WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty, as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it

"shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And, whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to the holding of benefices in plurality" it was (amongst other things) enacted, That the provisions of the hereinbefore in part recited Act should extend and be applicable, notwithstanding the aggregate yearly value of such benefices rectories or vicarages, should exceed £500.

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the thirteenth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Coltishall and the rectory of Hautbois Magna in the county of Norfolk having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand one hundred and five persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Reverend John Colk Girling Rector of Hautbois Magna aforesaid Clerk being the patron or person entitled to present to both the said benefices if the same were now vacant has signified his consent in writing to the union of the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to your Majesty in Council we caused copies in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be

affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness our hand this thirteenth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order and doth hereby order that the rectory of Coltishall in the county of Norfolk and diocese of Norwich and the rectory of Hautbois Magna in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with the cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme

"of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Llandaff hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Alfred by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Llandaff do hereby represent to your Grace—

"1. That within the county of Monmouth and my diocese of Llandaff are the vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the ancient parochial chapelry of Bettws annexed thereto.

"2. That the limits and boundaries of the said chapelry are well known and defined and the said chapel has its own churchwardens overseers and other parish officers and is in no way connected with the said parish of Saint Woollos Newport in respect of rates of any kind.

"3. That according to the last census the population of the parish of Saint Woollos Newport is thirteen thousand five hundred and twenty-nine but since the assignment of a district chapelry to the church of Saint Mark in the said parish the population remaining under the care of the vicar of Saint Woollos Newport is computed at eight thousand and the population of Bettws is eighty-three.

"4. That the parish church of Saint Woollos Newport affords accommodation for five hundred and sixty persons or thereabouts and the church or chapel of Bettws affords accommodation for fifty persons or thereabouts.

"5. That the net annual value of the said vicarage of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws amounts to three hundred and forty-three pounds or thereabouts of which the sum of forty pounds or thereabouts is in respect of the said chapelry of Bettws and arises from vicarial tithe commutation rent-charge amounting to the annual commuted sum of forty-two pounds the rent of three pounds per annum for the feed of the churchyard there and surplice fees.

"6. That within the said county and my diocese aforesaid are the vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish church of Henllis the parish whereof lies contiguous to the said chapelry of Bettws.

"7. That the church or chapel of Bettws lies at a distance of three miles from the parish church of Saint Woollos Newport whilst it is less than two miles distant from the parish church of Henllis.

"8. That the parish of Henllis contains a population of two hundred and two persons and the church of the said parish affords accommodation for ninety persons or thereabouts.

"9. That the net annual value of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis is fifty-seven pounds or thereabouts.

"10. That there is at present no parsonage house either at Bettws or Henllis.

"11. That the patronage of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed belongs to me in right of my see of Llandaff and the patronage of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis belongs to the Reverend Hugh Williams Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar of the vicarage and parish church of Bassaleg in the said county of Monmouth and my diocese of Llandaff in right of his said vicarage.

"12. That the Reverend Edward Hawkins Clerk in Holy Orders is the vicar of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed and the Reverend David Roberts Clerk in Holy Orders is the vicar or perpetual curate of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish church of Henllis.

"13. That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty (chapter 106) entitled 'An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy,' the said chapelry of Bettws may advantageously be separated from the said vicarage and parish of Saint Woollos Newport and be united to the said vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish of Henllis for ecclesiastical purposes.

"14. That upon the proposed separation and union taking effect it is my intention with the consent of your Grace and of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to annex to the said vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish church of Henllis all the rectorial tithes or rent-charges in lieu of rectorial tithes arising within the said parish of Henllis amounting in the aggregate to the annual commuted sum of sixty pounds and belonging to me in right of my see of Llandaff and it is my further intention to consent to such arrangements as may be necessary for annexing to the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis upon the next avoidance of the said vicarage of Bassaleg all the vicarial tithes or rent-charges in lieu of vicarial tithes within the said parish of Henllis amounting in the aggregate to the annual commuted sum of fifty-eight pounds and at present belonging to the said vicarage of Bassaleg.

"15. That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of myself as the patron of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed and of the said Hugh Williams the vicar of the said vicarage of Bassaleg and as such the patron of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis and of the said Edward Hawkins

the vicar of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed and of the said David Roberts as the vicar or perpetual curate of the vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish church of Henllis to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this twenty-fifth day of May one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said representation are in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"1. That the ancient parochial chapelry of Bettws in the county of Monmouth and diocese of Llandaff at present annexed to the vicarage and parish of Saint Woollos Newport in the said county and diocese shall be separated from the said vicarage and parish and be united to and be and be deemed part and parcel of the vicarage or perpetual curacy and parish of Henllis in the said county and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes and the church or chapel at Bettws shall be a chapel of ease to the said parish church of Henllis.

"2. That the said chapelry of Bettws shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis and the vicar or perpetual curate of Henllis shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits as well of the said chapelry as of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis.

"3. That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for marriages churchings burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnised and performed within the said chapelry of Bettws shall henceforth belong to the vicar or perpetual curate of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed.

"4. That all the vicarial tithes or tithe rent-charges in lieu of vicarial tithes at present belonging to the said vicarage of Saint Woollos Newport arising or which shall from time to time arise or become payable for or in respect of the lands or hereditaments in the said chapelry of Bettws and all the glebe lands at present belonging to the said vicarage situate within the said chapelry shall henceforth respectively belong to and be attached to the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis aforesaid for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly subject nevertheless to all such rates and taxes as are or may be assessed or charged upon the same tithe rent-charges and glebe lands respectively.

"5. That the freehold of the site of the church or chapel of Bettws and the freehold of the burial ground or churchyard belonging to the said church or chapel shall vest in the incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed.

"6. That the patronage of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed shall be vested in and belong to and be exercised by the Bishop of the see of Llandaff for ever.

"CONSENTS.

"We the Right Reverend Alfred Lord Bishop of Llandaff the person entitled to collate to the vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the chapelry of Bettws annexed if the same were now vacant the Reverend Hugh

Williams Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar of the vicarage and parish church of Bassaleg and as such the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis if the same were now vacant the Reverend Edward Hawkins Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Woollos Newport with the said chapelry of Bettws annexed and the Reverend David Roberts Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar or perpetual curate of the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Henllis do hereby respectively signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained. In witness whereof we have hereunto respectively set our hands this twenty-fifth day of May one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as afore-

said to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say :—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new Parish of Saint Mary Low Harrogate (sometime part of the Parish of Pannal) in the county of York and in the Diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas the advowson of the Vicarage and Parish Church (hereinafter called the Benefice) of the said new parish of Saint Mary Low Harrogate is vested in the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Pannal.

"And whereas the advowson of the Vicarage and Parish Church (hereinafter called the Benefice) of the said parish of Pannal is vested in the Reverend Alfred Peache Clerk in Holy Orders Vicar of the Parish of Downend in the County of Gloucester and in the Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the Reverend Francis Lupton Harrison, Clerk in Holy Orders is the present Vicar or Incumbent of the said Benefice of Pannal.

"And whereas the endowments of the said Benefice of Pannal include Glebe lands to the extent of ninety-four acres or thereabouts.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us by the said Alfred Peache with the consent of the said Francis Lupton Harrison as such Vicar or Incumbent of the said Benefice of Pannal as

aforesaid that the endowments of the said Benefice of Pannal should be apportioned between the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Pannal and the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Saint Mary Low Harrogate in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed; that is to say, by the annexation of certain of the Glebe lands belonging to the said Benefice of Pannal to the said Benefice of Saint Mary Low Harrogate; the same Glebe lands being situate near to and adjoining the Church and Vicarage House of the said last-named Benefice: and it has also been proposed to us, that in order to render such apportionment legally possible, the transfer of patronage hereinafter recommended and proposed should be first effected.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that such apportionment is expedient, and under the circumstances aforesaid we are of opinion that the transfer of patronage hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage to be transferred arises or exists that is to say in the said new Parish of Saint Mary Low Harrogate.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Alfred Peache and of the said Francis Lupton Harrison and also with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said Diocese of Ripon (in testimony of which consent they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary Low Harrogate and of and to the church thereof shall be transferred from him the said Francis Lupton Harrison and from his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Pannal and shall thereupon become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Alfred Peache and his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose with the same consents testified as aforesaid that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than as aforesaid, and as from the day aforesaid all and singular the freehold lands and hereditaments being four acres three roods and six poles in extent or thereabouts which are described in the schedule to this scheme annexed and which are delineated on the map or plan also to this scheme annexed and are thereon verged round with pink all which said lands and hereditaments are (as the said Alfred Peache and Francis Lupton Harrison do hereby testify) parcel of the glebe of the said parish of Pannal shall (but subject to any existing leases duly made thereof or of any part thereof) be transferred from the said Benefice of Pannal and shall cease to be parcel of the glebe thereof and shall be annexed to the said Benefice of Saint Mary Low Harrogate as part of the endowments of the same Benefice, and shall as glebe of the same last-named Benefice be vested absolutely in the Vicar or Incumbent of Saint Mary's Low Harrogate and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or

of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE to the forgoing Scheme annexed.

"All those three several closes or parcels of land situate in the Parish of Pannal, in the West Riding of the County of York and numbered respectively 12 and 15 and 16 on the map hereunto annexed which said closes or parcels of land lie all three together, and are of the extent of four acres, three roods and six poles or thereabouts, and are bounded on the north-west by a road called the Cold Bath Road, and on the north-east by a certain foot-path dividing the said closes, numbered 15 and 16 as aforesaid, from certain land belonging to Thomas Holroyd Esquire and on the south-east by the road leading from the stray past the Church of Saint Mary Low Harrogate to the Vicarage House and grounds belonging to the Vicar of Saint Mary's Low Harrogate and on the south-west by the lastly-mentioned premises.

"All which said closes or parcels of land are verged round with pink colour on the map hereto annexed."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in Law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her Majesty (session two) chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of your Majesty (session two) chapter twenty-six have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the episcopal residence belonging to the see of Bath and Wells which is situate at Wells in the county of Somerset.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles Bishop of the diocese of Bath and Wells is desirous that certain permanent improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence at Wells and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards

the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of two hundred and fifty pounds (being a sum which with certain sums amounting together to four thousand pounds already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years income of the see) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of further mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments or endowments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the bishoprick of Bath and Wells.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme we humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts the further sum of two hundred and fifty pounds and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said see to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty-five years or until the said sum of two hundred and fifty pounds with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following that is to say during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one-thirtieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months aforesaid pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid and if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us and shall bind as well the said Arthur Charles now Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of two hundred and fifty pounds shall be paid to us and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum of two hundred and fifty pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner

as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of the diocese of Bath and Wells for the time being shall at his personal charge and expense insure and keep insured the episcopal house of residence aforesaid from loss or damage by fire in one of the public offices of assurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us in a sum of not less than eight thousand two hundred pounds and that such Bishop shall within fourteen days after any premium for such assurance shall have become due and payable deliver to us the receipt for the same and that in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house any and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us in trust to be applied and the same together with any interest and accumulations thereof shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said house or of any part thereof which may have so suffered loss or damage in such manner as shall be determined on by us with the concurrence of the Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein-named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty-three duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of

your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for dividing the Archdeaconry of Stafford within the diocese of Lichfield into two portions and for constituting each of such portions a separate archdeaconry and for assigning a district thereto.

"Whereas the area of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford is of great extent, and comprises and consists of the whole of the county of Stafford.

"And whereas within the same area twenty rural deaneries are wholly included; being the rural deaneries of Alstonfield, Brewood, Cheadle, Eccleshall, Handsworth, Himley, Leek, Lichfield, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Penkridge, Rugeley, Stafford, Stoke-upon-Trent, Tamworth, Trentham, Trysull, Tutbury, Uttoxeter, Walsall, and Wolverhampton; as appears by the statutory schedule of rural deaneries which has been prepared in pursuance of the lastly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And whereas the Right Reverend George Augustus Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has represented to us that it is in his opinion desirable that the said Archdeaconry of Stafford should be divided, and that such division should be made by creating the archdeaconry hereinafter recommended and proposed to be created, and by assigning thereto the district hereinafter recommended and proposed to be assigned thereto.

"And whereas we have considered the matter so represented to us by the said Bishop, and it appears to us to be expedient that the said Archdeaconry of Stafford should be divided, and that the division to be made thereof should be that which as aforesaid is recommended by the said Bishop and which is also hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas in representing to us and recommending as aforesaid the said Bishop has furnished to us a return whereby it appears that during the seven years ended the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six the income of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford from visitation fees and procurations (that is to say, from all sources other than the common fund created by the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act) was upon an average seventy-three pounds per annum or thereabouts.

"And whereas by the same return it also appears that of the said sum of seventy-three pounds or thereabouts the sum of thirty pounds or thereabouts was derived from the area hereinafter proposed to be assigned as a district to the new archdeaconry, the creation of which is recommended as aforesaid and is hereinafter recommended and proposed, and the remainder namely the sum of forty-three pounds or thereabouts was derived from the residue of the area of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford.

"And whereas the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford has now no endowment or income other than as aforesaid, a grant of one hundred and thirty-two pounds per annum which was made to the same archdeaconry by us out of the said common fund under the authority of a certain Order of your Majesty in Council made in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, having lapsed on the decease of the last Archdeacon of Stafford, the Venerable Henry Moore.

Now therefore, with the consent of the said George Augustus Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield in testimony of which consent he has set his hand and his episcopal seal to this scheme we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty

in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford shall by virtue of the same Order be divided and become two separate archdeaconries, and that as from the day aforesaid one of the said two separate archdeaconries shall comprise and consist of and by virtue of the same Order shall have assigned to it as a district all that part of the area of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford which contains and is co-extensive with the aggregate areas of all the rural deaneries named in the first schedule to this scheme annexed; and that as from the day aforesaid the other of the said two separate archdeaconries shall comprise and consist of and by virtue as well of the said Order as of existing law or custom shall have assigned to it as a district all the residue of the area of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford; that is to say, all that part of the same area which is not included within the rural deaneries or any of them named in the said first schedule to this scheme annexed and which contains and is co-extensive with the aggregate areas of all the rural deaneries named in the second schedule to this scheme annexed.

"And we further recommend and propose that the new archdeaconry to be created as hereinbefore recommended and proposed, and of which the district or area is set out as aforesaid in the said first schedule to this scheme annexed shall be called 'the Archdeaconry of Stoke-upon-Trent' and the Archdeacon thereof the Archdeacon of Stoke-upon-Trent, and that the other of the said two archdeaconries being in respect of area the residue and remainder of the said present Archdeaconry of Stafford as aforesaid, shall as heretofore be called 'the Archdeaconry of Stafford,' and the Archdeacon thereof the Archdeacon of Stafford.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rural deans and all other the clergy and inhabitants of either of the said two archdeaconries shall be exempted and released from the jurisdiction authority and control of the archdeacon for the time being of the other of the same two archdeaconries and shall be under and subject to the jurisdiction authority and control of the archdeacon for the time being of their own archdeaconry only.

"And we further recommend and propose that we be authorized to pay yearly and every year out of the said common fund to the Archdeacon of Stafford and to the Archdeacon of Stoke-upon-Trent respectively such a sum as will make up to two hundred pounds per annum the income which upon a calculation based on the return aforesaid he will receive from sources other than the same common fund; that is to say, that we be authorized to pay yearly and every year on the first day of January to the Archdeacon of Stafford and his successors a sum of one hundred and fifty-seven pounds in respect of the twelve calendar months ended on that day, and to the Archdeacon of Stoke-upon-Trent and his successors a sum of one hundred and seventy pounds in respect of the twelve calendar months ended on that day. Provided always that the first payment to be made by us as aforesaid to the Archdeacon of Stafford, and the first payment to be made by us as aforesaid to the Archdeacon of Stoke-upon-Trent shall be proportional in amount to the period which shall have elapsed between the date of the institution of the archdeacon receiving the same payment and the first day of January next following the date of such institution: and provided also that every such yearly payment as aforesaid shall be apportionable between an archdeacon (or as the case

may be, the representatives of an archdeacon) who has resigned or otherwise avoided his archdeaconry on any day of the year other than the first of January, and the archdeacon who shall next thereafter be instituted to the same archdeaconry; and provided further that every such yearly payment as aforesaid shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon who is (or whose representatives are) to receive it, has during the previous twelvemonth complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing hereafter to your Majesty in Council any other matter or thing relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The **FIRST SCHEDULE** in the foregoing Scheme mentioned.

"The district assigned to the Archdeaconry of Stoke-upon-Trent comprises and consists of the following rural deaneries each of which is wholly included, and no other rural deanery is at all included within the same; to wit:

1. The rural deanery of Alstonfield.
2. The rural deanery of Cheadle.
3. The rural deanery of Eccleshall.
4. The rural deanery of Leek.
5. The rural deanery of Newcastle-under-Lyme.
6. The rural deanery of Stoke-upon-Trent.
7. The rural deanery of Trentham.
8. The rural deanery of Uttoxeter.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Letcombe Regis in the county of Berks, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-ninth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and made or expressed to be made between Edwin Newman of Yeovil in the county of Somerset Esquire of the first part, John Goodden of Compton House in the parish of Over Compton in the county of Dorset Esquire of the second part, Thomas Clutterbuck of Warkworth in the county of Northumberland Esquire, of the third part, Charles Smith of No. 127 High Holborn in the county of Middlesex Esquire, of the fourth part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fifth part certain land situate in the said parish of Letcombe Regis, and particularly described in the first schedule annexed to the said indenture comprising one rood and thirty-one perches, and numbered as part 144 on the plan delineated on the said indenture became with its appurtenances, and is now, vested in us.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Stanley and of the new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield both within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date the nineteenth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty and published in the London Gazette upon the third day of September in the same year, a part of the said parish of Wakefield was assigned as a district to the church situate at Stanley within the limits of the said parish of Wakefield and the said district was named 'The Stanley District.'

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the third day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and published in the London Gazette upon the fourth day of October following a certain other part of the parish of Wakefield aforesaid was constituted a separate

district for ecclesiastical purposes and was named 'The District of Saint Andrew, Wakefield.'

"And whereas both the said Stanley District and the said District of Saint Andrew, Wakefield have under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become new parishes of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Stanley and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield shall be extended so as to include firstly all that portion of the said new parish of Stanley which is described in the first schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink, and secondly all that portion of the said parish of Wakefield which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green, and that upon and from the aforesaid day and date and without any assurance in the law other than such duly published Order of your Majesty in Council as aforesaid the said portion of the new parish of Stanley so described in the first schedule as aforesaid and the said portion of the parish of Wakefield so described in the second schedule as aforesaid shall be dis severed from the said new parish of Stanley and from the said parish of Wakefield respectively and shall be annexed to and shall together form part of and shall become and be and be deemed to be within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore first mentioned Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory proposed to be dis severed from the new parish of Stanley within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield also within the original limits of the same parish is as follows:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Stanley which is bounded on the west by the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield on the south by the new parish of Saint Mary Wakefield also within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield aforesaid on the south-east by the parish of Warmfield in the said county of York, and in the diocese of York, or in other words for the most part by the River Calder on the east and on the north,

east by the parish of Normanton in the said county of York and in the diocese of York aforesaid (or in other words by the said river) and on the remaining side that is to say on the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Normanton from the new parish of Stanley aforesaid at the centre of the Stanley Ferry Aqueduct which carries the canal called or known as the Aire and Calder Navigation (New Cut) over the River Calder aforesaid and extending thence that is from the said boundary southward for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts along the middle of the said canal to a point opposite to the eastern end of Balk-lane and extending thence westward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the eastern end of the last-named lane and extending thence for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts first westward and then north-westward along the middle of the same lane to its junction with the footpath leading across the fields called or known as 'St. Swithin's-close' to East Moor and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point of junction south-westward for a distance of fifty-eight chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said footpath to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Stanley from the new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield aforesaid.

“The SECOND SCHEDULE.

“The other territory proposed to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield is as follows:—

“All that portion of the said parish of Wakefield wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the west partly by the district chapelry of Saint John Wakefield within the original limits of the said parish of Wakefield on the north by the new parish of Stanley aforesaid on the east by the said new parish of Saint Andrew Wakefield on the south partly by the new parish of Saint Mary Wakefield within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield aforesaid and on the remaining parts of the west and of the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Wakefield from the parish of Wakefield aforesaid at the point where the street called or known as Warren Gate is joined by Vicarage-street and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Jacob's Well-lane and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named lane to the boundary at the junction of the same lane with Pinder Fields-road which boundary divides the said parish of Wakefield from the district chapelry of Saint John Wakefield aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the several cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and the said patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme or representation.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act of the thirty-second and

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words following; that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Archdeaconry of Wells, and now vested in us.

“Whereas under an Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and another Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, made under the provisions of the same Acts, bearing date the fourth day of November one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven and duly published in the London Gazette on the fifth day of the same month all lands tithes and other hereditaments whatsoever then belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Wells (excepting certain portions thereof in the said Order particularly excepted, and excepting also any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

“And whereas the greater part of the lands tithes and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid consist of reversions expectant upon beneficial leases for lives and produce during the subsistence of such leases only a small annual revenue, and on that account, and partly on account of the character or situation of the property, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

“And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four, power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions or the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

“And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, or such parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest

therein or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the holder or holders thereof (if any) to be testified by his her or their being made parties to such instruments all or any of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments heretofore belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Wells and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his her or their heirs executors administrators or assigns, or otherwise as he she or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale, from time to time as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton in the county of Northampton and in the diocese of Peterborough and out of the parish of Kingsthorpe in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton and of the said parish of Kingsthorpe which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain persons have contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England the sum of one thousand and forty-five pounds sterling in aid of the endowment of the said proposed district and of the maintenance of the incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed with the said persons and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act the sum of thirty-four pounds sixteen shillings and eight pence in each and every year during which the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas by a certain deed bearing date on or about the twenty-second day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844 and 1856,' or some or one of them and being under the hands and seals of the Reverend John Hulbert Glover the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Kingsthorpe and of the Master Brothers and Sisters of the Hospital or Free Chapel of Saint Katherine in the Regent's Park in the county of Middlesex the patrons of the same vicarage and of the Right Reverend William Connor Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners which deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty's High Court of Justice the said John Hulbert Glover did grant and confirm unto the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed thereto in accordance with the provisions of the herein-secondly mentioned Act as aforesaid and to his successors the incumbents thereof for the time being a certain piece or parcel of land containing by admeasurement eleven acres or thereabouts together with a moiety of the River Nene abutting upon the said piece or parcel of land and together also with a certain portion of a lane called Semilong-lane adjoining the said piece or parcel of land (so far as he the said John Hulbert Glover had power to grant the same portion of such lane and subject to the rights and liabilities mentioned in such deed) which said land and premises are estimated to be of the annual value of sixty-six pounds or thereabouts and are particularly described in the said deed and are delineated in the plan drawn in the margin of the same deed.

"And whereas the said sum of one thousand and forty-five pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid and the said land together with the portions of the abutting river and adjoining lane aforesaid was so granted and confirmed as aforesaid upon the understanding that we should make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district when such incumbent shall have been appointed and licensed as before mentioned a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have undertaken and agreed to make the said grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Connor Bishop of the diocese of Peterborough as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton and of the said parish of Kingsthorpe which are mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul Northampton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William Connor Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Paul Northampton being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton in the county of Northampton and in the diocese of Peterborough and also all that contiguous portion of the parish of Kingsthorpe in the same county and diocese which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point a little to the south of Saint Andrew's Mill where the River Nene divides into two parts one of which is called Back Brook and where the boundary which

divides the said parish of Kingsthorpe from the parish of Dallington in the county and diocese aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Kingsthorpe from the parish of Saint Andrew Northampton in the same county and diocese and extending thence generally north-eastward for a distance of two hundred and forty-two yards or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following in one part the course of the said river in another part the southern side of an occupation-road leading from the said Saint Andrew's Mill to Semilong-road to the point at the junction of such occupation-road with Semilong-road aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Kingsthorpe from the parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described boundary (thereby passing along the wall or fence which forms the northern boundary of the buildings and premises called or known as the Northampton Barracks to the point at the southern end of the street called or known as Semilong-place where the said last described boundary bends sharply to the north at which point a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. D. 1877 No. 1,' has been placed against the said barrack wall or fence and continuing thence still north-eastward along the same wall or fence to a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. D. 1877 No. 2,' and placed at the eastern end of the same wall or fence on the western side of the Leicester-road at its junction with a certain footway leading to Gladstone-terrace and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the said Leicester-road and extending thence northward for a distance of sixty-seven yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named-road to a point at its junction with Adelaide-street opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. D. 1877 No. 3,' and placed on the eastern side of the said road at the western end of the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the Northampton Race Course and extending thence that is from the last-described point in the middle of the Leicester-road as aforesaid eastward and in a direct line to the last-mentioned boundary stone and extending thence for a distance of four hundred yards or thereabouts first north-eastward and then south-eastward along the last-described wall or fence to a point at the southern angle of the said race course upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Sepulchre Northampton from the new parish of Saint Edmund Northampton in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby passing along the southern side of the said race course) and then north-westward along the same boundary (thereby crossing the said race course) to the point on the northern side of the same race course where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Edmund Northampton from the parish of Kingsthorpe aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby passing along the northern side of the said race course) to a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. D. 1877 No. 4' and placed at the north-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the said race course on the south-western side of Peach's-lane otherwise called or known as Gipsy-lane at which point the said last-described boundary bends sharply to the south-east and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned boundary stone first north-eastward to and then north-westward for a distance of one thousand two hundred and ten

yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named lane to the point a little beyond the house called or known as Stonepits where such lane is joined by a certain foot-path and private carriage road leading into the Leicester-road aforesaid and extending thence that is from the said point of junction south-westward for a distance of four hundred and twenty yards or thereabouts along the middle of the said foot-path and private carriage road to its junction with Leicester-road aforesaid at or near to which said point of junction a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. D. 1877 No. 5' has been placed on the western side of the last-named road and continuing thence that is from the last-described point of junction in a direction due south-west and in a straight line for a distance of six hundred and seventy-three yards or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the said River Nene which boundary divides the said parish of Kingsthorpe from the parish of Dallington aforesaid and extending thence generally southward for a distance of one thousand three hundred and sixty-six yards or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following in part the course of the said River Nene and in part the course of a branch thereof called the Back Brook as aforesaid to the first-described point a little to the south of Saint Andrew's Mill aforesaid where the said Back Brook joins the said River Nene and where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Kingsthorpe from the parish of Saint Andrew Northampton as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the said parish of Saint Sepulchre, Northampton, and of the said parish of Kingsthorpe, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas the patron of the said parish of Saint Sepulchre, Northampton, and the patrons and incumbent of the said parish of Kingsthorpe have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the incumbent of the said parish of Saint Sepulchre, Northampton has offered certain objections to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such objections been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas situate in the ancient chapelry of Crosscrake as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Harvey Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Heversham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Thomas situate in the ancient chapelry of Crosscrake as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Crosscrake.'

"And with the like consent of the said Harvey Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas Crosscrake, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Heversham in the county of Westmorland and in the diocese of Carlisle which includes the ancient chapelry of Crosscrake, and which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parochial chapelry of Preston Patrick in the said county and diocese

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said Chancellorship which occurred in or about the month of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five by the decease of the Reverend William Hewson the then Chancellor all the lands tithes and hereditaments theretofore belonging to the said Chancellorship (except rights of patronage) became, by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands tithes and hereditaments aforesaid are not subject to any outstanding lease or grant, but are now in our possession with the exception of certain tithes which have been annexed to the Vicarage of Llawhaden, but some portions of the lands tithes and hereditaments, so in our possession as aforesaid, are, on account of their character or situation unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands tithes and hereditaments so in our possession as aforesaid or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands tithes and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands tithes and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's Reign, all or any of the said lands tithes and hereditaments formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship and so in our possession as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes, rent charges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, there-

fore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the diocese of Saint David's.
