Whace he was Honourably received according to His Disnity and Elasater, and encertain'd at Dinner by His Majelties Oificers wih exusordinary Magnificence in an appartment allowed tor that purpofe in the Old Caltie; which ended, the Sikur de loncull, Introductor to Ambalfadors, wih the Cuunt de Armagnac, attended the Legate, and condustedtim to lis Ausience throusha double Rank of the Swi.s Guards which were placed along the ftairs by which he was copals, where the Sieur de saintot, Matter of the Ceremonies, accerving him, lead him into the Hall, at the door whereof Aood the Duke de Noaillis, who cenduted him through the Gidar.is ot the Body to the door of His Majefties Chamiver: vhere ar his Entry he was with much kin treis rectivea by His Majetty, and lead to the CandPy of flate, whete a' 1 air being fer for him, they coritinured together in conference about a quarter of an hou', "hich ended, His Majetly accompanying him to the place where ho Eefore received hirf, he was thende condufted to his Audience of the Queen apd Dauphin, and thence attended back to his appartmeat in the farne Order.

The next day he was again entertained at Difiner as the "tiy balote, h hich ending, two Arch-Biflops and 10 Bl hhops in their Habi;s of Ceremony, conducted by the Sieut Dhe Pinan afiftamt or aid of the Ceremoni s, attended him, awbere the Arch-Bifhop of Vionna complimented him in the name of the Clergy,

Prelares and Commanders of the Oriers $;$ and after them the Guands of the boly; in which Order they arrived ar the Court of the Old Callle, where theie Majefties were ready feated expeting them; the Honours were by the Princes, who bare them, placed upen Tables p epared for them, and the Dauphin led nos place raiced for limi near che Font, when the Mulick finging the Vcni Creator, the Dauphin was prefented at the Font by the Duke de c'requy, and the Piircefs de conde taking of his Cap, the Cardinal Ansonio chief Almoner of France affited by tle Bifhop of Orleans His Majefties principal Almo er, wi h two Arclr Buntops ind fix B: hoops, performed the Ceremony of his Bapuline, the Cardunal Legate giving the nante nf Louls, which on $t$, they fecurned in the lame Ordet to the New Caftle, where his Majelty gate them an ex raoudinary Supper, with which they concluded that Pvering
