REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to

The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations should be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty chapter fifty; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Eglwys Rhos in the county of Carnarvon and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, for the patronage of the benefice (being a rectory) of Llanvihangel-Ystern-Llewern in the county of Monmouth and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Alfred Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff is seized in right of his See to him and his successors in fee of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Eglwys Rhos.

and the church thereof being the parish church of the parish of Eglwys Rhos aforesaid.

“And whereas the Reverend Alfred Peache of East Sheen in the county of Surrey, Clerk in Holy Orders, is seized in fee simple without incumbrances of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Llanvihangel-Ystern-Llewern and the church thereof being the parish church of the parish of Llanvihangel-Ystern-Llewern aforesaid.

“And whereas the said Alfred Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff and the said Alfred Peache have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices and of the churches thereof respectively may be re-arranged by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Alfred Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (in testimony of which consent he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this scheme) and with the consent of the said Alfred Peache (in testimony of which consent he has set his hand and affixed his seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of

the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Eglwys Rhos and the church thereof shall be assigned and transferred from the said Alfred Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (in whom as aforesaid it is now vested) and from his successors Bishops of the said diocese; and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Alfred Peache and his heirs and assigns for ever and that in exchange for the same the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Llanvihangel-Ystern-Llewern and the church thereof shall in like manner upon and from the day aforesaid be assigned and transferred from the said Alfred Peache (in whom as aforesaid it is now vested) and from his heirs and assigns; and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Alfred, Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a

representation, bearing date the eleventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight in the words following; that is to say,

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew situate in Black-lane in the parish of Radcliffe in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Radcliffe and of the district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe in the said county of Lancaster and in the said diocese of Manchester which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and district parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Radcliffe and of the said district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate in Black-lane as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and with the consent of the Right Honourable Thomas, Earl of Wilton, the patron both of the rectory of the said parish of Radcliffe and also of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Thomas, Radcliffe (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Radcliffe and of the said district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew situate in Black-lane as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Black-lane, Radcliffe.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Black-lane, Radcliffe, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Radcliffe in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the north and on the north-east by the new parish of All Saints, Elton, in the said county and diocese, on the north-west by the new parish of Christ Church, Ainsworth, in the same county and diocese on the west partly by the last-named new parish and partly by the

district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe in the county and diocese aforesaid on the south by the said district parish and upon the remaining sides that is to say on the south-east and on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe from the parish of Radcliffe aforesaid at the centre of Water-lane Canal Bridge which carries that portion of the Radcliffe highway which is called or known as Water-lane over the Manchester Bolton and Bury Canal and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of about one mile and two-thirds of a mile to the boundary a little to the south of the mill on the River Irwell known as Hinds Logwood Mill which boundary divides the said parish of Radcliffe from the new parish of All Saints Elton aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the said district parish, of Saint Thomas Radcliffe which is bounded on the east by the above described portion of the parish of Radcliffe aforesaid on the north and on the north-west by the new parish of Christ Church Ainsworth aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say on the south and on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named cure from the district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe aforesaid at a point in the middle of the said Radcliffe Highway about twelve chains to the west of the house called or known as Moor Gate and extending thence eastward for a distance of fifty-seven chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road (passing Moor Gate aforesaid) and along the middle of Old Turks-road to the point where the last-named road is crossed by the stream or watercourse called or known as Ox Hey Brook such point being about three chains to the east of the house called or known as Old Turks and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said stream or watercourse for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the centre of the culvert which carries that branch of the said Radcliffe Highway which is called or known as Black Lane-road over the same stream or watercourse which boundary divides the said district parish of Saint Thomas Radcliffe from the above described portion of the parish of Radcliffe aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty,

chapter thirty-seven ; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four ; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words following, that is to say : —

“ We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Saint Hilda South Shields in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham.

“ Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Saint Hilda South Shields which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“ And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Hilda South Shields have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts or of some of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-mentioned Act and to his successors a grant of two hundred pounds per annum and also so soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district and shall have been approved by us and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district and such district shall have thereupon become a new parish within the meaning of the secondly herein-mentioned Act to make and pay such further grant from the said fund as will suffice to raise the income from all sources of the incumbent of the said new parish to three hundred pounds per annum.

“ And whereas such grants as aforesaid will be made by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“ Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Saint Hilda South Shields which is mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London

Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of South Westoe.’

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

“ The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“ The district of South Westoe being all that part of the parish of Saint Hilda South Shields in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham which is bounded on the north-east by the north-eastern boundary of the same parish that is by the seashore on the east on the south-east and on the south-west by the parish of Harton in the said county and diocese on the west partly by the new parish of the Holy Trinity South Shields and partly by the new parish of Saint Mark South Shields, both in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the north-west by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said last-named new parish from the parish of Saint Hilda South Shields aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Pontop Branch of the North Eastern Railway over Clay Path-lane and extending thence that is from the said boundary first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Westoe-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such lane over the line of the Ballast Railway leading from Cookson's Quay on the River Tyne to the Ballast Hill on the Bents by the seashore aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the line of the said Ballast Railway for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end at the Ballast Hill aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line to the north-eastern boundary of the parish of Saint Hilda South Shields that is, to the seashore as aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-sixth day of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-

ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:-

KIRKBY FLEETHAM.—Forthwith wholly in Kirkby Fleetham Church, in the county of York; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

KNARESBOROUGH.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Knaresborough, in the county of York; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except also in earthen graves for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried therein.

BARTON-ON-HUMBER.—Forthwith in the additional burial ground attached to Saint Peter's Church, Barton-on-Humber, in the county of Lincoln, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

GOOLE.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Goole, in the county of York; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except of the members of the families already buried therein in graves which can be opened five feet deep without the exposure of coffins.

CAISTER-NEXT-THE-SEA.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Caister-next-the-Sea, in the county of Norfolk; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz.:-

WOODBOROUGH.—Wholly in the parish church of Woodborough, in the county of Nottingham; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

ORDSALL.—Forthwith wholly in Ordsall Church, in the county of Nottingham; and in the old part of the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves.

LLANRHAIADR.—Forthwith wholly in Llanrhaiadr Church, in the county of Denbigh; and in the churchyard, except in existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except also in earthen graves not less than four feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins.

PENTRICK.—Forthwith wholly in the Pentrick Church, in the county of Derby, and in the old part of the churchyard.

DAGENHAM.—Forthwith wholly in Dagenham Church, in the county of Essex; and in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except also in earthen graves, not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the disturbance of buried remains.

EDGMOND.—Forthwith wholly in Edmond Church, in the county of Salop; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except in existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed in stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except also in earthen graves for the burial of the widowers and widows of those buried therein.

RAWCLIFFE.—Wholly in Rawcliffe Churchyard, in the county of York, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves, not less than four feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins.

SKIPTON.—Forthwith wholly in Skipton Church, in the county of York; and in the church cemetery or additional churchyard of Skipton, except in family vaults or walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in family graves, not less than five feet deep, that can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

CHRISTCHURCH.—Forthwith wholly in or beneath Christ Church, Skipton, in the county of York; and in the Christchurch burial-ground, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except in family vaults or walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in family graves, not less than five feet deep, that can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

GREAT BOWDEN.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester; and in the churchyard, after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in now existing family graves to

be used for the burial of the widowers or widows of those buried therein.

WYMESWOLD.—Forthwith wholly in Wymeswold Church, in the county of Leicester; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except also in earthen graves for the burial of the widowers or widows of those buried therein.

GORLESTON.—Forthwith wholly in Gorleston Church, in the county of Suffolk; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins, to be used only for the burial of members of the families of those buried in them.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixth day of July next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said sixth day of July.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as The Schleswig-Holstein Order of 1878.

2. In this Order words have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1875.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, except as regards the recovery of any penalty incurred thereunder before that day.

4. During the continuance of this Order the operation of Chapter 18 of The Animals Order of 1875 (which chapter relates to cattle brought from Schleswig and Holstein) is hereby suspended.

5. Cattle brought from a port or place in either of the parts of the German Empire

respectively known as Schleswig and as Holstein, (in this Order referred to as Schleswig-Holstein cattle,) are hereby excepted from the provisions described in the First Schedule to this Order, as far as such exception is necessary for the operation of this Order.

6. Schleswig-Holstein cattle may be landed in a defined part of one of the following ports, and not elsewhere :

Goole.	Middlesbrough.
Grimsby.	Plymouth.
Hartlepool.	Sunderland.
London.	

7. The landing of Schleswig-Holstein cattle shall be subject to the condition that they are accompanied by a declaration and certificates, such as are indicated in the forms in the Second Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect.

8. If the declaration accompanying any cattle imported under this Order is untrue in any particular, as regards any one of the cattle to which it relates, the master of the vessel shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order with respect to all the cattle to which the declaration relates, unless he shews to the satisfaction of the Justices before whom he is charged, that he did not know of the same being so untrue, and that he could not with reasonable diligence have obtained that knowledge.

9. Every animal brought in the same vessel with Schleswig-Holstein cattle shall, if landed in Great Britain, be landed in a defined part of one of the ports named in Article 6, and not elsewhere.

10. All provisions for the time being in force relative to animals in a defined part of a port shall apply to animals being in such a part under this Order.

Provided that, until the said sum of stock has been retransferred to the depositors, or has become otherwise applicable as hereinbefore mentioned, any interest or dividends accruing thereon shall from time to time, and as often as the same shall become payable, be paid to or on the application of the person or persons, or the majority of the persons, named in such warrant or order as aforesaid, or the survivors or survivor of them."

"27. On the application of the persons named in the warrant or order issued in pursuance of the said Act of the ninth and tenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter twenty, or of the survivors or survivor of them, or of the majority of such persons or survivors, or of the executors or administrators of the last survivor by petition in a summary way at any time after the passing of this Act, the High Court of Chancery may and shall order that sixteen thousand pounds of the stock so transferred as aforesaid, and the interest and dividends thereof, shall be retransferred to the persons or person so applying or to any other person or persons whom they or he may appoint in that behalf."
