By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The area described in Part I of the Schedule to this Order, being an area wherein is situate the place infected with foot-and-mouth disease described in Part II of that Schedule, is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Area Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

An area comprising the whole of the petty sessional division of Bottisham, and so much of the petty sessional division of Newmarket as lies to the north of the line of the Great Eastern Railway, both in the county of Cambridge, and also the detached portion of the petty sessional division of Wickhambrook, in the county of Suffolk, which is surrounded by the county of Cambridge.

PART II.

Place Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease situate within the foregoing Area.

A field, known by the name of Low Fen, in the parish of Horningsea, in the county of Cambridge.

Order of Council of 16 May, 1879, defining parts of the Port of Liverpool, in the county of Chester, as foreign animals wharves.

Order of Council of 4 July, 1879, defining a part of the Port of Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster, as a foreign animals wharf.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following parts of the port of Liverpool, in the counties of Chester and Lancaster, as foreign animals wharves :

(1.) All that space at the Wallasey Dock, in the borough of Birkenhead, and the township of Pooton-cum-Seacombe, in the county of Chester, situate on the east and the north sides of the said dock, bounded by a line commencing on the Wallasey landing-stage at a point seventy-eight feet or thereabouts from the south-east corner of the said stage, thence running in a westwardly direction thirty-six feet or thereabouts, thence in an angular direction northwardly two hundred and ten feet or thereabouts, thence westwardly two hundred and twenty feet or thereabouts along the south side of the north bridge connecting the said landing-stage with the river wall, thence running in a straight line northwardly six hundred and fifty feet or thereabouts, thence in a north-westwardly direction ninety feet or thereabouts to the south-east corner of certain cattle-pens, slaughter-houses
