THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Koenigsberg reporting that the precautionary measures taken in Germany on account of plague in Russia have been modified to some extent in favour of persons living near the borders of the two countries, so that persons furnished with two days' passport cards are allowed to cross the frontier. In cases of doubt as to the correctness of the passport cards the bearers are sent back. On the arrival of trains from Russia at the border, passports are examined in the Russian coupés, and only those persons are allowed to pass on to the German Custom-house revision saloon whose passports have the visa of a German Consular official. All other persons, without regard to nationality, are sent back to Russia.

The Consul adds that considerable quantities of grain and flax have lately passed the frontiers from Russia to the interior of Germany.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Notice issued by the Danish Government, prescribing further measures of precaution in consequence of the plague in Russia. The following is a translation of the Notice in question:—

PUBLIC NOTICE.

Referring to the Plague Quarantine Law, passed on the 18th of February last, and to the Notice in connection therewith, issued the day following, prohibiting the importation from Russi a of sundry specified articles, the present Supplementary Notice is now published, together with rules for putting in force the prohibition in question.

Sec. 1. To the list of prohibited goods from Russia shall be added "wool," when not cleansed

at the place of manufacture.

Sec. 2. The Quarantine Inspectors shall see that every shipmaster coming from a Russian port, shall have put to him (besides the questions required by Sec. 7 of the Law of 8th February, 1805,) the questions, "If he has on board any of the prohibited articles specified in the Notice of the 19th February, 1879," and "If the ship is provided with the certificate" (Bill of Health) mentioned in that Notice.

Shipmasters coming from other foreign ports, shall be questioned as to whether on the journey they have received on board any of the abovementioned articles from ships cleared out from Russian ports.

Sec. 3. The certificate referred to in Sec. 2 shall specially mention every person it includes.

Sec. 4. Ships entering Danish jurisdiction, and having on board any of the prohibitited articles scheduled in the Notice of 19th February of this year, shall not be permitted to land them without the special permission of the Quarantine Inspectors; neither, shall any person or persons be permitted to land until their wearing apparel and luggage are thoroughly disinfected.

The necessity of disinfection does not apply to pilots and persons who for short periods, and under the supervision of the Quarantine Inspectors, have

been in communication with such ships.

Sec. 5. In stranding casualties, and cases where goods and wreckage are cast on shore, when no proof exists that they (the vessel and goods) do not come under the prohibition of importation from Russia, the above rules are to be followed, with due regard, however, to the necessities of each case, and to the saving of life.

But in no case shall any part of the salvage property, consisting of prohibited articles, be landed; but if they cannot, without assistance from ashore, be got rid of, they shall be destroyed, without any compensation being allowed.
