

diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Send with Ripley which is described in the said schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mary the Virgin situate at Ripley as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary Ripley.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Mary the Virgin situate at Ripley as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary Ripley, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Send with Ripley in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester which comprises the town or village of Ripley and the territory thereto adjacent all which said portion is bounded on part of the west by the parish of Woking on the north partly by the parish of Pyrford and partly by the parish of Ockham on the east partly by the last-named parish and partly by the parish of West Horsley on the south by the parish of East Clandon, all in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the remaining part of the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of East Clandon from the parish of Send with Ripley aforesaid at a point at the north-western corner of East Clandon Common in the middle of the stream or watercourse which flows from the fishponds on the said common past the eastern side of the hamlet of Sendmarsh and of the farm called or known as Homewood into the Ockham Mill-stream, and extending thence, that is from the said parish boundary, first northward, then westward and then again northward along the middle of the said stream or watercourse for a distance of nearly two miles (thereby passing under the London and Portsmouth road at the bridge called or known as Garlick's Arch) to the point where the same stream or watercourse is crossed by the public footpath leading from Rawridge Cottage past the northern side of the said hamlet of Sendmarsh into the lane leading from the said hamlet of Sendmarsh to Papercourt Farm and extending thence that is from the said watercourse westward along the middle of the said public footpath for a distance

of fifteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the lane leading from Sendmarsh to Papercourt Farm as aforesaid and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned lane for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to the point a little to the west of Papercourt Farm aforesaid where the same lane joins the road or lane leading from Pyrford to Send and called or known as Tannery otherwise Papercourt-lane, and extending thence first westward then southward and then again westward along the middle of the last-described road or lane for a distance of thirty-two chains or thereabouts to the point a little to the north-east of the buildings called or known as Send Tannery where the same road or lane is joined by the road or footway leading to Woking and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-described road or footway for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same road or footway over the canal called or known as the River Wey Navigation and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts thereby passing through Papercourt Lock to the boundary at the junction of the same canal with the River Wey which boundary divides the said parish of Send-with-Ripley from the parish of Woking aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

THE following Statute made by the Governing Body of Worcester College, in the University of Oxford on the 8th day of October, 1878, and approved by the University of Oxford Commissioners on the 10th day of December, 1878, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Act 40 and 41 Victoria, cap. 48, entitled "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

"Whereas by the eleventh clause of 'The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877,' it is enacted that 'Until the end of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, the University and the Governing Body of a College shall have the like powers in all respects of making Statutes for the University or the College respectively, and of making Statutes for altering or repealing Statutes made by them as are from and after the end of that year conferred on the Commissioners by this Act; but every Statute so made shall before the end of that year be laid before the Commissioners, and the same, if approved before or after the end of that year by the Commissioners by writing under their seal; but not otherwise, shall, as regards the force and operation of the Statute, and as regards proceedings pre-
