of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be severed and disannexed from such new parishes respectively and shall be set out and constituted a district for spiritual purposes for and be annexed to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Heaton Moor as aforesaid and that the same district shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul Heaton Moor.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Paul Heaton Moor being:----

"All that portion of the new parish of Heaton Norris within the original limits of the parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded on the west and on the south by the new parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey and on the east by the new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris both which last-named new parishes are also within the original limits of the parish of Manchester aforesaid and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris from the new parish of Heaton Norris aforesaid at the point at the south-western end of Parklane Bridge which carries Park-lane over the line of the Manchester Stockport and Crewe Branch of the London and North-Western Railway where the said Park-lane is joined by Tatton-road and by Park-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Derby-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Ellis - road and extending thence south - west-ward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to the proposed extension of Broomfield-road and extending thence north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts along the central course of the said proposed extension of Broomfield-road to a point at the present south-eastern end of such road and continuing thence still north-westward for a further distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same road to its junction with Heaton Moor-lane and with Peel Moat-road and continuing thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine chains to its present north-western end and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line for a further distance of six chains to a point distant exactly fifteen chains to the northwest of and measured in a direct line from the middle of Heaton Moor-lane aforesaid and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point south-westward for a distance of twenty-five and a half chains or thereabouts in a direction parallel to and distant exactly fifteen chains to the northwest of and measured in a direct line from the middle of the same lane to the boundary at or near to the point where Shaw Brook is crossed by

or known as Shaw Fold into Heaton Mersey-road which boundary divides the said new parish of Heaton Norris from the new parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey which is bounded on the north-west by the new parish of Saint Margaret Burnage within the original limits of the said parish of Manchester on the north-east and on the south-east by the new parish of Heaton Norris aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey aforesaid at the point a little to the north of the house called or known as Broomfield where Teddy Highlane is joined by Heaton Mersey-road aforesaid and extending thence for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts first north-westward then northward and then again north-westward along the middle of the last-named road to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey from the new parish of Saint Margaret Burnage aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.
