"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Horsley in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Horsley which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas Robert Sacheverel Sitwell of Morley in the said county of Derby Esquire has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of three thousand pounds sterling in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, then of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed with the said Robert Sacheverel Sitwell and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall continue in our hands.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should also make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-named Act to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have undertaken and agreed

to make the said grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Dalrymple Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Horsley which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Horsley Woodhouse.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Robert Sacheverel Sitwell his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

Watford should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Langleybury as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans with the consent of William Jones Loyd of Langleybury aforesaid Esquire the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Abbots Langley, and with the consent of the Right Honourable Arthur Algernon Earl of Essex the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Watford (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Abbots Langley and of the said parish of Watford which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul situate at Langleybury as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul Langleybury.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul Langleybury, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Abbots Langley in the county of Hertford and in the diocese of Saint Albans wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the south-east by the new parish of Leavesden on the south partly by the particular district of Saint Andrew Watford and partly by the parish of Watford on the west by the new parish of Saint Paul Chipperfield on the north-west by the parish of Kings Langley all in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say on the north and on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Kings Langley from the parish of Abbots Langley aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries Water-lane over the Grand Junction Canal and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of ten and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction near to Primrose Hill with the road leading from Hemel Hempstead to Abbots Langley and with Toms-lane and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the main line of the London and North Western Railway over the same lane and extending thence southward along the middle of the said main line of railway for a distance of sixty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same main line of railway over the road leading from Hemel Hempstead to Abbots Langley as aforesaid, and extending thence first south-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road (which said road is called or known in part of its course as Gallows Hill-road) for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts to the point at or near to the house called

or known as Hazelgrove Farm House where the said last-mentioned road is joined by the road leading to the house called or known as Hazelwood and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of forty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hunters-lane and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of fifty-seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary near the house called or known as Hunters Hall on the western side of Leavesden Green which boundary divides the said parish of Abbots Langley from the new parish of Leavesden aforesaid And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Watford wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the west and on the north by the above-described portion of the said parish of Abbots Langley on the east by the particular district of Saint Andrew Watford aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Andrew Watford from the parish of Watford aforesaid at the point where the high road leading from Watford to Hemel Hempstead is joined by the roadway leading to Grove Wharf on the Grand Junction Canal aforesaid, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described roadway for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to the edge of the said Grove Wharf and extending thence due westward and in a direct line for a distance of one chain and a quarter or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the Grand Junction Canal aforesaid; south of Lady Capels Wharf which boundary divides the said parish of Watford from the parish of Abbots Langley aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred

and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish of Whitechapel out of the new parish of Christ Church Liversedge and out of the new parish of Saint John, Cleckheaton, all within the original limits of the parish of Birstal in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Whitechapel of the said new parish of Christ Church Liversedge and of the said new parish of Saint John Cleckheaton, which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district a sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds four pounds per centum debenture stock of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company has been transferred into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, then of the said new parish and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed according to the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act.

"And whereas the said sum of debenture stock of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Whitechapel of the said new parish of Christ Church, Liversedge, and of the said new parish of Saint John Cleckheaton which are described

in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Luke, Cleckheaton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised for one turn of nomination, and that the first turn only by Catherine Woodhead of Marsh House Liversedge in the said county of York, Widow, or by her heirs and assigns, and that all the rest residue and remainder of the said right of patronage and nomination of the minister or incumbent of the same district or new parish as the case may be shall in like manner be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said Catherine Woodhead, Samuel Holdsworth Stocks of Cleckheaton, in the said county of York Esquire, George Jackson of Cleckheaton aforesaid Esquire, Edward Brooke of Cleckheaton Esquire and John Henry Leather of Cleckheaton Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Luke Cleckheaton, being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the new parish of Whitechapel, of the new parish of Christ Church, Liversedge and of the new parish of Saint John Cleckheaton all within the original limits of the parish of Birstal in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which said portions of such new parishes are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point on the southern side of the Old Wakefield and Halifax Turnpike-road opposite to the southern end of New-lane, at Hartshead Moor; where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Liversedge from the new parish of Whitechapel aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the last-named new parish from the parochial chapelry of Hartshead-cum-Clifton, in the parish of Dewsbury in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence generally north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts, thereby following in one part the south-western side of the said Old Wakefield and Halifax Turnpike-road, and in another part the north-eastern side of the same road, to the point where the same boundary crosses the middle of Scholes-lane, and extending thence, that is, from the said boundary, northward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of eight and a half

chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath, which is also in part a private roadway, and which leads past the southern side of the house called or known as Holme Field Nook otherwise Oldfield Nook, and across the fields bordering the stream called or known as Holme Field Beck otherwise Oldfield Beck, and by Wellands-lane and across the road called or known as South-parade to Tofts Gate, and extending thence that is from the said point of junction eastward along the middle of the said footpath or roadway for a distance of about one mile (thereby passing in part along Wellands-lane aforesaid and crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Whitechapel from the new parish of Saint John Cleckheaton aforesaid) to the point where the same public footpath crosses the road called or known as South-parade as aforesaid, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with that part of the Leeds and Elland Turnpike-road which is called or known as Upper-lane or Westgate and with Iron-street and continuing thence still south-eastward across the said Upper-lane or Westgate and along the middle of Iron-street aforesaid for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its south-eastern end at the stream called or known as Blakup Beck, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Cleckheaton from the new parish of Christ Church Liversedge aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts, thereby following the course of Blakup Beck aforesaid, to a point in the middle of Quaker-lane and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. L. D. 1878 No. 1, and placed on the western side of the same lane immediately opposite to the southern end of the house called or known as Wood Nook and extending thence first westward to the said boundary stone and thence south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of sixty-six chains or thereabouts (the point at which the said imaginary line crosses the footpath leading from the house called or known as Upper Blakup into Upper-lane otherwise Westgate aforesaid being indicated by a boundary stone inscribed 'C. And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the several new parishes out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and

incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for fixing the number and emoluments of the Minor Canons in the Cathedral Church of Ely.

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Ely that there have been of old time and still are in the same cathedral church five minor canonries and no more, but that one of such five minor canonries has never been filled up since the death of the last holder of the same, the Reverend John Griffith, Clerk in Holy Orders, who died in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and that in fact there are now in the said cathedral church four minor canons and no more each of whom is paid by the said Dean and Chapter a stipend of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient, and it is according to the wish of the said Dean and Chapter, that the fifth minor canonry in the said Cathedral Church of Ely, which has been for some time past vacant as aforesaid, should be abolished, and that the present state of facts as to the minor canons in the same cathedral church which is hereinbefore set forth should be sanctioned by Order of your Majesty in Council in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Very Reverend Charles Merivale, the Dean, and of the Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Ely, in testimony of which consent the said Dean and Chapter have to this scheme set their common or capitular seal, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that the fifth minor canonry in the said Cathedral Church of Ely, that is to say, the minor canonry which was last held as aforesaid by the said John Griffith shall be hereby abolished, and that there shall henceforth be in the said Cathedral Church of Ely four minor canonries and no more.

"And we further recommend and propose that from time to time and at all times each of the four minor canons in the said Cathedral Church of Ely shall be paid by the said Dean and Chapter so long as he shall hold his minor canonry one annual stipend of one hundred and fifty pounds, which stipend shall be payable by four equal quarterly payments on the sixth day of January, the sixth day of April, the sixth day of July, and the eleventh day of October, in each and every year; and shall be apportionable as between any outgoing minor canon or his representatives and his successor, and shall be recoverable as against the said Dean and Chapter by action of debt.

"And lastly we recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing as to the matters aforesaid in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ely.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church Wakefield and of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and of the new parish of Thornes which three said new parishes are all within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-fifth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one and published in the London Gazette upon the eleventh day of May in the same year a part of the said parish of Wakefield was assigned as a district to the church situate at Thornes within the limits of the said parish.

"And whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the sixth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four a certain other part of the said parish of Wakefield was assigned as a particular district to the church of the Holy Trinity situate within the limits of the said parish.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the twentieth day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and published in the London Gazette upon the same day contiguous portions of the said district of Thornes and of the said district of the Holy Trinity Wakefield were constituted a separate district for ecclesiastical purposes and were named 'The District of Christ Church Wakefield.'

"And whereas the said district of Christ Church Wakefield the said district of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and the said district of Thornes have each and all become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four and by the said above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-first day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-eighth day of the same month the boundaries of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield were altered.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Wakefield of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and of the said new parish of Thornes should now be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly published Order of your Majesty in Council the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Wakefield shall be extended so as to include within its limits all that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Wakefield (wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls) which are described in the first schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured respectively yellow and pink and also that from and after the aforesaid day and date and without any assurance in the law other than as aforesaid the boundaries of the said new parish of Thornes shall be extended so as to include within its limits all that further portion of the said parish of Wakefield (wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls) which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green and that from and after the aforesaid day and date and without any

assurance in the law other than such duly published Order of your Majesty in Council as aforesaid the said portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and the said portion of the parish of Wakefield so described in the first schedule as aforesaid shall be dis severed from the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield and from the said parish of Wakefield respectively and shall be annexed to and shall together form part of and shall become and be and be deemed to be within the limits of the said new parish of Christ Church Wakefield and also that upon and from the same day and date and without any assurance in the law other than as aforesaid the said portion of the parish of Wakefield so described in the second schedule as aforesaid shall be dis severed from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall form part of and shall become and be and be deemed to be within the limits of the said new parish of Thornes.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"SCHEDULE No. 1.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church Wakefield in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, being:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield in the said county and diocese which is bounded on the west by the hereinafter-described portion of the parish of Wakefield in the same county and diocese on the south-east by the new parish of Christ Church Wakefield aforesaid or in other words by the main line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway and on the remaining side that is to say on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Wakefield from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield aforesaid at the point where the said main-line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway is joined by the line of the Wakefield and Bradford Branch of the Great Northern Railway and extending thence westward along the said branch line of railway for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield from the hereinafter-described portion of the parish of Wakefield aforesaid.

And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Wakefield wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the east by the above-described portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield aforesaid on the south by the new parish of Thornes in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say on the west and on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Thornes from the parish of Wakefield aforesaid at a point in the middle of the Wakefield and Denby Dale-road and extending thence, that is, from the last-described boundary, northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the said line of the Wakefield and Bradford Branch of the Great Northern Railway over the same road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the same branch-line of railway for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts

to the boundary which divides the said parish of Wakefield from the above-described portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wakefield aforesaid.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Thornes aforesaid being:—

"All that portion of the said parish of Wakefield wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the west and on the south by the new parish of Thornes aforesaid on the east by the portion of the parish of Wakefield described in the foregoing schedule or in other words by the Wakefield and Denby Dale-road aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say on the north by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the centre of the before-mentioned bridge which carries the line of the Wakefield and Bradford Branch of the Great Northern Railway over the same road as aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the same branch line of railway over the stream called or known as Ings Beck and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary a little to the east of the footpath leading from the Wakefield Ings Trust-road into Lowe Field-lane which boundary divides the said parish of Wakefield from the new parish of Thornes aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have in accordance with the provisions of the said Act of the 6th and 7th Vic., cap. 37, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the several cures affected by the said scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assents thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the said diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of August, in the year one

thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say :

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Shere, out of the parish of Abinger, out of the parish of Ewhurst, out of the parish of Cranley, out of the parish of Ockley, and out of the parish of Ockham, all in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Shere of the said parish of Abinger of the said parish of Ewhurst, of the said parish of Cranley, of the said parish of Ockley and of the said parish of Ockham which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district, a sum of two thousand five hundred of the four pounds per centum perpetual debenture stock of the Furness Railway Company has been transferred into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act then of the said new parish and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed according to the provisions of the said lastly mentioned Act.

"And whereas the said sum of debenture stock of the Furness Railway Company has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district and new parish when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said

Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Shere, of the said parish of Abinger, of the said parish of Ewhurst, of the said parish of Cranley of the said parish of Ockley, and of the said parish of Ockham which are described in the schedule hereunder written (all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed) shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary Holmbury.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be fully and freely exercised by the said Edward Harold or other the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Winchester and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mary Holmbury being :—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of Shere, of the parish of Abinger of the parish of Ewhurst of the parish of Cranley of the parish of Ockley, and of the parish of Ockham all in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester which said portions of such respective parishes are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the road leading from Ewhurst past Coophurst Farm Stubbett's Farm and Wickland Farm to Forest Green where the boundary which divides the main body of the said parish of Ewhurst from a certain detached portion of the parish of Ockley, aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the same detached portion from the new parish of Okewood in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence for a distance of one mile and seven and a half chains or thereabouts alternately eastward and north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary and along the boundary dividing the said parish of Abinger from the new parish of Okewood aforesaid (thereby following for the most part the course of the said road) to the point on the eastern side of Forest Green aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Abinger from the new parish of Coldharbour in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and ten chains or thereabouts to the point where the same boundary strikes the fence forming the

southern boundary of the wood called or known as Pasture Wood and numbered 339 upon the ordnance survey map of the said parish of Abinger on the $\frac{1}{2500}$ scale and upon the map hereunto annexed and continuing thence north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of three-quarters of a mile or thereabouts in a crow-fly line across the said wood to a point at the south-eastern corner of the enclosure called or known at Cooper's Copse and numbered 314 upon the said maps (the said point being at the southern end of the fence which divides the last-mentioned enclosure from Pasture Wood aforesaid) and extending thence first northward and then westward along the last-mentioned fence to its junction with the fence which divides the said Pasture Wood from the enclosure numbered 313 upon the said maps and continuing thence still westward along the last-mentioned fence to its western end upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Abinger from the parish of Shere aforesaid and extending thence that is from the said last-described point first northward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned parish boundary for a distance of one mile and fifteen chains or thereabouts to the point indicated on the ordnance survey map of the county of Surrey on the $\frac{1}{2500}$ scale by the western, i.e. the left hand, edge of the sheet of that map numbered XXXIII. 9 and extending thence due southward and in a direct line for a distance of two miles and two chains or thereabouts thereby following the line indicated by the western, or left hand, edge of the above mentioned sheet of the same map and by the western, or left hand, edges of the sheets of the same map numbered respectively XXXIII. 13 and XL. 1 (the same imaginary line being also indicated on the ordnance survey map of the said county of Surrey on the scale of six inches to one mile by the western, or left hand, edges of the sheet of that map numbered respectively XXXIII. and XL. to the point a little to the south-west of the remains of the ancient camp on Holmbury Hill upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Shere from the main body of the parish of Ewhurst aforesaid (such point being indicated on the said ordnance survey maps by the western, or left hand, edges of the sheet numbered XL. 1 on the $\frac{1}{2500}$ scale and of the sheet numbered XL. on the scale of six inches to one mile respectively aforesaid), and extending thence eastward along the last-mentioned parish boundary for a distance of twelve and three-quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction on the southern side of the said ancient camp with the boundary dividing the said main body of the parish of Ewhurst from the detached portion of the parish of Ockley aforesaid and extending thence first eastward along the last-mentioned boundary to a point between the house called or known as Joldwynds and the house called or known as Holmbury and then southward along the same boundary for a distance of one mile and nine and a half chains or thereabouts to the first-described point in the middle of the road leading from Ewhurst past Coophurst Farm. Stubbett's Farm and Wickland Farm to Forest Green as aforesaid at which point the said last-mentioned parish boundary joins the boundary dividing the said detached portion of the parish of Ockley from the new parish of Okewood as aforesaid and where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the several parishes out of which it is intended that the dis-

trict recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas one calendar month has expired since drafts of the said scheme were so transmitted as aforesaid.

And whereas the patron of the said parish of Abinger and the incumbent of the said parish of Shere have alone offered objections or observations in the nature of objections to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding the objections or observations offered as aforesaid by the patron of the said parish of Abinger and by the incumbent of the said parish of Shere, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

BRIXHAM.—Forthwith wholly in Brixham Church, in the county of Devon ; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented ; and except in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of entire bones.

DUXFORD.—Forthwith wholly in St. Peter's and St. John's Churches, Duxford, in the county of Cambridge ; and in the churchyards, after the thirty-first of December next, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

MIDHURST.—Forthwith wholly in the additional churchyard of Midhurst, in the county of Sussex, except in existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried therein.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of October next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct

that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette ; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-eighth day of October.
