Court, or subset ibe the Project proposed to him by the Deputies of the Countrey, or permit the Nobility to affemble themselves in the Field, to remedy the disorders of the Kingdome, and to put it into a posture of defence against the inroads and invalions of forreign forces; separated and broke up that Assembly, without entring into any farther debate upon any of the other concernments of the Nation: by which means the Army will be forced to keep to ether, expecting the success of the next Diet, which is to assemble towards the end of May; when the Stares of the Kingdom intend to appear in Arms in the Field, a Custom which has been unpractifed for 60 years.

We hear of several Companies of sweies lately arrived in Pongrania, the old Army still continue their Quarrets, as formerly in the Dutchy of Bremen; nor is there as yet any discourse of their removal. The Count William of Coningsmark is yet at Staden; but 'tis said that upon some Letters lately received by him, he has some intentions of

making a journey into France.

From Vienna they tells us that the Leavies are still advancing, and that some Companies already begin to draw towards the Netherlands, that they expect earnesly the resolution of the Court of Spain in this juncture of affairs which they may in little time receive upon the return of the Marquis de Grana, as also the issue of the Negotiation for composing the differences between the two Crowns of France and Spain.

From Mayence they tell us that fome persons are lately feized there, suspected to have had a defign of setting fire

to that City, and are under a strict examination.

Some dif utes are lately rifen between the Bishop of strafburg and the Citizens of that places about the Cathedral and some other Churches which the said Bishop lays claim too. At Ratisbonne they are j. alous lest the French may have too much influence upon that people, and have therefore dispatched a Courrier to them to know their Re-Colutions, whether they Rand most affected to France or the Empire.

Hague, Mar. 30. Thise parts appear daily more and more in a martial politure, attending with much entrest-ness the incees of their publique Ministers at the French Court. The Lun-nburg forces may in little time begin their March for Zutphen, whither the Heer Van Zuilenflein Lieutenant General of the Foot, is ordered with several of the f rees under his command, at which place they intend, to form an Army of 2 2000 Horse and Foot. The Heer Ameronghen went yesterday Euvoyé Extraordinary of the Bishop of Munster, to demand leave for the lase spatfare of the Lumenburg forces through his Dominions, and to found his intentions in relation to the prefern state of affairs, of which we may in few days have fome account.

Great preparations are allowinaking for the other Rendelvour appointed near Breita; Field Marshal Wurtz having given Orders for his Baggage to be in teadiness with all things necessary for the Train of Artillery to attend them. His Regiment of 15 hundred foot will be speedily railed, he having already made choice of such Officets as he intends to imploy in the respective commands under him, and will suddenly present their Names to the

States for their approbation.
On Monday last in the morning, Vice Almiral Van Ghent departed hence for Amsterdam, to take care of the men of War which are there fitting up. Our Admiral de Ruyter has had several conferences with the States Deputies concerning the Maritime affairs, and on Wednelday last went hence to Rosserdam, accompanied by several

principal Officers of the Fleet.

The Heer Van Beverning having full power and in-Aructions to affift at the Treaty at Aix la Chapelle, under the Character of Plenipotentiary from the States-General, is preparing for his journey thither, and may in a day or two depart, having been informed that the Baron de Bergeick is gone thither from Bruffels; with the like power from the Court of Spain.

The States Deputies have lately had several conferences

with the Spanis Ambassador, and 'tis said are Treating about the delivery of the Forts of St. Donaes, Isabelle, GG. but as yet they are not come to a relocation in that point.

The Deputies formerly employ'd into Friefland and Groninghen are returned hither, and have given the States an

account of their transactions in those parts.

Seignior Morofini, Envoyé Extraordinary from the-Republique of Venice to the States, lately arriving here, had on Tuesday latt his Audience, to which he was brought in the States Coach with four horles, in which he in the name of that Republique, gave them a full account of the state of their affairs in Candia, and the necessary which obliged them to beg the affiftance of all the Princes and States of the Christian world, concluding with a desire of speedy fuccors for their defence, against that common and powerful

Some few days fince arrived here a Courier fent express from Paris to inform the States that His most Christian Me jesty had again declared to our Minister there His Resolution to observe punctually his Royal Word given them to rest satisfied with the places he had taken during the last Summers War, bef re his late Conquests of Franche Comte, and although he intends about the beginning of April to take the Field with his Army, yet upon the happy conclusion of the Treaty now in hand, and sufficiently ratified on the Spanish side by the 25 of May next ensuring, he shall be willing to give back again all such places as may fall

Amfterdam, Mar. 30. The Fruit-tree, a Merchant ship of confiderable value in her return hither from Messua unfortunately fell foul upon a Venetlan ship, and in little time funk, of all he men only 7 escaping. From the Texel we are told that several Swedes bound for St. Uves in Portugal are from thence put to sea with in Convoy; that a Fleet of 27 Mercha t thips are also gone thence, for several Ports of France, and that the Bilboa Fleet is under fail going out, under the Convoy of Captain Flores Flore/z.

Plymouth, Mar. 22. Sir Thomas Allen with his Squadron flil continue cruifing off the Lizard, by whom palfed yesterday some Holland ships in to days from St. Martins, informing that the French were making all preparations possible for the fitting up of their whole Fleet, which was believ'd they might get ready within a Moneth 3 many men being employ'd about them both at Brest and in the Charante, to whom about a month fince were fent about 100 small vessels from Bourdeaux laden with all forts of Provisions necessary for their Pleet.

London, Mart. 25. Several Apprentices of this City; with whom some other idle persons joyned themselves, abufing the liberty given them these Holydayes, tumultuously got together, according to their former practices, to endeavour the pulling down of some houses of ill fame about the suburbs; but were upon the appearance of the Guards dispersed, and some of the number seised, and may in litthe sime receive the just reward of their riotous and disorderly motions.
