And whereas the Board of Trade have represented to Her Majesty that the following Apothecaries' measures of capacity, which have been constructed and duly verified and authenticated in the Standards Department of the Board of Trade, and their capacity accurately determined in relation to the Imperial standard measure of capacity established under the provisions of Section 6 of the Act 5 George IV, cap. 74, should be declared to be legal secondary standards of capacity, in pursuance of Sections 6 and 8 of "The Standards of Weights, Measures, and Coinage Act, 1866," viz. :—

The **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by the 57th section of "The Harbours and Passing Tolls, &c. Act, 1861," it is enacted that the trustees of Whitby Harbour may, for the purpose of maintaining and improving the harbour, with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, impose rates on vessels using the harbour, and on goods shipped or unshipped in the harbour, not exceeding the rates specified in schedule A. annexed to "The Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and may from time to time, with the like consent, vary such rates by reducing, or raising the same, so that they do not exceed the rates mentioned in the said schedule, and that any rates so imposed may be either in lieu of or in addition to any other rates leviable by the said trustees :

And whereas the trustees of Whitby Harbour have prepared and submitted for approval a table of rates, as the rates to be levied by them from the date of this Order, in substitution for the table of rates authorised to be levied by an Order in Council, dated the 11th day of June, 1863 :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said rates do not exceed the rates specified in schedule A. of "The Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and that the same are proper and reasonable :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve and signify her consent to the said schedule of rates submitted as aforesaid

by the trustees of Whitby Harbour, a copy of which is subjoined.

Five cubic feet, not exceeding two and a half cwt., to be rated as a barrel bulk, but when the weight of five cubic feet is greater than two and a half cwt., then two and a half cwt., to be rated as a barrel bulk.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances, tithings, hamlets; chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed

to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent, as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect; and such Order, being registered in the Registry of the diocese, which the Registrar is hereby required to do, shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever, including the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, if he or they shall have consented thereto in writing under his or their hands."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of the Province of York hath made a report to Her Majesty in Council in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"The undersigned William by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of an Act passed in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign intituled 'An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy' doth hereby report to your Majesty as follows:—

"That there are in the town of Sheffield in the county and diocese of York the parishes of Saint George and Saint James the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the said parishes of Saint George and Saint James immediately adjoin and are also benefices in the said diocese of York and are styled or known respectively as the vicarage of Saint George Sheffield and the vicarage of Saint James Sheffield.

"That according to the last census the population of the parish of Saint George was ten thousand three hundred and that of the said parish of Saint James was four thousand six hundred and forty-seven.

"That it is proposed that a portion of the said parish of Saint George which immediately adjoins the said parish of Saint James on its western boundary and which said portion is particularly delineated and described in the map or plan annexed to this report and scheme and thereon coloured round with a pink verge line shall be separated from the said parish of Saint George and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Saint James.

"That the population of the said portion of the parish of Saint George so described as aforesaid is one thousand one hundred.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of Saint George Sheffield is four hundred and twenty pounds and that of the said vicarage of Saint James is three hundred and ninety pounds.

"That the Reverend John Edward Blakeney Clerk M.A. vicar of Sheffield is the patron of the said vicarages of Saint George and Saint James Sheffield and is a consenting party to the said proposed scheme of separation and annexation.

"That the Reverend Henry Arnold Favell Clerk M.A. is vicar of the said vicarage of Saint George Sheffield and the Reverend Henry Henton Wright is the vicar of the said vicarage of Saint James Sheffield both of whom are consenting parties to the said proposed scheme of separation and annexation.

"That it appears to the said archbishop that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 and in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign chapter 49 the said portion of the parish of Saint George Sheffield as delineated in the said plan and described in the schedule to the scheme hereunto annexed may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Saint George and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Saint James.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the first hereinbefore mentioned Act the said archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above-mentioned may best be effected and the said Archbishop being on full enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to your Majesty in Council certify the same to your Majesty in Council together with the consent in writing to the said scheme of the patron and incumbents of the said vicarages or benefices of Saint George Sheffield and Saint James Sheffield to the intent that your Majesty in Council in case it should be thought expedient so to do may make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

"Given under the hand of the said Archbishop the twenty-fifth day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

"W. Ebor."

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the report of the Lord Archbishop, are in the words following, that is to say:—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Report.

"That the portion of the parish of Saint George Sheffield in the county and diocese of York described in the schedule hereunder written as delineated on the map or plan annexed to this scheme and thereon coloured round with a pink verge line shall be separated from that parish and be annexed to and become part of the parish of Saint James for ecclesiastical purposes and the incumbent of such parish of Saint James Sheffield shall have exclusive charge of souls within the limits of the same.

"That all fees and payments for churchings marriages and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of the inhabitants of such portion of the parish of Saint George and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice as shall arise therein shall in case such separation and annexation be effected belong to the incumbent of Saint James.

"That the inhabitants of such portion of the parish of Saint George Sheffield shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the

church of Saint George but shall be entitled to accommodation in the church of Saint James Sheffield.

"That no alteration shall be made in respect of the patronage or endowment of either of the said benefices of Saint George and Saint James Sheffield.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"All that portion of the parish of Saint George Sheffield in the county and diocese of York which is comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of Newcastle-street at the point where it is crossed by Carr-lane and extending thence southward along the middle of the first-named road to its junction with Portobello-street and thence proceeding eastward along the middle of the last-named street to the junction of such street with Rockingham-street and thence proceeding southward along the middle of the last-mentioned street to its junction with West-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned street to its junction with Bailey-lane and thence extending northward along the centre of Bailey-lane aforesaid to its junction with Brood-lane thence extending westward along the centre of the last-mentioned street to its junction with Newcastle-street aforesaid and thence proceeding southward to the said part where the last-mentioned street is intersected by Carr-lane.

"CONSENTS.

"We, John Edward Blakeney, Clerk, M.A., vicar of Sheffield in the county and diocese of York the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarages and parish churches of Saint George and Saint James Sheffield and Henry Arnold Favell, Clerk, M.A. and Henry Henton Wright, Clerk, the present vicars of the said vicarages do hereby respectively signify our consent to the foregoing report and scheme.

"Given under our hands this fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the bishop of any diocese, or by the bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one

" or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty, as herein after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories or vicarages with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only: and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twentieth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words following, that is to say:—

" To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

" We Archibald Campbell by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury do hereby certify to your Majesty in Council that it having appeared to us that the benefice (being a Rectory) of Bonnington and the benefice (being a vicarage or perpetual curacy) of Bilsington both in the county of Kent and within our diocese of Canterbury might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we made enquiry into the circumstances of the case and on such enquiry it appeared to us:

" That the benefices are contiguous and when united will not be of inconvenient extent.

" That the aggregate population of the said benefices according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament does not exceed five hundred and thirty persons. The population of the parish of Bonnington being one hundred and eighty-one and the population of the parish of Bilsington being three hundred and forty-nine.

" That there is a church belonging to each of the said benefices.

" That there is a house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Bonnington but there is no house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Bilsington.

" That the net yearly value of the said benefice of Bonnington is two hundred and forty-three pounds or thereabouts and the net yearly value of the said benefice of Bilsington is fifty-three pounds or thereabouts.

" That the patronage of the said benefice of Bonnington belongs to Thomas Papillon of Crowhurst Park in the county of Sussex, Esquire and the patronage of the said benefice of Bilsington which is now vacant belongs to William Halliday Halliday of Glenthorne in the county of Devon Esquire who respectively consent to the union of the said benefices and that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows (that is to say) the first turn or right of presentation shall belong to the said Thomas Papillon his heirs and assigns the second turn or right of presentation shall belong to the said William Halliday Halliday his heirs and assigns and that in every succeeding three turns or rights of presentation the said Thomas Papillon his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the first two turns and the said William Halliday Halliday his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the other or third turn.

" That six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to your Majesty in Council we caused a statement in writing of the aforesaid facts to be affixed on the principal outer door in the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union that no such cause hath been shown the consent in writing of the said patrons of the benefices and the copies of the statement of facts and notices so in each case affixed as aforesaid are hereto annexed. And we the said Archbishop do hereby certify the inquiry consent and matters aforesaid to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said two benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only and declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows (that is to say) the first turn or right of presentation shall belong to the said Thomas Papillon his heirs and assigns the second turn or right of presentation shall belong to the said William Halliday Halliday his heirs and assigns and that in every succeeding three turns or rights of presentation the said Thomas Papillon his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the first two turns and the said William Halliday Halliday his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the other or third turn.

" As witness our hand this twentieth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better

"provision for the residences of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts,

"for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Winchester hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Edward Harold Lord Bishop of Winchester do hereby represent to your Grace that to the benefice (being a rectory and vicarage) and to the parish church of Overton in the county of Southampton and my diocese of Winchester belongs an ancient chapelry known by the name of Tadley the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the census of 1871 the population of the parish of Overton exclusive of Tadley is one thousand four hundred and nine and the population of Tadley is nine hundred and six.

"That there is in Tadley a church or chapel distant from the parish church of Overton about ten miles wherein Divine service is performed by the incumbent of Overton or his curate.

"That there is a sufficient house of residence at Overton but there is no house at Tadley.

"That baptisms marriages churchings and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the said church or chapel of the said chapelry and in the burial ground thereto belonging.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice with the said chapelry (exclusive of the value of the house of residence at Overton) is six hundred and twelve pounds or thereabouts of which two hundred and twenty-five pounds or thereabouts arises within or in respect of the said chapelry.

"That the patronage of the said rectory and vicarage and parish church of Overton with the said chapelry of Tadley belongs to me in right of my See and the Reverend Thomas Floud is the present incumbent of the said benefice.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and in the second and third years of the same reign chapter 49 the said chapelry of Tadley may be advantageously separated from the said rectory and vicarage and parish church of Overton and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of myself as patron and of the incumbent of the said benefice I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consent by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the scheme and consents, in the said representation mentioned, are in the words following:—

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"That the said chapelry of Tadley shall as and from the first day of October next be separated

from the said rectory and vicarage and parish church of Overton and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Tadley' of which the said church or chapel in the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory and vicarage of Overton and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That two churchwardens shall be annually chosen in the customary manner and at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed in and for such separate parish and benefice and every person so chosen shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwardens as to ecclesiastical matters within the said separate parish and benefice.

"That all the glebe lands tithe rent-charges or other payments for or in lieu of tithes and all other endowments whatsoever belonging to the said rectory and vicarage of Overton which arise within or in respect of the said chapelry of Tadley shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said proposed separate benefice of Tadley for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Tadley and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed separate parish or benefice shall belong to the incumbent thereof.

"That the patronage of a right of nomination to the said proposed separate benefice of Tadley shall be vested in and belong to the Lord Bishop of Winchester his successors and assigns for ever.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not be entitled to accommodation in any other church than the church of the said proposed separate parish nor shall the parishioners of Overton be entitled to any accommodation in the church or chapel of the said proposed separate benefice except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either the said church of Overton or the said church or chapel of Tadley and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate at or in the parish of Staunton in the county of Worcester and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and made or expressed to be made between Henry Morgan Vane of No. 8 York-street Saint James's-square, in the city of Westminster 'The Official Trustee of Charity Lands' for the time being constituted under the provisions of the Charitable Trusts Acts of the first part George Francis Dowdeswell of Redmarley in the county of Worcester Gentleman Thomas Hooper of the parish of Staunton in the said county of Worcester Surgeon Joseph Cooper of Redmarley aforesaid Yeoman John Halford of Staunton aforesaid Yeoman the Reverend William James Sevier Clerk rector of the said parish of Staunton Sir Edmund Anthony Harley Lechmere of Rhydd Court Upton-on-Severn in the said county of Worcester Baronet Joseph Hawkins of Staunton Court in the parish of Staunton aforesaid Farmer Francis Henry Hooper of Staunton aforesaid Farmer William Robinson of Redmarley aforesaid Farmer Henry Bradley of Staunton aforesaid Farmer and Josiah Castree the younger of the city of Gloucester Land Agent being the Trustees of the Charity referred to in the said indenture of the second part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the third part certain lands and hereditaments situate at or in the said parish of Staunton more particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession but some portions thereof on account of their character and situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and

propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All that part of the parish of Beckenham in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on part of the east by the new parish of Saint Paul New Beckenham in the said county and diocese on the north by the boundary dividing the original parish of Lewisham from the original parish of Beckenham, or in other words partly by the district parish of Christ Church Forest Hill, partly by the district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham and partly by the new parish of Saint Philip Sydenham, the three lastly-mentioned cures being each and all in the said county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester, and which is bounded at its western extremity and on the main part of the south-west by the boundary dividing the said county of Kent from the county of Surrey or in other words by the particular district of Saint Stephen South Dulwich, by the new parish of Saint Paul Penge and by the new parish of Saint John Penge which three last-mentioned cures are each and all in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid and which is bounded upon all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the south-west and on the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the county boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Penge from the parish of Beckenham aforesaid at a point at the eastern end of the bridge which carries the main line of the London Chatham and Dover Railway over Kent House-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said main line of railway for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same main line of railway over the stream which forms a tributary of the River Ravensbourne and which is called or known as the Pool River and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said Pool River for a distance of sixty-eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Mid Kent Railway over the same river which boundary divides the said parish of Beckenham from the new parish of Saint Paul, New Beckenham aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

The Tramways Act, 1870.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that at a Meeting of the Council of the said borough, held on Tuesday, the 6th day of August, 1878, the under-mentioned bye-laws relating to tramways, and the conductors and drivers thereof, were duly made by the said Council.

And notice is hereby further given, that after the expiration of this notice it is the intention of the said Council to make application to the Board of Trade for confirmation and allowance of the said bye-laws.

**BYE-LAWS** in force within the borough of Wolverhampton relating to tramways, the carriages using such tramways, and the conductors and drivers thereof.

By the 48th section of "The Tramways Act, 1870," is enacted that—

The Local Authority shall have the like power of making and enforcing rules and regulations, and of granting licenses with respect to all carriages using the tramways, and to all drivers, conductors, and other persons having charge of or using the same, and to the standings for the same, as they are for the time being entitled to make, enforce, and grant with respect to hackney carriages and the drivers and other persons having the charge thereof, and to the standings for the same in the streets and district of or under the control of the Local Authority.

By the 46th and 47th section of "The Tramways Act, 1870," it is enacted that—

Subject to the provisions of the special Act authorizing any tramway, and this Act,

The Local Authority of any district in which the same is laid down may from time to time make regulations as to the following matters:—

The rate of speed to be observed in travelling upon the tramway.

The distances at which carriages using the tramway shall be allowed to follow one after the other.

The stopping of carriages using the tramway.

The traffic on the road in which the tramway is laid.

The promoters of any tramway and their lessees may from time to time make regulations—

For preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage, or in or against any premises belonging to them.

For regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage belonging to them.

And for better enforcing the observance of all or any of such regulations, it shall be lawful for such Local Authority and promoters respectively to make bye-laws for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, and from time to time repeal or alter such bye-laws and make new bye-laws, provided that such bye-laws be not repugnant to the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the same are to have effect:

Any such bye-laws may impose reasonable penalties for offences against the same not exceeding forty shillings, for each offence, with or without further penalties for continuing offences, not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues; but all bye-laws shall be so framed as to allow in every case part only of the maximum penalty being ordered to be paid.

We, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Wolverhampton, being the Local Authority named in the 46th and 48th sections of "The Tramways Act, 1870," and pursuant to the powers conferred on us by such several sections, do hereby make the following rules and regulations with respect to all carriages using the tramways within the borough, and to all drivers, conductors, and other persons having the charge thereof or using the same, and to the standings for the same, such rules and regulations being such as we have heretofore, under and by virtue and in pursuance of "The Wolverhampton Improvement Act, 1869," made with respect to hackney carriages, and the drivers and other persons having the charge thereof, and such as we have power to make under and by virtue and in pursuance of the said 46th section of "The Tramways Act, 1870," and for the better enforcing the observance of all such regulations, we do hereby make, order, and ordain the same as bye-laws; that is to say:—

1. For every license for every tram-car, and for every driver thereof, there shall be paid to the Corporation such a sum as the Corporation shall direct, not exceeding five shillings for twelve months, and in the like proportion for any shorter period.

2. Before any such license is granted, a requisition for the same, in such form as the Corporation from time to time may provide for that purpose, shall be made and signed by the secretary, manager, or proprietor of the tramway, and by the driver and conductor of such car, as the case may be, in respect of which such license is applied for, and in every such requisition shall be truly stated the name and surname and place of abode of the person applying for such license, and of every proprietor or company owning such car, or person concerned either solely or in partnership with any other person in the keeping, using, or employing of such car, or of the driver or conductor of any such car, as the case may be.

3. Before any such license is granted the Corporation, by one of their officers, may, by means of a punch or burn-mark or otherwise, mark the car for which such license shall be applied on such part thereof, and in such manner as the Watch Committee of the Corporation shall from time to time direct. And if from any cause such mark shall become defaced or obliterated, the owner of such carriage, or manager of the tramway, shall immediately give notice thereof to the police office of the borough, and have the mark restored.

4. No company, proprietor, or driver of any car shall use in such car any animal which shall, in the opinion of the Chief Constable of the borough, be unfit for the due and proper draught and service thereof.

5. In every such license shall be specified the name and surname, and place of abode or business, of every person or company who is a proprietor of the car in respect of which such license is granted, or who is concerned either solely or in partnership with any other person in the keeping or employing of any such car, or of such driver or conductor as aforesaid, and also the number of such license, which as to the license granted to the said company or proprietor shall correspond with the number to be painted or marked on the plate to be fixed on such car, together with such other particulars as the Corporation from time to time think fit.

6. Every license shall be made out by the Town Clerk and duly entered in a book to be provided by the Corporation for that purpose, and in such book shall be contained columns or places for entries to be made of every offence committed by

any company, proprietor, driver, or conductor, or other person attending such car.

7. Every license so to be granted shall be signed by the Town Clerk, and shall be in force for one year only from the day of the date of such license, or until the next general licensing meeting, in case any general licensing day be appointed by the Corporation.

8. No proprietor of, or company owning any car, or any person so concerned as aforesaid, shall permit the same to be used as a car plying for hire without having obtained a license as aforesaid for such car, nor during the time that such license is revoked or suspended as hereinafter provided, nor shall any person drive, stand, or ply for hire with any car for which such license as aforesaid has not been previously obtained, or without having the number of such car corresponding with the number of the license openly displayed on such car.

9. In case any car, so licensed as aforesaid, shall require repair, and whilst undergoing repair, the owners or owner thereof may substitute and use some other such car, but before using the same he shall submit it to the examination of the Chief Constable, who before such user shall approve the same by a memorandum in writing; and at all times during the user of the same a plate shall be hung on or attached to such substituted car, in a conspicuous part, and with the words and figures "substituted for No. —," being the number of such car so licensed as aforesaid, in letters and figures at least an inch long; provided such car so under repair shall be repaired without unnecessary delay, and immediately on its completion the user of the substituted car shall cease.

10. In all cases of complaint where the driver or conductor of a car is summoned to attend before a Justice, and is adjudged guilty of the offence alleged against him, such Justice shall make an endorsement upon the license of such driver or proprietor, stating the nature of the offence and the amount of the penalty inflicted.

11. Any Justice, or the Watch Committee of the borough, may at any time after the conviction of any such driver or conductor, suspend or revoke his license.

12. No proprietor of any car shall permit any car to be used or employed, and no person shall stand or ply for hire with such car unless the number of persons to be carried by such car, in words at length and in form following (that is to say, to carry persons inside and persons outside), be painted on a plate placed on some conspicuous place on the outside and inside of such car, and in legible letters so as to be clearly distinguishable from the colour of the ground whereon the same are painted, one inch in length and of a proportionate breadth, and the driver and conductor of any such car shall not be required to carry, nor shall he carry in or by such car, a greater number of persons than the number painted thereon.

13. The driver and conductor of a car plying for hire shall permit any person whose dress or luggage is not offensive to use such car when any place is vacant on paying the usual fare.

14. The driver and conductor of any car shall stop the same on being so required by any passenger, or, when there is a vacant place, by any person desirous of being a passenger in such car.

15. No driver, conductor, or proprietor of any car shall therein or thereupon carry, or permit to be carried, any dead body, nor shall in or upon any such car knowingly carry, or cause to be carried, any person suffering under any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease.

16. The driver or conductor of any car so licensed shall at the time of obtaining a license for the same procure a copy of these bye-laws certified by the signature of the Town Clerk, and every such driver and conductor respectively shall immediately thereafter cause his name and address and the number of his license to be distinctly written thereon. Every such driver and conductor respectively shall at all times have a copy of these bye-laws, so certified as aforesaid, ready to produce and in every case of dispute shall produce the same for perusal and inspection by any passenger or by any person desiring to be a passenger, and shall truly point out to such person, the bye-laws applicable to the case or dispute which may have arisen between such person and such conductor or driver; and every such driver or conductor shall at all times when plying for hire have with him his license ready to produce, and upon demand shall produce and exhibit the same to any passenger or to any person desiring to be a passenger, or to the inspector of hackney carriages, tramway cars, or to any constable of the borough.

17. The owner of every such car and the manager of every tramway company shall at the request of any passenger or person desirous of being a passenger, or of the inspector of hackney carriages and tramway cars for the time being, or of any constable of the borough declare and make known the name and place of abode of the driver and conductor of such carriage.

18. The driver and conductor of every such car shall be sober, and shall not smoke tobacco or other like substance whilst on a car, and shall conduct himself in an orderly and respectful manner, and obey the reasonable orders of the person hiring such car, and shall at all times, when driving or plying for hire, wear on the right arm or other place to be fixed from time to time by the Corporation, so as to be conspicuous at all times, a badge (to be provided by the Corporation) having the number of his license marked thereon, and shall not canvass for fares by unnecessarily stopping his car or by delaying the ordinary traffic.

19. The driver and conductor of every such car shall be constantly attendant upon the same whilst plying for hire, and shall not wantonly or furiously drive, or be guilty of any wilful misconduct.

20. The proprietor of every such car shall provide and the driver or conductor thereof shall deliver, when required, to every person hiring or entering the same, a printed ticket, in the following or such other form as the Corporation may from time to time direct, with the rates of fares printed thereon:—

21. Every driver and conductor, upon ceasing to act as such, or whose license shall be suspended or revoked, shall within four days thereafter deliver his license and badge to the Town Clerk, at his office, at the Townhall.

22. The proprietor of every such car shall at the hour named in his license on every day when

the same is being used have the same ready for inspection.

23. The proprietor of every such car shall cause the number of the license to be painted and kept legible and undefaced on each side thereof, in such position as the Corporation shall from time to time determine, in figures of not less than two inches in height and of proportionate breadth.

24. The proprietor of every such car shall cause the number of the license to be kept printed or painted of such size and in such manner, legible and undefaced, in such position, in the inside of the car, as shall from time to time be approved by the Corporation, and also shall cause to be printed or painted on a card or plate, and fixed and kept legible and undefaced in some conspicuous place inside the car, to be approved of as aforesaid, a notice of the rates of fares and a time table of the times of travelling:—

“The driver or conductor shall produce the bye-laws, rates of fare, and table of times of travelling on demand.”

25. The proprietor of every such car shall at all times have the same, with the harness, in perfect and good condition, with good and sufficient lamps ready for lighting, to be lighted at such times as may be reasonably required by any passenger, or by any constable, with the conductor, driver, and the horse or horses competent and fit to perform their respective duties.

26. The driver of every car shall drive the same at a rate not less than six miles, and not more than eight miles in the hour upon the average.

27. The driver of every car shall drive the same so that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than 100 yards along any portion of the line of tramway.

28. No passenger shall smoke inside any car.

29. No passenger or other person shall while travelling in or upon any car play or perform upon any musical instrument to the annoyance of any other passenger.

30. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any car, and if found in or upon any car shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

31. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any car, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

32. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the car, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any car. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

33. A person whose dress, clothing, or luggage might in the opinion of the conductor of a car, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who in the opinion of the conductor might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any car having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any car, shall on request of the conductor leave the interior of the car, upon the fare if previously paid being returned.

34. Each passenger shall upon demand pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of

the proprietor of such car the fare legally demandable for the journey.

35. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the proprietor of such car, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

36. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any car.

37. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the proprietors of the car, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platform of any car, nor sit on the outside rail or on the roof of any car, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

38. No person except a passenger or intending passenger shall enter or mount any car, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any car, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

39. When any car contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such car when warned by the conductor not to do so.

40. When any car contains the full licensed number of passengers a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters, and in a conspicuous position on the car.

41. The conductor shall not permit any passenger, beyond the licensed number, to enter, or mount, or remain in or upon any part of a car.

42. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any car whilst in motion.

43. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any car except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any car after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any car, in breach of this regulation, shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the car immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

44. No person shall travel in or on any car with loaded firearms.

45. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any driver or conductor of any car in the execution of his duty, upon or in connection with any car.

46. The conductor of each car shall enforce or prevent the breach of these bye-laws and regulations to the best of his ability.

47. In construing these bye-laws, such of the words and expressions herein used as are defined by “The Wolverhampton Improvement Act, 1869,” shall have the several meanings thereby assigned to them, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction, and all words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular to include the plural and the plural the singular, unless the contrary as to gender and number is expressly provided, and the terms owner and proprietor shall include any company, and the secretary and manager thereof.

48. The foregoing bye-laws shall come into

force and take effect from and immediately after the 9th day of November, 1878.

49. The penalty for every breach or non-observance of any and every part of the foregoing bye-laws shall be any sum not exceeding five pounds, and for a continuing offence a sum not exceeding forty shillings for every day during which the offence shall continue, and the Justices by whom any penalty imposed by these bye-laws is inflicted may order the whole or any part only of such penalty to be paid, or may remit the whole penalty.
