A PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to the thirtieth day of October instant: We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Wednesday, the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this twenty-third day of *October*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and in the forty-first year of Our reign.

**A**T the Court at *Balmoral*, the 23rd day of *October*, 1877.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**I**T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued, to Thursday, the twentieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

**H**ER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the provisions contained in the 4th and 8th sections of the 21st and 22nd Victoria, cap. 90, to appoint Andrew Fergus, Esquire, M.D.,

President of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, to be, for five years, a Member, for Scotland, of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom, in the place of Joseph Lister, Esquire, resigned.

**A**T the Court at *Balmoral*, the 23rd day of *October*, 1877.

PRESENT:

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the 7th year of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act for the better Government of Her Majesty's subjects resorting to China" it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order or Orders made with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to ordain, for the government of Her Majesty's subjects being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any ship or vessel at a distance of not more than 100 miles from the coast of China, any law or ordinance which to Her Majesty may seem meet, as fully and effectually as any such law or ordinance could be made by Her Majesty in Council for the government of Her Majesty's subjects being within the Island of Hong Kong.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by Order in Council of the 9th day of March, 1865, to ordain (amongst other things) that all Her Majesty's jurisdiction exercisable in China or in Japan for the judicial hearing and determination of such matters as are by the 4th section of the said Order specified should be exercised according to the provisions of the said Order and not otherwise and that save as expressly provided by the said Order, all jurisdiction, power, and authority of the Supreme Court of Hong Kong exercisable in relation to British subjects resident in or resorting to China or Japan should absolutely cease.

And whereas by the Foreign Jurisdiction Amendment Act 1866 it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty in Council by Order in Council under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts to confer upon any Court in Her Majesty's possessions out of the United Kingdom any jurisdiction which Her Majesty in Council might lawfully by any such Order confer on any Court in

any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions within which Her Majesty has power or jurisdiction.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council by another Order in Council of the 28th day of March 1868 to ordain (amongst other things) that in addition to the powers then vested in the Supreme Court of Hong Kong the said Supreme Court might have jurisdiction over and take cognizance of all crimes and offences committed by British subjects at any place on land being within six miles of any part of the Colony of Hong Kong, and not being on the mainland of China, and of and over all disputes and differences between British subjects being in any such place within such limit as aforesaid.

And whereas it has seemed to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to be expedient to revoke the said last-mentioned Order in Council and to extend the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Hong Kong in respect to matters arising in the neighbourhood of the Colony of Hong Kong.

Now therefore, Her Majesty by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said recited Act, or otherwise vested in Her, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. In addition to the powers now vested in the said Supreme Court of Hong Kong, the said Supreme Court may have jurisdiction over and take cognizance of all crimes and offences committed by British subjects at any place on land, being within ten miles of any part of the Colony of Hong Kong and of and over all disputes and differences between British subjects being in any such place within such limit as aforesaid, and the said Court shall and may deal with, try, hear, and determine all such cases as fully and effectually as if such crimes or offences had been committed or such disputes or differences had arisen by or between British subjects within the said Colony of Hong Kong.
2. The said Order in Council of the 28th day of March 1868 is hereby revoked except for the purpose of completing any proceedings criminal or civil which may have been commenced thereunder before this Order is published in the said Colony of Hong Kong and any proceedings so commenced may be completed and any sentences and judgments given therein may be executed as fully and effectually as if this Order had not been made.
3. The jurisdiction hereby conferred upon the Supreme Court of Hong Kong shall be in addition to and concurrent with any power or jurisdiction now possessed by the Supreme Court for China or Japan or any Provincial Court under the said Order in Council of the 9th of March 1865 to deal with, try, hear, and determine such cases as are herein mentioned and nothing in this Order contained shall affect the power of the said Supreme Court for China or Japan or of any Provincial Court under the said last-mentioned Order in Council to deal with, hear, try and determine the said cases.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Carnarvon, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions therein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, it is (among other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council from time to time to do all or any of the following things, namely:

- (a.) To make regulations for carrying out, enforcing, and giving effect to both the entry and registry of British sea-fishing boats, and also Articles four, five, six, seven, and eight of the Convention then recently concluded between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French concerning the Fisheries in the seas adjoining the British Islands and France, and set out in the first schedule to the Act:
- (b.) To adopt in such regulations any existing system of registry or lettering and numbering of boats, and to provide for bringing any such system into conformity with the requirements of the said Convention and the Act, and with the said regulations:
- (c.) To define the boats or classes of boats to which such regulations or any of them are to apply, and to provide for the exemption of any boats or classes of boats from such regulations or any of them, and from the provisions of Part II of the Act with respect to entry or registry and the possession of a certificate of registry and official papers:
- (d.) To apply to the entry and registry respectively of sea-fishing boats so defined, and to all matters incidental thereto, such (if any) of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships, and with such modifications and alterations as may be found desirable:
- (e.) To impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for the breach of any regulations made by any Order in Council, for the breach of which a punishment cannot be provided by the application of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships:
- (f.) To alter and revoke an Order so made;

And that every such Order shall be of the same force as if it were enacted in the said recited Act:

And whereas Her Majesty did, in pursuance of the said recited Act, on the 18th day of June, 1869, by Order in Council, make certain regulations for the lettering, numbering, and registering of British sea-fishing boats under Part II of the Act, which are now in force:

And whereas it is expedient that in addition to the classes already exempted by No. 1 of such regulations provision should be made for the exemption of the classes of boats mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it is also expedient that a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds should be imposed for the breach of No. 14 of such regulations:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty's, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to make the regulations which are set forth in the schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into force from the date of the present Order.

Additional Regulations for the lettering, numbering, and registering of British sea-fishing boats under Part II of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868 (31 and 32 Victoria, chapter 45.)

1. All open or undecked boats employed in fishing or dredging for purposes of sale on the coasts of England, Wales, Scotland, and the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, and not going outside,—

(a.) The distance of three miles from low water mark along the whole extent of the said coasts ;

(b.) In cases of bays less than 10 miles wide the line joining the headlands of such bays ; shall not be subject to the regulations for the lettering, numbering, and registering of British sea-fishing boats under Part II of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, made by Her Majesty on the 18th day of June, 1869.

2. The owner and master of any boat required to be registered, lettered, and numbered, or otherwise marked in pursuance of the said regulations, who shall, in the absence of any reasonable cause for the same (proof whereof shall lie on him), efface, cover, or conceal, or cause to be effaced, covered, or concealed in any manner whatsoever the letters, numbers, and names placed on such boats or their sails, shall each be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John situate at Waterloo, in the particular district of Christ Church Litherland within the original limits of the parish of Sefton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland

and of the said parish of Sefton which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such particular district and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland and of the said parish of Sefton should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John situate at Waterloo as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester with the consent of Mark Wilks Collet of Number 2 Sussex-square London in the county of Middlesex Merchant of Christopher Bushell of Hinderton Hall Neston in the county of Chester Esquire and of John Torr of Carlett Park Eastham in the said county of Chester Esquire a Member of the Commons House of Parliament the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland and with the consent of Richard Rainshaw Rothwell of Sharples Hall Bolton-le-Moors in the said county of Lancaster Esquire commonly called the Marquis de Rothwell the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Sefton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland and of the said parish of Sefton which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John situate at Waterloo as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John Waterloo.'

"We therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing  
Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John Waterloo; being:—

"All that portion of the particular district of Christ Church Litherland within the original limits of the parish of Sefton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester which is bounded on the south-west by the estuary of the River Mersey on the north-west by the district chapelry of Saint Nicholas Blundell Sands on the north-east by the district chapelry of Saint Luke Great Crosby both which cures are within the original limits of the said parish of Sefton on the east by the hereinafter-described portion of the same parish and on the remaining side that is to say on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said hereinafter-mentioned portion of the parish of Sefton from the particular district of Christ Church Litherland aforesaid at a point over the centre of the bridge or tunnel which carries the Liverpool-road over the line of the Liverpool Crosby and Southport Railway and extending thence north-westward for a distance of nineteen

chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said line of railway to a point in the centre of South-road and extending thence south-westward for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road to the south-western boundary of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland on the shore of the estuary of the River Mersey aforesaid.

“And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Sefton above referred to which comprises a part of the township and ancient chapelry of Great Crosby and which comprises also a part of the township of Litherland all which said portion of such parish is bounded on the east by the district chapelry of Saint Philip Litherland within the original limits of the said parish of Sefton or in other words by the Leeds and Liverpool Canal on the south-east by the new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth also within the original limits of the same parish of Sefton on the west by the particular district of Christ Church Litherland aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the north partly by the said district chapelry of Saint Luke Great Crosby and partly by the township of Orrell and Ford, in the parish of Sefton aforesaid.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Prittlewell in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Prittlewell which is hereinafter mentioned and described

should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds four pounds per centum debenture stock of the Great Western Railway Company has been transferred into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

“And whereas the said sum of debenture stock has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district so recommended to be constituted when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Prittlewell which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of All Saints Prittlewell.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised for one turn and that the first turn only jointly by the Reverend Thomas Edmund Heygate Clerk in Holy Orders now vicar of the parish of Sheen in the county of Stafford by the Reverend William Edward Heygate Clerk in Holy Orders now rector of the parish of Brighthelm otherwise Brixton in the Isle of Wight and by the Reverend Spencer Robert Wigram Clerk in Holy Orders

now vicar of the said parish of Prittlewell or by their heirs and assigns and that all the rest residue and remainder of the said right of patronage and nomination of the minister or incumbent of the same district shall in like manner be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Warden Council and Scholars of Keble College in the University of Oxford and their successors and assigns for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of All Saints Prittlewell being :—

“All that part of the parish of Prittlewell in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the east by the parish of Southchurch in the said county and diocese on the greater portion of the south partly by the last-named parish and partly by the new parish of Saint John the Baptist Southend in the same county and diocese and upon all other sides that is to say on the remaining portion of the south on the west and on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist Southend from the parish of Prittlewell aforesaid at the point where the high road leading from London through Hadleigh to Southend is joined by Mill-lane and extending thence westward for a distance of five chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said high road to its junction at Milton Hall Corner with Milton Hall-road and extending thence for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts first north-eastward then northward and finally eastward along the middle of the last-named road to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed ‘P. A. S. D., 1877 No. 1’ and placed on the eastern side of the same road at the western end of the line of fences forming the northern boundary of the closes numbered respectively 361 and 362 upon the ordnance survey map of the said parish of Prittlewell drawn to the  $\frac{1}{2500}$  scale and upon the map hereunto annexed and extending thence (that is from the last described point in the middle of Milton Hall-road as aforesaid) eastward to the said boundary stone and along the said fence for a distance of about two-thirds of a mile to a boundary stone inscribed ‘P. A. S. D. 1877 No. 2’ and placed at the eastern end of the same fence at the point on the western side of the road leading from Sutton to Southend opposite to the point where the two footpaths the one leading from Southchurch and the other from the house called or known as Hamstel join the same road and extending thence (that is from the last-mentioned boundary stone) still eastward for a further distance of about three quarters of a mile first across the last-mentioned road and then along the line of fences forming the northern boundary of the closes numbered respectively 366, 367, 219, 220, of the pond numbered 221 and of the close numbered 223 upon the said maps (thereby passing along the northern side of the house called or known as Hamstel aforesaid) to a boundary stone inscribed ‘P. A. S. D. 1877 No. 3’ and placed at the eastern end of the said line of fences on the western side of Potash-lane and continuing thence still eastward and in a direct line to the boundary in the middle of the last-

named lane which boundary divides the said parish of Prittlewell from the parish of Southchurch aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Prittlewell, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say :

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty chapter fifty and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Churchstow with Kingsbridge, situate in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter, the patronage of which benefice belongs to the Crown and is exercised on behalf of your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being in virtue of his office, for the patronage of the benefice (being a rectory) of Stockleigh Pomeroy situate in the said county of Devon and in the said diocese of Exeter the patronage of which said lastly-named benefice belongs to the Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter for the time being in right of his see.

“Whereas the Right Honourable Hugh McCalmont Baron Cairns now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain as such Lord High Chancellor, and the Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter, as such Bishop, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices of Churchstow with Kingsbridge and Stockleigh Pomeroy, and of the churches thereof respectively may be re-arranged by way of exchange in manner herein-after recommended and proposed.

“And whereas we have made due inquiry and

calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said two several benefices and of the patronage thereof respectively and we do hereby certify to your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said two benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All those portions of the parish of Michelmersh and of the parish of Romsey and also all that contiguous extra-parochial territory called or known as Dunwood, all in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the parish of East Wellow in the said county and diocese from the parish of Romsey aforesaid such point being distant about one chain to the north-east of the milestone on the side of the turnpike-road leading from Salisbury to Romsey which indicates a distance of two miles from Romsey and extending thence that is from the said parish boundary north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of ninety chains or thereabouts thereby crossing Squob Wood to the point where the Old Salisbury-lane is joined by the road leading to Roke Farm and extending thence east-

DECLARATION between Great Britain and the United States for the Protection of Trade Marks.

**T**HE Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Government of the United States of America, with a view to the reciprocal protection of the marks of manufacture and trade in the two countries, have agreed as follows:

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall have, in the dominions and possessions of the other, the same rights as belong to native subjects or citizens, or as are now granted or may hereafter be granted to the subjects and citizens of the most favoured nation, in everything relating to property in trade marks and trade labels.

It is understood that any person who desires to obtain the aforesaid protection must fulfil the

formalities required by the laws of the respective countries.
