(PORT OF WEYMOUTH.)

AT the *Council Chamber, Whitehall*, the 28th day of *April, 1879*.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Weymouth, in the county of Dorset, as a foreign animals quarantine station :

All that space in the occupation of the Great Western and the London and South-Western Railway Companies under an agreement with the Admiralty made the twenty-ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, together with the two lines of railway upon the same, and the archwork and arches upon which the High Level railway line is constructed, being a part of the premises known as Her Majesty's Breakwater and Landing-place, in the Island of Portland, in the county of Dorset, and situate on the north-east side of the Portland station, included within a line commencing at a point six hundred and thirty feet distant from the east end of the Breakwater, extending westward along the face of the sea eight hundred and ninety feet, then across the Breakwater a distance of sixty feet, then eastward a distance of three hundred and seventy feet, then in a north-easterly direction fifty feet, then further eastward one hundred and thirty-six feet, then in a south-easterly direction fifty feet, and then further eastward three hundred and ten feet, and then across the breakwater a distance of sixty feet to the point aforesaid, all which space is coloured yellow on the plan of the Portland Breakwater deposited for the purposes of this Order at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Dorset.

This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Christiania enclosing a translation of a Royal Resolution respecting quarantine in Norway, which is as follows :—

(Translation.)

Under date of 7th instant a Royal Resolution was issued to the following effect :—

The Royal Resolutions passed on the 10th of February and the 5th of March last, in pursuance of Sec. 2 of the Quarantine Law of July 12, 1848, providing that certain districts of Russia and Finland should be considered as infected with the oriental plague until further notice, are hereby abolished from this day.

With which all parties concerned have to comply.

Under same date it was most graciously enacted as follows :—

“In pursuance of law relative to precautionary measures for preventing the introduction of plague, passed on April 7, 1879, the following regulations are hereby put into force until further notice, in addition to the Quarantine Law of July 12, 1848 :—

Sec. 1. It shall be prohibited to import the articles specified below from all Russian and Finnish Ports, with the exception of those situated on the Arctic and White Sea :—

Worn linen, old bed clothes and garments, all sorts of rags, carding wool, waste paper, furs and similar articles, skins and hides, manufactured and unmanufactured, leather tanned and untanned, entrails of animals, fresh, dried, or salted, felt, hair, tallow, bristles, wool, if not artificially washed, feathers and down, fish and fish products, caviar, isinglass, sarepta balsam.

This prohibition does not affect articles of dress and luggage, which travellers arriving in this country carry with them for their personal use. Such articles, however, must be disinfected in
