And whereas it is expedient that the said Order be revoked:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the said Order in Council of the 26th day of February 1880 be, and the same is, hereby revoked.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such Power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being German subjects) who desert from British merchant ships in the territories belonging to His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Germany will be given under an Agreement between the Governments of Great Britain and Germany signed at London on the 5th November 1879:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the

powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the Emperor of Germany within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships; provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act," 1852, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is further pleased to order and declare that, upon and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, the Order in Council made, by virtue of the said Act, on the 16th day of October 1852, and published in the London Gazette on the 26th day of October 1852, so far as it relates to seamen who desert from merchant ships belonging to citizens of the Free Hanseatic Cities of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hamburg, and the Order in Council relating to seamen who desert from the merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of Prussia, made by virtue of the said Act, on the 16th day of October 1852, and published in the London Gazette on the 26th day of October 1852, and the Order in Council relating to seamen who desert from the merchant ships belonging to subjects of the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, made, by virtue of the said Act, on the 13th day of June 1853, and published in the London Gazette on the 14th day of June, 1853, and the Order in Council relating to seamen who desert from the merchant ships belonging to subjects of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, made, by virtue of the said Act, on the 9th day of March 1854, and published in the London Gazette on the 10th day of March 1854, and the Order in Council relating to seamen who desert from the merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of Hanover, made, by virtue of the said Act, on the 8th day of June 1854, and published in the London Gazette on the 13th day of June 1854, shall be revoked, and the same are hereby revoked accordingly.

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions hereint accordingly.

fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Great Ponton in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln between that benefice and two other benefices namely the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Martin and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Mary-le-Wigford each of which said two last-named benefices is situate in the city of Lincoln and in the said diocese of Lincoln.

“Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln is the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Great Ponton and also of each of the said two benefices of Saint Martin and Saint Mary-le-Wigford situate in the said city of Lincoln as aforesaid.

“And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Great Ponton is at present more than competently endowed and that the said two benefices of Saint Martin and Saint Mary-le-Wigford in the said city of Lincoln are at present insufficiently endowed.

“And whereas the Right Reverend Christopher Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln has represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provisions should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Saint Martin and within the parish of Saint Mary-le-Wigford in the said city of Lincoln by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Great Ponton which is hereinafter recommend and proposed.

“And whereas the said benefice of Great Ponton is now full.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Archbishop of Canterbury acting as Archbishop of the Province within which each of the said three benefices is situate and with the consent of the said Christopher Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln acting as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of each of the said three benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed this scheme and sealed the same with their several episcopal seals) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice of Great Ponton shall from whatsoever cause be next voided all the glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments now belonging to the said benefice of Great Ponton or which may hereafter belong to the same benefice shall be charged and for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbents for the time being of the said benefices of Saint Martin and Saint Mary-le-Wigford in the said city of Lincoln respectively with the annual sums or yearly charges hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Martin in the said city of Lincoln and a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Mary-le-Wigford in the same city the same annual sums or yearly charges of one hundred pounds and one hundred pounds respectively to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable, the one of them

to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Martin and the other of them to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary-le-Wigford respectively and each of the same annual sums or yearly charges to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the benefice in favour of which the same is charged as aforesaid or his representatives on the one hand and his successor in the same incumbency on the other hand, and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year and to be recoverable as against the person or persons who for the time being shall be beneficially entitled to the endowments of the said benefice of Great Ponton by action of debt.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

“And whereas the said district chapelry of Emmanuel Compton Gifford has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth

years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Emmanuel Compton Gifford should be altered by way of extension so that they shall include a portion of the parish of Saint Andrew Plymouth in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation, the boundaries of the said new parish of Emmanuel Compton Gifford shall be altered by way of extension, so that they shall include all that portion of the said parish of Saint Andrew Plymouth which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink, and that from and after the day of the same date and without any other assurance in law the said portion of the parish of Saint Andrew Plymouth so to be included as aforesaid shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Emmanuel Compton Gifford.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Emmanuel Compton Gifford in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Andrew Plymouth in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which said portion of such parish (comprising a part of the tithing of Compton Gifford) is bounded on the east by the said new parish of Emmanuel Compton Gifford or in other words by the Tavistock-road on the south-east and on the south by the new parish of Christ Church Plymouth in the county and diocese aforesaid or in other words partly by the line of the South Devon Railway and partly by the Saltash-road leading from Plymouth to Milehouse on the west by the parish of Stoke Damerel in the county and diocese aforesaid and on all other sides that is to say on the north-west and on the north by that portion of the said parish of Saint Andrew Plymouth which is comprised within the limits of the tithing or chapelry of Western Peverell otherwise called Penycross."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and such patrons

and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Christ Church Erith has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Erith should be altered by way of extension so that they shall include a part of the parish of Crayford in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying

"All that part of the parish of Crayford in the county and diocese aforesaid which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary dividing the said parish of Crayford from the new parish of Christ Church Erith aforesaid crosses the middle of the North Kent Line of the South Eastern Railway and extending thence south-westward along the said boundary for a distance of forty-four and a-half chains or thereabouts to the point where it strikes the northern side of Colyer's-lane and extending thence first southward to and then south-eastward and eastward along the middle of such lane for a distance of thirty-four chains and a-half or thereabouts to its junction with the Crayford-road and extending thence northward along the middle of such road for a distance of five and a-half chains or thereabouts to the point where it is joined by Stadesgreen-lane and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of nineteen and a-half chains or thereabouts to the point at Northend Crossing, where the said lane crosses the middle of the North Kent Line of the South-Eastern Railway aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the first-described point on the boundary which divides the said parish of Crayford from the said new parish of Christ Church Erith as aforesaid."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Dunstan situate at East Acton in the parish of Acton in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Dunstan situate at East Acton aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Acton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Dunstan situate at East Acton as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Dunstan East Acton.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Dunstan situate at East Acton as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.
