EUROPEAN COMMISSION OF THE DANUBE.

MODIFICATION OF ANNEX B OF PUBLIC ACT RELATING TO THE NAVIGATION OF THE MOUTHS OF THE DANUBE.

Tariff of Navigation Dues to be levied at the Mouth of Sulina.

THE European Commission of the Danube decided, at its Meeting at Galatz, on the 18th of November, 1878, to abolish, from and after the 1st of January, 1879, Articles 2 and 3 of the above-mentioned Tariff, and to adopt in lieu of them the following Articles :—

ART. 2.

Excepting in the case reserved by the penultimate paragraph of Art. 3 of the present tariff, every steam-vessel quitting the port of Sulina to put to sea, and having, according to its bills of lading or its manifest, a cargo equivalent to more than the third part of its tonnage, pays, per ton, a fixed navigation due, also determined according to the tonnage of the vessel and depth of the channel at the Sulina mouth.

ART. 3.

Every steam or sailing vessel must pay, on its first voyage to the Danube in each year, the full amount of the dues to which it is liable according to the Articles of the Tariff in force.

Every vessel which shall make a second voyage to the Danube in the same year will be allowed, on this second voyage, a reduction of 5 per cent. on the full dues above-mentioned.

Every vessel which shall make a third voyage during the same year will be allowed a reduction of 10 per cent. on the full dues above-mentioned; on the fourth voyage, of 15 per cent.; on the fifth, of 20 per cent., and so on; that is to say, for each voyage after the first, up to the seventeenth, an additional reduction of 5 per cent.

The mean reduction obtained on the seventeenth voyage will thus be 40 per cent., and this mean reduction will be applied to each subsequent voyage according to the following Table:—

The number of voyages of the vessels of public Companies effected periodically according to a time-bill published before hand, will not be reckoned by each voyage of a *single vessel*, but by "periodical voyage" of the Company.

Nevertheless, it is understood that in no case shall the taxes of vessels be reduced in such a manner as to exempt them from lighthouse and pilotage dues.

If, in the course of the year, the public Companies find it impossible to accomplish one or several voyages, in consequence of the interruption of the navigation of the Danube by some wholly other cause than that resulting from the effects of winter, they shall be allowed a proportionate reduction of tariff. This reduction shall be determined at the end of the year by the Navigation Cash Office in such a manner that the vessels of the Companies shall, for each voyage accomplished, enjoy the mean reduction of tariff by which they would have benefited during the same season under the ordinary conditions of the navigation.

Moreover, the above enactments of the present Article are not applicable to the steamers mentioned in the following paragraph :—

Paddle-wheel steamers not having more than ten English feet draught of water when fully laden, belonging to a public company, specially destined to the transport of passengers, and to a regular postal service, and consequently effecting periodical voyages according to a time-bill published beforehand, only pay on leaving the river a fixed due of sixty centimes per ton ; but this due is always levied on the whole of the taxable tonnage, without taking account of the proportion of cargo.

These vessels are moreover freed from all duty on their entry into the river.

B.—LIABILITIES OF THE COMMISSION.

The liabilities of the Commission comprised on the 31st December, 1877, the following debts:—

1. The unpaid balance of the loan concluded with the house of Bischoffsheim and Goldschmidt.
2. The amounts due to Turkey on account of the advances made by her up to 1863, and on account current.

1.—*The Bischoffsheim and Goldschmidt 4 per Cent. Loan.*

The loan of £135,000, concluded with this bank in 1868, is repayable in annuities, whereof the total, including the interests, amounts to £170,901 $\frac{4}{100}$. By the payment of £86,400, effected in 1871, 1872, 1873, 1874, 1875, and 1876, this debt was reduced to £84,501 $\frac{52}{100}$, viz. :—

2.—*The Debt to the Sublime Porte.*

The total of this debt amounted on the 31st of December, 1877, to fcs. 4,310,964·67 consisting of—

1. The principal capital of 3,739,540 francs, producing interest at 4 per cent. per annum from the 1st of January, 1871.

2. And of the balance of 571,424 francs 67 cts., which results from the account-current kept separately. This account is credited with the interest produced by the principal capital, and is debited with the payments made by the Commission on account of the Ottoman Government, such as the salaries of the Officials of the General Inspection of the Navigation at Toultscha, and of the Port Office at Sulina, &c., &c.

The principal capital is repayable by annuities of 180,000 francs at least, to be met half-yearly, commencing from the 30th June, 1883.

The balance of the account-current is to be liquidated on the same terms, after the complete amortization of the principal debt.

At the Court at *Osborne House, Isle of Wight*, the 30th day of December, 1878.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a report of the Right Honourable the Lords of a Committee of Council, dated the 27th of December, 1878, in the words following, viz. :—

"Your Majesty having been pleased by your Order in Council of the 27th of November 1878, to refer unto this Committee the humble petition of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Oldham, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, in Council assembled, setting forth—

"That by virtue of an Act of Parliament passed in the thirty-second year of the reign of your Majesty (31 and 32 Victoria, chapter 130), known by the short title of "the Salford Hundred Court of Record Act, 1868," the Salford Hundred Court of Record was reconstituted, and the Court of Record for the city of Manchester was amalgamated with it.

"That the said Salford Hundred Court of Record has and exercises its jurisdiction (amongst other places), within the whole of the Municipal Borough of Oldham, which is in and forms part of the Hundred of Salford.

"That the actions within the jurisdiction and authority of the said Hundred Court are :—

"1. All personal actions (except for malicious prosecution), for sums not exceeding £50, provided, first, that the cause of action arose within the hundred; and secondly, that the title to no hereditament, toll, tithe, fair, market, or franchise is in question.

"2. Actions (in the nature of actions of ejectment), between landlord and tenant, for the recovery of possession of any house, land, or other corporeal hereditament, where the rent or annual value of the premises does not exceed £50; provided, first, that the premises of which possession is sought to be recovered are situate within the hundred; secondly, that no fine shall have been paid, reserved, or made payable in respect of such premises; and, thirdly, that the title to no hereditament, toll, tithe, fair, market, or franchise is in question.

"3. All actions whatsoever for any amount above £50 (except actions for libel, slander, or seduction for more than £50), provided a consent to the jurisdiction in the form given in the said Salford Hundred Court of Record Act be signed by the parties or their Solicitors, and filed with the Registrar of the Court at the time of sealing the writ of summons.

"That by the preamble of the statute made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the 9th and 10th years of your Majesty's reign, chapter 95 ("The County Court Act, 1846,") it is declared that it is expedient that one rule and manner of proceeding for the recovery of small debts and demands should prevail throughout England, and under the said Act a County Court was established for Lancashire, Circuit No. 5, and is holden within the borough of Oldham, and has jurisdiction throughout the whole of such borough.

"That the said County Court has cognizance of all actions within the jurisdiction and authority of the said Hundred Court, and it is expedient that the exercise of the jurisdiction of the said Hundred Court within the said borough of Oldham should be discontinued.

"That it is provided, by an Act passed in the 15th and 16th years of the reign of your Majesty "The County Court Act, 1852," that, upon the petition of the Council of any city or borough, within the limits of which a court of local jurisdiction, other than a County Court, is established, or into the limits of which the jurisdiction of such court of local jurisdiction shall extend, your Majesty may by Order in Council, declare the exclusion of such court of local jurisdiction throughout the whole or any part of the district assigned to the County Court.

"That the procedure of the said Hundred Court is dilatory, complicated, and expensive, as compared with the procedure of the County Court, which is prompt, simple, inexpensive, and effective.

"That the office of the Registrar of the said Hundred Court is at the Town Hall in the city of Manchester, and the Judge of the said Court holds his Courts at Manchester aforesaid, a distance of seven miles from the borough of Oldham.

"That, in consequence of the complicated nature of the procedure of the said Hundred Court, and the inconvenient distance at which the inhabitants of Oldham when sued, are obliged to transact business thereat, the said inhabitants are compelled to seek professional advice and assistance, and are otherwise put to great expense and trouble in insignificant actions, and the process of the said Court becomes oppressive; and particularly so in the case of the working classes, who are the people most frequently sued in the said Court for small debts.

"That in the report dated the 3rd of July, 1872, of the Commissioners appointed by your Majesty to enquire into the operation and effect of the constitution of the several Civil and Criminal Courts in England and Wales, the said Commissioners report to your Majesty as follows with regard to the abolition of local and inferior Courts :—

"We are satisfied that if the High Court and its branches or dependencies, the County Courts, are properly constituted with adequate machinery, and if increased facilities be given for the disposal by Judges of the superior branch of the Court of the more important causes in some of the larger centres of business, these exceptional and intermediate Courts will no longer be required.

"It is possible that this recommendation may meet with opposition from some of the powerful corporations interested in their maintenance.

"It will perhaps be said that they are self-supporting, and that they supply a local want.

"But there is great reason to believe that these Courts are frequented by a class of practitioners who get larger costs from them than they would from the County Courts, and many experienced attorneys—the most competent judges of their value—have made great complaint of them. Further, it must not be overlooked that, although these Courts may be self-supporting, yet they are so at the expense of the country in respect of the Superior and County Courts, to which the suitors would otherwise have recourse, and which they would then help to support. The existence of different Courts, with similar jurisdiction, competing for business by the offer of better costs, is in the highest degree objectionable. Further, we are of opinion that the appointment of all Judges should be vested in the Crown, and that no municipal or other body or person should derive profit

from the right to hold Courts of Justice. We therefore recommend the abolition of all local and inferior Courts of Civil Jurisdiction. If they did not exist no one would think of establishing them. No one now proposes to establish at Birmingham, for example, such a Court as the Lord Mayor's Court of London, the Court of Passage at Liverpool, or the Salford Hundred Court at Manchester.

"That the County Court at Oldham is amply sufficient to transact, in addition to its present business, the whole of the business which is now transacted in the said Hundred Court, so far as the Borough of Oldham is concerned, and the jurisdiction of the said Hundred Court within the said Borough is therefore unnecessary, and its continuance is not conducive to the proper Administration of Justice within the borough; and humbly praying, that it may please your Majesty, by and with the advice of your Majesty's Privy Council, by an Order in Council, to declare that the whole of the municipal borough of Oldham shall, from and after the date of such Order, be excluded from the jurisdiction of the said Salford Hundred Court of record, in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance, or that, by and with the advice aforesaid, your Majesty may make such other Order in the premises as to your Majesty shall seem meet.

"The Lords of the Committee in obedience to your Majesty's said Order of Reference have taken the said petition into consideration, and their Lordships do agree humbly to report to your Majesty as their opinion that from and after the first day of January, 1879, the whole of the municipal borough of Oldham ought to be excluded from the jurisdiction of the said Salford Hundred Court, in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance."

Her Majesty, having taken the said Report into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of January, 1879, the whole of the municipal borough of Oldham shall be excluded from the jurisdiction of the said Salford Hundred Court in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance; and the said Salford Hundred Court shall cease to exercise any jurisdiction within the limits of the said Municipal Borough of Oldham in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance. Whereof the Judge, officers of, the said Salford Hundred Court; and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand

eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate at Old Ford within the limits of the new parish of Saint Stephen, Old Ford, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Old Ford as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Stephen, Old Ford which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Old Ford as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul Old Ford.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul situate at Old Ford as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being, provided always, that so long as the Reverend Richard Parnell, the present vicar or incumbent, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Stephen, Old Ford shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Old Ford as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Richard Parnell, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference..

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul Old Ford, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Stephen Old Ford in the county of Middlesex and

THE following Statute made by the Governing Body of Worcester College, in the University of Oxford on the 8th day of October, 1878, and approved by the University of Oxford Commissioners on the 10th day of December, 1878, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Act 40 and 41 Victoria, cap. 48, entitled "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

"Whereas by the eleventh clause of 'The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877,' it is enacted that 'Until the end of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, the University and the Governing Body of a College shall have the like powers in all respects of making Statutes for the University or the College respectively, and of making Statutes for altering or repealing Statutes made by them as are from and after the end of that year conferred on the Commissioners by this Act; but every Statute so made shall before the end of that year be laid before the Commissioners, and the same, if approved before or after the end of that year by the Commissioners by writing under their seal; but not otherwise, shall, as regards the force and operation of the Statute, and as regards proceedings pre-

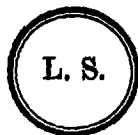
scribed by this Act to be taken respecting a Statute made by the Commissioners after (but not before) the Statute is made, be deemed to be a Statute made by the Commissioners.'

Provided that any such Fellow who shall cease to hold the office of Bursar shall thereby vacate his fellowship.

Order of Secretary of State defining an Attendance at School (England).

23. The parent of a child employed in a factory

or in a workshop shall cause that child to attend some recognised efficient school (which school may be selected by such parent), as follows:

- (1.) The child, when employed in a morning or afternoon set, shall in every week, during any part of which he is so employed, be caused to attend on each work day for at least one attendance; and
- (2.) The child, when employed on the alternate day system, shall on each work day preceding each day of employment in the factory or workshop, be caused to attend for at least two attendances:
- (3.) An attendance for the purposes of this section shall be an attendance as defined for the time being by a Secretary of State with the consent of the Education Department, and be between the hours of eight in the morning and six in the evening.

96. In England the expression "Education Department" means the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education.

Now, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, with the consent of the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education, hereby, for the purposes of the above enactment so far as concerns England, define "Attendance" to mean the attendance of a child at a morning or afternoon meeting of a school during not less than two hours of instruction in secular subjects.

Applications from persons supposing themselves entitled as Next of Kin should be addressed by letter to "The Under-Secretary of State, War Office, London, S.W.," and marked outside "Soldier's Effects."

No application can be attended to which does not state the date and place of the soldier's birth, enlistment, and death, and the name of his regiment; his regimental number should also be stated if known.

Should these particulars furnished by the applicant not agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased soldier, the applicant will be so informed; but should they agree therewith, then within three calendar months the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of the alleged relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the clergyman, or one of the churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace; the applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the notice in which the deceased soldier's name appeared.—EFFECTS, 1877-8.
