.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid, hereby order as follows:—

1. The said Order of the 13th day of February, 1877, as to snipe is hereby revoked.

## SOLDIERS' BALANCES UNCLAIMED.

IN pursuance of the "Regimental Debts Act, 1863," notice is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department has available, for distribution amongst the Next of Kin or others entitled, the sum of money set opposite to the name of each of the deceased soldiers named in the list which is published with this notice in the London Gazette, and the "Army List," and is also to be seen at the Quarters of the several Staff Officers for the Pension Service throughout the United Kingdom.

Applications from persons supposing themselves entitled as Next of Kin should be addressed by letter to "The Under-Secretary of State, War Office, London, S.W.," and marked outside "Soldier's Effects."

No application can be attended to which does not state the date and place of the soldier's birth, enlistment, and death, and the name of his regiment; his regimental number should also be stated if known.

Should these particulars furnished by the applicant not agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased soldier, the applicant will be so informed; but should they agree therewith, then within three calendar months the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of the alleged relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the clergyman, or one of the churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace; the applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the notice in which the deceased soldier's name appeared.—EFFECTS, 1876-7.
