TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The Noblemen and Gentleman who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish of Tynemouth Priory in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Durham and out of the new parish of Cullercoats, Tynemouth, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Tynemouth Priory and of the said new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas by a certain deed bearing date the thirty-first day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856,' or some or one of and being under the hand and seal of the Most Noble Algernon George Duke of Northumberland and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England which said deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said Algernon George Duke of Northumberland did grant and convey unto the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district so soon as a minister or incumbent shall have been appointed and licensed thereto and so soon as such district shall under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act have become a new parish then to the incumbent of such new parish and to their successors the ministers or incumbents of the said district or new parish for the time being one clear yearly rent-charge of one hundred pounds sterling to be issuing and payable out of and charged upon certain messuages, pieces or parcels of land and hereditaments situate in the parish of Lesbury in the said county of Northumberland which are particularly described in the schedule annexed to the said deed and are also delineated upon a map or plan drawn upon and forming part of the same deed.

"And whereas the said rent-charge or annual sum of one hundred pounds has been so granted and conveyed as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district when he shall have been duly licensed as aforesaid or as the case may be, of the said new parish, a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding and condition that such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or as the case may be of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us

under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Tynemouth Priory and of the said new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth which are described in the schedule hereunder written (all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed) shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint George Cullercoats.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Algernon George Duke of Northumberland his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint George Cullercoats being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Tynemouth Priory in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Durham which is bounded on the east partly by the eastern boundary of the said new parish upon the seashore, and partly by the new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the north by the last-named new parish and upon all other sides that is to say on the south-west and on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth from the new parish of Tynemouth Priory aforesaid at a point at Marden in the middle of the road leading from Whitley to Tynemouth and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of sixty-five chains or thereabouts to the angle where the same road bends sharply towards the south-west, at which angle a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. G. D. 1880, No. 1' has been placed on the eastern side of the same road and continuing thence still south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts thereby passing close to the south-western side of Kennersdean House to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. G. D. 1880, No. 2' and placed at the point where the footpath leading from Cullercoats past the eastern side of Kenners-

dean House into the road leading from Whitley to Tynemouth aforesaid is joined by the footpath leading across Percy Park Tynemouth into Percy Park-road and continuing thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Percy Park-road aforesaid and with the road leading past the houses called or known respectively as Prudhoe-terrace and as Lovaine-row and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Front-street into Percy-gardens and continuing thence still eastward and in a direct line, thereby passing along the northern side of Rock-Cottage and crossing the Short Sands, to the eastern boundary of the said new parish of Tynemouth Priory upon the seashore as aforesaid and also all that contiguous portion of the new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth aforesaid which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the main body of the township of Cullercoats."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbents of the said new parishes of Tynemouth Priory and Cullercoats Tynemouth out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and whereas the patron of the said new parishes of Tynemouth Priory and Cullercoats, Tynemouth and the incumbent of the said new parish of Cullercoats Tynemouth have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme and the incumbent of the said new parish of Tynemouth Priory has offered certain objections to the same scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has notwithstanding such objections been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of

the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Jude situate within the limits of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham, of the district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene, Peckham, in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the particular district of Christ Church, Camberwell in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such consolidated chapelry, district parish, and particular district, respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham, of the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham, and of the said particular district of Christ Church Camberwell should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Jude situate within the limits of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester as such Bishop, with the consent of the Reverend John Richardson Clerk in Holy Orders incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the particular district of Camden (out of which said particular district the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham aforesaid was partly taken) and as such incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham with the consent of John Smith of Sunny-road Addlestone in the said county of Surrey Esquire the patron of the vicarage or incumbency of the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham, and with the consents of Samuel Husband Beckles of the Middle Temple in the city of London Barrister-at-Law, of the Reverend Edward Auriol Clerk in Holy Orders, Rector of the rectory of Saint Dunstan-in-the-West in the said city of London, of the Reverend Charles Frederick Chase, Clerk in Holy Orders, Rector of the rectory of the united benefices of Saint Andrew-by-the-Wardrobe and Saint Anne Blackfriars in the same city, of the Reverend William Cadman Clerk in Holy Orders Rector of the rectory of Holy Trinity, Marylebone in the county of Middlesex, and of John Martin of New-square Lincoln's-inn in the said county of Middlesex Gentleman, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Christ Church Camberwell (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham, of the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham, and of the said particular district of Christ Church, Camberwell which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto

annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Jude situate within the limits of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Jude Peckham.'

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Jude Peckham being :—

All those several contiguous portions of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham, of the district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham and of the particular district of Christ Church Camberwell all in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester which said portions of, such cures are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham aforesaid at the point where Meeting House-lane is joined by Shards-road and by Park-lane and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lower Park-road and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts (thereby following for a short distance the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Peckham from the particular district of Christ Church Camberwell aforesaid) to the junction of the said Lower Park-road with Commercial-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eight and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Naylor-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nearly three chains to a point opposite to the middle of the passage or opening between the houses called or known respectively as number 33 Naylor-road and number 35 Naylor-road and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby passing between the said houses) to the wall which forms the south-western boundary of the buildings and premises called or known as the Licensed Victuallers' Asylum and extending thence south-eastward along the said wall for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-eastern boundary of the said buildings and premises and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described wall for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the south-western side of Asylum-road and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the last-named road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the same road for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern side of the building and premises called or known as Christ Church National Schools upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Christ Church Camberwell from the district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward then northward then again north-eastward and then generally south-

eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby passing in rear of certain houses on the eastern side of the said Asylum-road, of certain houses on the southern side of Gervaise-street formerly called George-street, and of certain houses on the south-western side of the Old Kent-road, and crossing the line of the South London Railway) to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham from the new parish of All Saints Hatcham Park situate partly in the said county of Surrey and partly in the county of Kent and wholly in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then eastward for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts along the last-described boundary (which is also the original boundary between the parish of Camberwell and the parish of Saint Paul Deptford) to a point at the south-eastern angle of the house called or known as No. 1 Oak-cottages Juniper-court, Pomeroy-street, and extending thence south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts (thereby passing between the house known as No. 114 Astbury-road on the one hand and the house known as No. 1 Colls-road on the other hand) to a point in the middle of the eastern end of the said Astbury-road at its junction with the northern end of Colls-road aforesaid and extending thence first westward and then southward along the middle of the said Astbury-road for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to its junction with Queen's-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts (thereby again crossing the line of the South London Railway aforesaid) to the point where the same road is joined by the road called or known as Carlton-grove and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Shards-road aforesaid and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the first-described point upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Mary Magdalene Peckham from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Peckham aforesaid where Meeting House-lane is joined by Shards-road and by Park-lane as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Simon situate in the Rockley-road in the new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith and of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Simon situate in the Rockley-road as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London, with the consents of John Derby Allcroft of Number 108 Lancaster-gate in the said county of Middlesex Esquire a Member of the Commons House of Parliament, and of William Bird of Bute House, Hammersmith in the said county of Middlesex Esquire the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith, and with the consent of the Reverend John Hampden Snowden the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Hammersmith (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith, and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Simon situate in the Rockley-road as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith.'

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises

into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Simon, Hammersmith being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the same county and diocese which said portions of such new parishes are together comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the district parish of Saint Stephen Hammersmith in the said county and diocese from the new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith aforesaid at the point in the middle of Goldhawke-road at its junction with Richmond-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Netherwood-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to a point at the junction of the said last-named road with Shepherd's Bush road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith aforesaid and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following the middle of the said Shepherd's Bush road, to its junction with the road called or known as Batoum-gardens and extending thence from the said boundary westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its present western extremity and continuing thence still westward and in a direct line for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the Hammersmith and City Railway and extending thence northward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to a point at the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over Goldhawke-road aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith from the district parish of Saint Stephen Hammersmith aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following the middle of the said Goldhawke-road, to the point at the junction of the last-named road with Shepherd's Bush road aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Stephen Hammersmith from the new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty chains and a half or thereabouts (thereby passing along the southern side of Shepherd's Bush Common, and continuing to follow the middle of the said Goldhawke-road) to the first-described point at the junction of the last-named road with Richmond-road as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her

said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
