Or direct that such Law or Ordinance or any part thereof shall have effect in such British Possession with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act.

And whereas by an Ordinance enacted by the Legislature of St. Lucia, the short title of which is, "The Extradition Ordinance (St. Lucia) 1877," it is provided that "all powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a Police Magistrate or any Justice of the Peace in relation to the Surrender of Fugitive Criminals in the United Kingdom under 'The Extradition

Acts, 1870 and 1873,' are thereby vested in and may in the Colony be exercised and done by any Stipendiary Magistrate in relation to the Surrender of Fugitive Criminals under the said Acts."

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall not come into operation until Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870," but that the said Ordinance shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been publicly made known in the Colony.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect in the Colony of St. Lucia without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Carnarvon, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that the said Act shall not come into operation until Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Act shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of the "Extradition Act, 1870," but that the said Act shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been publicly made known in the Colony.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Act shall have effect in the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council of the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order

that the said Act be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly :

And whereas by certain other Acts made and passed in the thirteenth and fourteenth, in the sixteenth, in the twentieth, in the twenty-second, in the twenty-ninth, in the thirty-first, and in the thirty-ninth years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act have been amended and extended :

Whereas it hath been represented that it would be of advantage to the public if the County Court of Yorkshire, holden at Stokesley, were ordered to be holden at Guisborough, as well as at Stokesley ; if the County Court of Essex, holden at Rochford, were ordered to be holden at Southend, as well as at Rochford ; and if the County Court of Sussex, holden at Lewes, were ordered to be holden at Eastbourne, as well as at Lewes.

Her Majesty having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight :

The County Court of Yorkshire, holden at Stokesley, shall be holden at Guisborough, as well as at Stokesley :

The County Court of Essex, holden at Rochford, shall be holden at Southend, as well as at Rochford ; and

The County Court of Sussex, holden at Lewes, shall be holden at Eastbourne, as well as at Lewes.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty intituled "An Act to abridge the holding "of benefices in plurality, and to make better "provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances, tithings, "hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts "may be separated from the parishes or mother "churches to which they belong with great "advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial "may in some instances with advantage be annexed "to parishes or districts to which they are con- "tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when, with respect to his "own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district within the diocese of such archbishop, "or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may "be, may be advantageously separated from any "parish or mother church, and either be consti- "tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more "conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, "parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a "separate parish or benefice, or that any extra- "parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical

"purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme, in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent, in writing, under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas there are situate in the county and diocese of York the parish of Skelton and the parish of Overton with Shipton. The parish of Skelton consists of isolated pieces of land situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Overton with Shipton.

And whereas it appears to the Lord Archbishop of the Province of York that certain portions of the said parish of Skelton may be separated from that parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes, to the said parish of Overton with Shipton, and that certain portions of the said parish of Overton with Shipton may, advantageously, be separated from that parish and be united, for ecclesiastical purposes, to the said parish of Skelton.

And whereas the said Lord Archbishop hath drawn up a scheme in writing as required by the said Act, and the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices have signified their consents to the same. The said scheme and consents are in the words following:

"That so much of the said parish of Overton with Shipton as is delineated on the map or plan annexed hereto and thereon included within a yellow verge line shall be severed from the said parish of Overton with Shipton and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Skelton and that the rector of the said parish of Skelton shall have exclusive cure of souls over the same.

"That those portions of the said parish of Skelton as are delineated on the said plan not included within the said yellow verge line shall be severed from the said parish of Skelton and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Overton with Shipton and that the vicar of the said parish of Overton with Shipton shall have exclusive cure of souls over the same.

"That all fees and payments arising from baptisms churchings marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of such portions of the said parish of Overton with Shipton as shall be included within the proposed new boundaries of the parish of Skelton and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings or emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice in respect of the said portions of the parish of Overton with Shipton shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent of the said rectory of Skelton.

"That all fees and payments arising from baptisms churchings marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of such portions of the said parish of Skelton as shall be included within the proposed new boundaries of the said parish of Overton with Shipton and all such other ecclesiastical due offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice in respect of the said portions of the parish of Skelton shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent of the said vicarage of Overton with Shipton.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of either of the said benefices.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of the parish of Overton with Shipton included within the proposed new boundaries of the said parish of Skelton shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Skelton aforesaid.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of the parish of Skelton included within the proposed new boundaries of the parish of Overton with Shipton shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Overton with Shipton aforesaid."

"Consents.

"We John Mason Hepworth of Ackworth House and Joshua Hepworth of Rogerhorpe Hall both in the West Riding of the said county of York Esquires the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said rectory of Skelton in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend Frederick William Hayden Incumbent of the same and we the Honourable Payan Dawnay the patron of person entitled to present to the said vicarage of Overton with Shipton in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend Gordon Salmon the incumbent of the same vicarage do hereby respectively signify our consent to the foregoing report and scheme.

"Given under our hands this tenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

And whereas the said Lord Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry, satisfied with such scheme, hath certified the same, and such consents as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council, dated the sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, which report is in the words and figures following:

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"The undersigned William Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign entitled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy doth hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That there are in the county and diocese of York the parishes of Skelton and Overton with Shipton.

"That the said parish of Skelton consists of isolated pieces of land situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Overton with Shipton.

"That the population of the said parish of Skelton according to the last census was 47 and that of the said parish of Overton with Shipton 794.

"That the said parishes of Overton with Shipton and Skelton are particularly delineated and described in the plan affixed to these presents and thereon coloured respectively pink and green.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Skelton is £80 and that of the said benefice of Overton with Shipton is £320.

"That the Reverend Frederick William Hayden is rector of the said rectory of Skelton and the Reverend Gordon Salmon is vicar of the said vicarage of Overton with Shipton.

"That John Mason Hepworth of Ackworth House and Joshua Hepworth of Rogerthorpe Hall both in the West Riding of the said county of York Esquires are the patrons of the said rectory of Skelton and the Honourable Payan Dawnay of Beningbrough Hall in the North Riding of the said county of York is the patron of the said vicarage of Overton with Shipton.

"That the said incumbents and patrons of the said benefices of Skelton and Overton with Shipton are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to us that certain portions of the said parish of Skelton more particularly described in the scheme and map hereto annexed may be separated from the said parish of Skelton and united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Overton with Shipton and that certain portions of the said parish of Overton with Shipton also more particularly delineated and described in the scheme and plan hereto annexed may advantageously be separated from that parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Skelton.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the said unions and separations may be best effected and how the alterations and changes consequent on such separation and annexation may be best effected with justice to all parties interested. And the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to your Majesty in Council certify the same to your Majesty together with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected to the intent that your Majesty in Council in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying the same into effect.

the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty chapter fifty and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to a certain benefice namely the benefice (being a rectory) of Bridport in the county of Dorset, and in the diocese of Salisbury, by way of exchange for the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to a certain other benefice, namely the benefice (being a vicarage) of Melplish, in the said county of Dorset, and in the said diocese of Salisbury.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to the said benefice of Bridport is vested for an estate of inheritance in fee simple in possession without incumbrance in Edward Bagehot, of Langport, in the county of Somerset, Esquire, and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to the said benefice of Melplish is vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury and his successors.

"And whereas the said Edward Bagehot and the Right Reverend George, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices and of the churches thereof respectively may be assigned and transferred by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Bagehot and of the said George, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to the said benefice of Bridport and the church thereof, now vested in the said Edward Bagehot and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid shall be assigned and transferred from him the said Edward Bagehot and from his heirs and assigns and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever, and that in exchange for the same the whole

advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation or nomination to the said benefice of Melplais and the church thereof, now vested as aforesaid in the said George, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, shall thereupon and thenceforth be assigned and transferred from him the said Bishop and from his successors in the same bishoprick and shall be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by

the said Edward Bagehot and his heirs and assigns for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the eleven and twelfth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, of the Act of

the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints situate in Branksome Park in the new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone in the county of Dorset and in the diocese of Salisbury.

“ Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone, and of the new parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson, in the said county of Dorset and in the said diocese of Salisbury which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective new parishes.

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Parkstone, and of said new parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints situate in Branksome Park as aforesaid.

“ Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend George Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury as such Bishop with the consent of the Reverend John Parr, Clerk in Holy Orders now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Mary Marlborough in the said diocese of Salisbury, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Parkstone and with the consent of Sir Ivor Bertie Guest of Canford Manor in the said county of Dorset, Baronet, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Kinson (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation)

we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Kinson, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints situate in Branksome Park as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints Branksome Park.'

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same cross road to a point on the western side of the Bourne Valley Pottery aforesaid opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'B. P. A. S. C. And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Abbey Dale in the parish of Dore in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Dore and of the parish of Norton, in the said county of Derby, and the said diocese of Lichfield which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Dore and of the said parish of Norton should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Abbey Dale as aforesaid.

Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Augustus Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield as such Bishop with the consent of the Right Honourable William Thomas Spencer, Earl Fitzwilliam, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, who is the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Dore, and with the consent of William Challinor, of Leek, in the county of Stafford, Esquire, of Thomas Shaw, also of Leek aforesaid, Esquire, of Henry Mortlock Fernie, of Macclesfield in the county of

Chester Esquire, and of William Edward Challinor of Pickwood near Leek aforesaid, Esquire, who are, or some of whom are, the patrons of, or the persons who are now entitled upon any vacancy to present an incumbent to, the vicarage of the said parish of Norton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Dore and of the said parish of Norton which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Abbey Dale as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John Abbey Dale.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John Abbey Dale being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Dore in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield which is bounded on the north by the county of York on the east partly by the extra-parochial territory called or known as the liberty of Beauchief and partly by the parish of Norton both in the said county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid on the south partly by the parish of Dronfield and partly by the parish of Holmesfield both in the last-mentioned county and diocese and upon the remaining side, that is to say, the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Dore aforesaid at the point in the middle of Totley Brook where it is crossed by the bridge leading from Holmesfield to Totley such point being opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'A. St. J. C. C. 1877 No. 1' and placed on the northern side of the said brook and extending thence that is from the said point northward to the said boundary-stone and continuing thence still northward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-nine and a half chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed 'A. And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the under-mentioned parish with the modifications hereinafter specified:

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 39th and 40th years of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "An Act for the preservation of Wild Fowl," it was by the 2nd section provided that any person who shall kill, wound, or take or attempt to kill, wound, or take any wild fowl as defined by the said Act, or use any boat, gun, or net, or other engine or instrument for the purposes of killing, wounding, or taking any wild fowl, or shall have in his control or possession any wild fowl recently killed, wounded, or taken, between the 15th day of February and the 10th day of July in any year, shall be liable to the penalty therein mentioned, and by the 3rd section, power was given to the Home Office as to Great Britain, upon the application of the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled of any county, to extend or vary the time during which the killing, wounding, or taking of wild fowl was prohibited by the said Act, such extension or variation to be made by Order, under the hand of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:

And whereas the Justices sitting in Quarter Sessions for the Eastern Division of the county of Suffolk, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made directing that the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited shall be varied in the Eastern Division of the county of Suffolk, so as to be from the 1st day of March to the 24th day of July, in each year.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid, hereby order as follows:—

The time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited, shall be varied in the Eastern Division of the county of Suffolk, so as to be from the 1st day of March to the 24th day of July, in each year.
