Where he was Honourably received according to His Dignity and Character, and entertain'd at Dinner by His Majesties Officers with extraordinary Magnificence in an appartment allotted for that purpose in the Old Castle ; which chied. the Sieur de l'oncuel, Introductor to Ambassadors, with the Court de Armagnac, attended the Legate, and conducted him to his Audience through a double Rank of the Swi.s Guards which were placed along the stairs by which he was to pals, where the Sieur de Saintot, Master of the Ceremonies, receiving him, lead him into the Hall, at the door whereof flood the Duke de Noailles, who conducted him through the Guhrds of the Body to the door of His Majesties Chamber: where at his Entry he was with much kin neis received by His Majesty, and lead to the Cand-py of state, where a bear being set for him, they continued together in conference about a quarter of an hour, which ended, His Majetty accompanying him to the place where ho before received him, he was thence conducted to his Audi-Ence of the Queen and Dauphin, and thence attended back to his appartment in the fame Order.

The next day he was again entertained at Dinner as the H by before, which ending, two Areli-Bishops and to Bishops in their Habiss of Ceremony, conducted by the Sieur de Pinan assistant or aid of the Ceremonis, attended him, where the Arch-Bishop of Vienna complimented him in

the name of the Clergy,

The same day being designed for the Ceremony of the If sprisme of the Dauphin, all things were accordingly pre-pared in the Court of the O.d Cattle 3 where was erected a Scaffold of about thirty yards in length, and a breach p oportionable, whereon was placed a stately Altar, with Conveniencies and Tables for that Ceremony, and places for the Musick, all richly adorned and excellently well lighted. About one of the Click, the Clergy, the Ambalsadors, and the Chancellof of France, at the Head of the Conneil, with the Secretaries of State and several persons of Quality, took their Seats; as directed by the Aid of the Ceremonies: In the mean while Mademoifelle, Mademoifelle d'Orleans, Madame de Guife, the Princess de Conde, the Dutchels d' Enguyen, with the Prince de Conde, Duke d' Enguyen, Prince de Conti, and the Count de Clermont his Bro her, lead by the Master of the Ceremonies, went into the Chamber of the Dauphin 3 which was extraordinari ly richly hung and furnished ; where Madam iselle d' Orleans, and Madam de Guise taking up the Coverture of the Bed, Madamoiselle took up the Dauphin, the Dutchesse W Engiren distributing the following Honours, viz. the Towel to the Prince of Conde, the Balon and Ewer of Malfive Gold to the Duke d' Enguyen, the Salt and Chrysome to the Prince de Conti, and the Tapet to the Count de Clermons; then the Master of the Ceremonies were to attend thit her the Princels de Conti, who in that Ceremony supplied the room of the Que-n Mother of England, and afterwards the Cardinal Legate, on whom attended also the Sieur de Bounevill. All things being thus in readmess, they began to pass forwards in this Order, First marched the Archers of the Grand Provost, followed by the hundred Swiffes of his Myrefties Guards; then the Genelemen Waiters, with the Ordinary Attendants, and all the Heralds; after them came the Knights of the Order, in their Habits of Ceremony; then followed the Count de Clermons, Prince de Conti, Duke d'Enguyen, and Prince de Conde, bearing the Honours Before the Dauphin; who came between Monfieur on his right hand, and the Duke de Crequy on his left, as Chief Genuleman of his Chamber, his Train carried up by the Duke de Mercoeur, and immediately before him to young Lords, as Children of Honour trichly habited, after bira follow'd the Lady Marestat de la Mothe his Governels, and the Count d' Agen as Captain of the Guards, then the Cardinal Duke attenda ed on by his Officers, whereof one carried before him his Cross, and by his side the Princess of Consi, led by the Gount P. Arfs. followed by Madamoselle, led by the Che-Valier de la Roche Foutault, and behind her the Marquels de St. Chaiment her Governels ; then Midamolelle d'Orleans, led by the Master of her Horse; Medam de Gille by the Count de st. Mefme I the Princels de Conde by the Count de Luffan; and the Datchels d'Enguyen by the Count de Morcuil & then came the Prelates and Commanders of the Oriers; and after them the Guards of the body; in which Order they arrived at the Court of the Old Cattle, where there Majesties were ready scated expecting thems the Honours were by the Princes, who bare them, placed upon Tables p epared for them, and the Dauphin led to a place raited for him near the Font, when the Musick finging the Veni Creator, the Dauphin was presented at the Fone by the Duke de C'requy, and the Princels de Conde taking off his Cap, the Cardinal Antonio chief Almoner of France affisted by the Bishop of Orleans His Majesties principal Almorer, wi hawo Arc's Bishops and ha Bishops, performed the Ceremony of his Baptiline, the Cardinal Legare giving the name of Louis, which en e, they beturned in the same Order to the New Castle, where his Majelly gave them an ex raoidinary Supper, with Which they concluded that Evening!

The 25th inflant the Cardinal Duke de Vendofmet Levet 4 Latere, took his leave of their Majesties at St. Germains, having been conducted to his Audience by the Count d' Armagnac, and the cieur de Bonnevit, Introductor to Ambassadors, the next day the knows from Porsugal and the Elector of Mayence had severally Audience from His Maje-

fly with the usual Ceremonies.
