

Munster have likewise Orders to march this way. The Marquis de Sourdis, the French General, continues at Arweyer above Bonne with 3 Regiments of Horse; but 6000 Foot that were ordered to join him are countermanded, and gone back to Mont Royas; The French have pull'd down the Gates and Walls of the said Town of Arweyer, and have burnt the Castles of Godmar and Bornheim, situate about a Mile from Bonne, as likewise the Town of Ahdernach between Bonne and Gblentz, and the Castles of Smitzig and Mandersburr. They have reinforced the Garrison of Metz, and continue to work on the new Fortifications, to make room for which they have pull'd down a whole Street of above 80 Houses: The Letters from thence cannot sufficiently express the Misery of the Inhabitants. Those of Spire are in no better Condition, the French having drawn together there a Body of 8 or 10000 Men, with design to pass the Rhine, and to possess themselves of Bruchsal and Durlach; But the Imperialists and Saxons will, it's hoped, prevent them. The French Intendant at Strasbourg has again demanded 266 Thousand Crowns for Contributions of the Duchy of Wirtemberg, to be paid before the end of July, upon pain of Military Execution. The French are preparing to quit Trier, having undermined the Walls of the Town, and the Bridge, in order to blow them up.

Liege, May 6. A French Detachment of 4000 Men came yesterday to Huy; and this morning, after having plundered the Inhabitants, who were not in a Condition to make any resistance, and set the Town on Fire in 4 several places, they retired again towards Dinant.

Hague, May 10. The Heer Van Heemskerke, Envoy Extraordinary of this State, parted from hence this day for Hamburg. The Elector of Bavaria has ordered his Troops to be in a readiness to march against the 12 instant. The Imperial Forces will rendezvous the 15th at Ulm; And those of Saxony, Lunenburg, Cassel, &c. about the same time near Frankfurt. The Troops of Brandenburg and Munster march towards Cologne. And Prince Waldeck is forming a Camp of the Forces of this State towards the Country of Liege.

Edinburgh, April 27. Yesterday the Commissioners parted from hence for England; and it was ordered by the States, That all the Scots Nobility and Persons of Quality that are at present at London, or about the Court, be advertized to attend His Majesty when the Commissioners of this Kingdom do wait on Him with the offer of the Crown. The same day a Proclamation was published here for a Solemn Thanksgiving for the great Deliverance of this Nation from Poverty and Arbitrary Power, to be observed the 9th of May on this side the River Tay, and the 16th on the North-side of the same. The States being this day informed that a French Vessel with some Passengers had been seized in Kintyre, they ordered that the Prisoners be civilly used, and brought under a Guard to Glasgow, and that the Ship be brought about Kintyre into the River Clyde.

Chester, May 1. We have an Account from Ireland, that all Masters of Ships are forbid to bring off any Passengers, or Household Goods, unless they have Pails, upon pain of Death. That the late King James II. was expected at Dublin on Thursday last. That Lieutenant-General Macarty was in Disgrace, for having been too favorable to the Protestants. That nothing was done in Matters Civil or Military, without the Consent of the Count d'Armaux, or the Two French Lieutenant-Generals. And that several Bills were ready engross'd against the Sitting of their pretended Parliament, which, it's said, is put off to the 15th instant; One for imposing a new Oath; One for making void the Act of Settlement, as far as it concerns the English; One for declaring all the Protestants, that have left that Kingdom, and such as remain there, that have had any Correspondence with those that have been in Arms, or their Abettors, Rebels and Traytors, and their Estates forfeited; One for Restoring all the Popish Clergy to their Churches and Abbies, &c. as before the Time of King Henry VIII. One for raising a considerable Sum of Money; And one for Re-instating the Irish Proprietors.
