PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty; from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and that within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette, such provisions shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and that any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time altered and annulled; and that in and by such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any orders or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied:

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that certain of the provisions of the said Act should be extended and applied to all the Courts of Record established under the provisions of "The County Courts Act, 1846," and also to the City of London Court of Record as constituted by "The County Courts Act, 1867."

"Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions contained in section thirteen of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," shall apply to the said Courts of Record in respect of any goods seized in execution by any High Bailiff or Bailiff of any of the said Courts of Record under process of such Courts.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct that the powers and duties incident to the above-mentioned provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," with respect to matters in the said Courts of Record, shall and may be exercised by the Judges of the said Courts respectively, or their respective deputies, and to order that the statutes, rules of practice, orders, and forms for the time being in force and used in the said Courts of Record shall be adopted with reference to proceedings had in such Courts under the above-mentioned pro-

visions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," so far as the same are applicable, mutatis mutandis. C. L. Pecl.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity situate within the limits of the parish of Emmanuel Loughborough in the county of Leicester and in the diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Emmanuel Loughborough and of the parish of Loughborough in the said county of Leicester and in the said diocese of Peterborough which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Emmanuel Loughborough, and of the said parish of Loughborough should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said
