

time being acting for and on behalf of your Majesty and your heirs and successors in right of the Crown in exchange for the advowson of Sherborne aforesaid which said last-named advowson will by such Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid be as from the day aforesaid transferred as contemplated by the present scheme.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Benjamin Earl of Beaconsfield as such First Commissioner of your Majesty’s Treasury as aforesaid (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and the said duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage nomination and presentation of and to the said vicarage of Sherborne in the county of Dorset and diocese of Salisbury and the church thereof shall be assigned and transferred from your Majesty and your heirs and successors to and shall become and thenceforth be absolutely vested in the said Richard Baker Wingfield Baker and his heirs

nevertheless to the uses upon the trusts and to and for the ends intents and purposes and with under and subject to the powers provisoes and declarations by and in the said indenture of the twenty-third day of December one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two by reference to the said recited will of the said Earl Digby and the said first codicil thereto limited declared and contained concerning (amongst other hereditaments) the said advowson donation and perpetual right of patronage of and to the rectory of Mappowder aforesaid or to upon and for such of the same uses trusts ends intents purposes powers provisoes and declarations as are now subsisting and capable of taking effect in exchange for the perpetual advowson donation and right of patronage nomination and presentation of and to the said rectory of Mappowder as from the same day to be conveyed to the use of your Majesty and your heirs and successors for ever as aforesaid to the end and intent that the said last-mentioned right of patronage nomination and presentation may from time to time and and at all times be exercised by the said Benjamin Earl of Beaconsfield or other the First Commissioner of your Majesty’s Treasury for the time being for and on behalf of your Majesty and your heirs and successors as aforesaid.”
