

(e.) Fishing vessels and open boats shall not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if they desire to do so.

(f.) The lights mentioned in this Article are substituted for those mentioned in the 12th, 13th, and 14th Articles of the Convention between France and England scheduled to the British Sea Fisheries Act, 1868.

(g.) All lights required by this Article, except side lights, shall be in globular lanterns so constructed as to show all round the horizon.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the operation of the said recited Article numbered 10 of the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, shall be suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and that, in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the recited Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the operation of the said recited Article numbered 10 of the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, shall be suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and that in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the said recited Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Bishoprics Act 1878 the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England on the 18th day of March 1880 certified to Her Majesty under their common seal that the annual value of the Liverpool Bishopric Endowment Fund together with the annual sum which will ultimately be derived in pursuance of the hereinbefore mentioned Act from the endowment or income of the Bishopric of Chester was not less than three thousand pounds a year and that contributions to that fund sufficient to raise the same annual value within five years from the date of the same Certificate up to three thousand five hundred pounds a year had been guaranteed to the satisfaction of the Commissioners.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, Her Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, to order and declare as follows:—

1. The Bishopric of Liverpool is hereby founded.

2. The diocese of the said bishopric shall consist of the West Derby Hundred of the county of Lancaster, with the exception of so much of the said hundred as is now in the diocese of Man-

chester, and to include the whole of the ancient parish of Wigan as provided in the schedule to the before mentioned Act.

3. The parish church of St. Peter, in Liverpool in the county of Lancaster subject to the rights of the patron and incumbent thereof, is assigned as a Cathedral Church to the said bishopric.

4. The Bishop of Liverpool is constituted a body corporate and is hereby invested with all such rights, privileges, and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other bishop in England and is subjected to the metropolitan jurisdiction of the Archbishop of York.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the publication of the same in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the township of Chelford in the parish of Prestbury in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Prestbury and of the antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior in the parish of Rostherne in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of the said parish of Prestbury and of the said antient chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Prestbury and of the said antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the township of Chelford as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester as such Bishop, with the consent of Charles Richard Banastre Legh of Adlington Hall near Macclesfield in the said county of Chester Esquire, the patron of the vicarage of
