

Duror forms his Army between Philipsbourg and Landau. And the Marquis de Boufflers, and the Count de Mencler, command each a Body of 5 or 6000 Men, towards the Upper Rhine, and the Black Forest.

Brussels, June 29. The Marquis de Boufflers came on the 26th Instant with 4000 Men from Luxembourg, and besieged the Castle of Madue in the Country of Liege, which was surrendered to him the next day, the Garrison wanting Powder.

Brussels, June 29. Our Parties daily gain advantages upon the French; The last we had an account of was from Charleroy. That on the 26th Instant a Detachment of that Garrison defeated a French Party of 200 Men, which came from *Emaine l'Enquele*, killing 30, and taking 15 Prisoners. Another Detachment of the same Garrison being sent out upon advice that there lay a French Party in ambush, in order to seize upon the French Deserters which the Governor of Charleroy was sending under a Convoy hither, they found the Enemy at the place they had notice of, and falling upon them, though exceeding their number, quite routed them, and returned with several Prisoners.

Brussels, July 1. The Designs of the Campaign being concerted between the Confederate Princes at the late Meeting at Frankfurt, their several Forces are now going to enter upon Action; which the Elector of Brandenburg has begun with the taking of *Keyserwart*; His Electoral Highness sent on the 27th past a Detachment of Horse towards *Bonne*, whither his heavy Cannon and Mortars were to pass by Water. Yesterday the Dutch Army commanded by Prince Waldecke decamped from *Judoigne*, and marched to *Perwez*, and Encamped this day at *Peras*, from whence they will advance to enter into the Country between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*. The Marshal d'Humieres arrived the 25th from *Pieton*; and we hear he was Encamped yesterday with his Army on the *Hayne* near *Barch*. The Bridge de *Houdemont* having passed the *Lys* at *Doyse* in *Flanders*, with 3000 Horse and 2000 Foot of the Spanish Troops, and being joined on the other side of that River by the Count de *Horne* with 5000 Dutch Foot, they marched to *Harleke* near *Courtray* to attack the French Forces that were posted on that side, but Monsieur *Casas*, who commands them, did not think fit to keep his ground, but retired with all the haste he could; and in some disorder behind the Line which the French have made from the *Lys* to the *Schelde*, between *Menin* and *Poys* *Esperes*; where he has been since reinforced with a Detachment from the Marshal d'Humieres's Army. Our Governor General has thereupon likewise ordered several other Troops to join the Prince de *Houdemont*, who will attempt to force Monsieur *Casas* from his Post, in order to put the Country about *Lille*, *Courtray*, and *Ipres* under Contribution. The French Soldiers continue to desert beyond what was ever heard of; These pass not a day that they do not come hither or to some other of our Garrisons in considerable numbers, notwithstanding all the Endeavours of the French Officers to prevent it, who have caught some hundreds to be Hang'd that were taken as they were endeavouring to get away.

Paris, July 6. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg* arrived here the 28th past, and went the next day to *Versailles*. The Troops that were quartered in *Provence* and *Dauphine* are marching to join the Duke de *Noailles* in *Catalonia*, where, it is said, the City of *Rosès* is besieged by Sea and Land. We have advice, that the Swiss Cantons have at their last Meeting resolved to maintain their Treaty of Neutrality. The Pope's Nuncio is upon his departure from *Rome*. We hear that the Duke of *Lorraine* has besieged *Mout-Royal*; And that the Army commanded by the Marshal d'Humieres in *Flanders* hath suffered very much by a great Tempest, accompanied with such violent Rains and Floods, that divers Persons had perished, and the Marshal himself was in great danger of being drowned. The Count de *Galle* is gone from hence for *Ireland*, to command the new Lieutenant General.

Plimouth, June 24. This day came into this Port. Their Majesties Ship the *Greenwich* with 3 Prizes. And the Industry of this place from *Virginia*.

Weymouth, June 25. Yesterday came into *Portland-Road* 3 Merchant Ships from *Virginia*, the rest of their Company, having been in all 29 Sail, being gone for *Arrival* and other Places. They met on Friday last Their Majesties Fleet off of *Islip*, about six Leagues to the South-west.

Doyle, June 28. The *Firelight*, the *Salter Rose*, and the *Shaker Key* are come into the *Down*.
