WHITFORD.—Forthwith wholly in Whitford Church, in the county of Flint; and in the old part of the churchyard, except in existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except for the burial of the widowers and widows of those already interred therein in earthen graves which are free from water, and which can be opened to the depth of four feet without the exposure of coffins.

HONITON.—Forthwith wholly in Honiton Church.

SHAFTESBURY.—Forthwith wholly in or under the church at Shaftesbury; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins, and which are free from water.

SIDBURY.—Forthwith wholly in Sidbury Church, in the county of Devon; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except also in earthen graves not less than five feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains.

CHISLEDON.—Forthwith wholly in Chisledon Church, in the county of Wilts; and in the churchyard, except in existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

LLANAEHLAIARN.—Forthwith wholly in Llanaelhaiarn Church, in the county of Carnarvon.

LLANBEDROG.—Forthwith wholly in Llanbedrog Church, in the county of Carnarvon; and in the churchyard, except for the burial of members of the families of those who have already been buried therein; and that burial within three yards of any dwelling be wholly discontinued.

LLANNOR.—Forthwith wholly in Llannor Church, in the county of Carnarvon.

NEVIN.—Forthwith wholly in Nevin Church, in the county of Carnarvon; and in the churchyard, except for the burial of members of the families of those who have already been buried therein; and that burial within three yards of any dwelling be wholly discontinued.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-fourth day of March next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-fourth day of March.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1878,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878.

2. This Order extends to Great Britain only.

3. Article 13 of The Foreign Animals Order is hereby revoked as far as it relates to cattle brought from the United States of America and declares that the same may be landed without being subject under the Act of 1878 or under that Order to slaughter or to quarantine.
