

all in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the remaining sides that is to say on the west and on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named particular district from the district parish of Saint Luke Norwood aforesaid at the point where Thurlow Park-road is intersected by Rosendale-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Myton-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Martell-road and extending thence north-westward and in a direct line diagonally across the last-named road to a point at the eastern end of the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the house and garden called or known as No. 1 Martell-road and extending thence westward along the said wall or fence for a distance of four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing in rear of the houses and gardens situate on the southern side of Park-road) to the point where the same wall or fence joins the wall forming the eastern boundary of the Norwood Cemetery and extending thence southward along the last-described wall to the south-eastern angle of the same cemetery and extending thence south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of five chains and three quarters or thereabouts across the gardens attached to the house called or known as Mount Pleasant to a point at the gate forming the southern entrance to the said house and gardens at or near to the northern end of Elder-lane and extending thence southward to and along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Gipsy-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the said last-named road with Salters Hill-road and with the road called or known as Oak Hill which boundary divides the said district parish of Saint Luke Norwood from the new parish of Christ Church Gipsy Hill aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the

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time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council has been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Order; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows, viz. :—

In the churchyard of Bassingbourn, to the thirtieth of September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.
