PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

THE Marquis of Salisbury, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received the following Telegraphic Despatch from Mr. St. John, Her Majesty's Minister at Lima, dated April 14, 1880:—
"Callao blockaded."

Foreign Office, April 27, 1880.

HER Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from Her Majesty's Minister at Caracas, copies of two Decrees issued by the Venezuelan Government on the 10th and 23rd of February, translations of which are subjoined, ordering that, in consequence of disturbances in the State of Guayana, the Custom-house at Ciudad Bolivar should be abolished, and all trade prohibited with the Ports of the Orinoco:—

Translation.

I, Guzman Blanco, Illustrious American, Pacificator, Regenerator, and Provisional President of the Republic.

In view of the disturbances that have occurred in the State of Guayana, in consequence of the rising and the criminal proceeding that took place in Bolivar City on the 29th of last month; and in exercise of the authority granted to me by Article 3 of the Legislative Decree of 17th May, 1873,

DECREE:

ART. 1. The Custom House established in the Port of Bolivar City is abolished, consequently the import and export trade carried on by the Orinoco with foreign ports, as well as the coasting trade, cease.

ART. 2. The importations and exportations of the trade of Bolivar City are to be carried on by the Port of Guzman Blanco, and until the road which leads from Barcelona to Soledad, on the Orinoco, is made ready, the Port of Carispano is empowered, without restrictions, to serve for the same purposes.

ART. 3. Every boat bound for the Ports of the Orinoco shall be detained by the Government vessels appointed to cruise at the mouths of that river, and be taken to the nearest constituted port to have its cargo dealt with according to No. 2, Article 75, Law XVI of the Fiscal Code, and the other laws for the regulation of trade with foreign parts and the coast trade.

ART. 4. The provisions of the preceding article shall take effect fifteen days after the publication of this decree in the Official Gazette of this city, for vessels coming from the Antilla Islands, thirty days after for those which come from the United States of North America, and forty-five days for those coming from Europe.

ART. 5. At the expiration of these terms, which are granted in favour of importers, the said vessels shall be considered as smuggling boats, and as such shall be pursued and captured, and then be

taken to the nearest constituted port to be there tried in conformity with the existing fiscal laws.

ART. 6. National or foreign vessels found fitted out for warfare by the insurgents in the Orinoco, or in the vicinities thereof, shall be considered as pirates, and as such shall be pursued and captured, and be placed at the disposal of the Naval Station established in the Port of Carispano of the State of Cumana, by decree of this date.

ART. 7. The Minister of Finance is charged with the execution of this Decree, and with the communication thereof to the Consuls of the Republic abroad, and to the other authorities whom it may concern.

Given and signed with my hand in the Federal Palace of the Capital of Caracas, the 10th of February, 1880, sealed with the Great National Seal, and countersigned by the Minister of Finance.

In virtue of the powers with which I was invested by the last Congress of Plenipotentiaries, I decree—

ART. 1. In consequence of the armed revolt lately occurred in Ciudad Bolivar against the Commander of the National Forces in the State of Guayana, the navigation of the River Orinoco is forbidden, and all the coast in the vicinity of its mouth is blockaded.

ART. 2. A sufficient naval force will make this blockade effective.

ART. 3. The Commanders of the blockading vessels will act in conformity with the Ordinance of the 30th of May, 1822.

ART. 4. In the blockade above referred to the following rules will be observed:

1. For vessels proceeding from Europe this decree shall not take effect until forty-five days after its publication for sailing vessels, and fifteen for steamers. For those from the United States, until thirty days for sailing vessels and ten for steamers. Eight days for those coming from the West Indies, excepting from Trinidad and Caracas. In these two islands and in Demerara the blockade shall apply to vessels leaving at any time after the notification of it to the respective authorities. Whenever a vessel shall arrive from any of the above ports at the line of blockade, the commander of the nearest vessel of war shall desire it not to pass the line: should it insist on doing so, it will be considered as desiring to break the blockade.

2. All vessels above alluded to shall be informed by the Boarding Officers of the permission granted by the second case of the 75th Article of Law XVI of the Code of Finance now in force.

3. So soon as the periods fixed by the preceding Articles shall have expired, all vessels arriving at the line will be considered as already notified, and will be sent to the station at Carispano under guard, in order that the Government may determine on the course to be pursued on the report of the chief of the station.

ART. 5. The Minister of War and Marine is charged with the publication and execution of this Decree.

of the Code of Finance, alluded to in the 4th Article of this Decree, is as follows :

"Are excepted : Cargoes destined for a port in which public order is disturbed ; these shall be carried by the same vessel to the nearest port of entry and be introduced in the Custom-house with the formalities required by law until the owners shall make their wishes known. These latter can, if they please, enter them in the Custom-house for consumption, the permission of the National Executive having been first obtained. " R. BUNCH."

HIS Excellency the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication, for general information, of the following correspondence relating to the operations against the Naga Village of Konoma, on the 22nd day of November, 1879 :—

KONOMA DESPATCHES.

No. 238-B, *Fort William, February 23, 1880.*

From Colonel Allen Johnson, Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department, to Adjutant-General in India.

I AM directed to acknowledge your letter No. 1043, of the 22nd January last, forwarding reports relating to the operations against the Naga Village of Konoma, on the 22nd November, 1879.

2. In reply, I am to state that the Governor-General in Council cordially recognises the gallantry and devotion displayed by the officers and men in the capture of this formidable stronghold, and I am to request that, under the orders of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the thanks of the Government of India may be conveyed to them.

3. His Excellency in Council shares in the appreciation expressed by Brigadier-General Nation of the services rendered by Colonel Johnstone, Political Officer of Manipore, Captain Williamson, Inspector-General of Police, and Lieutenant Maxwell, Assistant-Commissioner, and I am to state that the acknowledgments of the Government of India will be communicated to them through the Civil Department.

From Major-General G. R. Greaves, C.B., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward, for submission to Government, the accompanying despatch* and annexures from Brigadier-General J. L. Nation, relating to the operations against the Naga Village of Konoma on the 22nd November, 1879.

2. In submitting these reports, it is his Excellency's most pleasing duty to bring to the notice of Government the gallantry and devotion displayed by the officers and men engaged under the immediate command of Brigadier-General Nation in the capture of this formidable stronghold.

3. The casualties on our side were heavy, and in addition to the loss of Lieutenant Forbes, attached to the 44th Native Infantry, on proba-

on for the Staff Corps, and so may brave men of the 43rd and 44th Native Infantry, the army has to deplore the death of a most gallant and excellent officer in Major Cock, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General ; but while lamenting this loss, the Commander-in-Chief feels that the capture of Konoma is well worthy of a prominent place in the long list of gallant deeds performed by the Native Army of India.

4. When the operations have been concluded, it will be his Excellency's duty to bring before Government the names of those who he considers should be rewarded for their conduct on this occasion.

5. Meanwhile Sir F. Haines has in separate communications submitted the recommendation of Brigadier-General Nation that the Victoria Cross be bestowed upon Lieutenant (now Captain) Ridgeway, and that one native officer, one non-commissioned officer, and three sepoy of the 44th Native Infantry, should receive the Order of Merit for conspicuous gallantry during the attack.

No. 16, *dated 29th November, 1879.*

From Brigadier-General J. L. Nation, Commanding Naga Expeditionary Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the result of my operations against the Angami Nagas of Konoma.

2. On the 22nd November, about 7 A.M., I marched from my camp with the force as per margin* under my command, and after a very difficult and toilsome march, especially for the guns, I arrived within a mile of the Konoma Hill about 11 A.M. (a distance of only about 6 miles from camp), and disposed the troops as follows.

3. The detachment of the 43rd Native Infantry, under Major Evans, accompanied by Captain Williamson, Inspector-General of Police, with 29 of the Frontier Police, was directed to take the right flank of the attack, keeping up the main valley well under cover, so as to threaten the rear and cut off the retreat. The 44th Native Infantry were ordered to form the front and left attack, and were disposed of by Colonel Nuttall, C.B., as follows :—2 companies skirmishing up the north-west face, 2 companies in support, and 1 company in reserve. Lieutenant Raban, R.E., with the rocket party, took up a position half-way up the Mozema Hill, with instructions to fire into and set the village on fire, while I myself went with the guns to a hill to the east of Konoma.

4. The attack was commenced by the rockets, all of which entirely failed owing to some injury in transit. At the same time the guns came into action, but the distance was too great for any effective practice ; still they did good service in allowing the infantry to advance under their fire. The 44th Native Infantry advanced with little molestation up the first portion of the hill, the Nagas keeping so quiet within their defences as to make one believe they were almost unoccupied ; but as they drew nearer, they could only advance by a narrow and tortuous lane and had to diminish their front, and were now met by a deadly fire in their more condensed formation from a series of stockades rising one above the other along the whole of the ridge (see Assistant Field-Engineer's

report on position and defences and Lieutenant Henderson's sketch attached). Position after position was stormed almost at the point of the bayonet by the 44th with the greatest gallantry. At about 2.30 P.M., the 44th were in possession of about one-third of the enemy's works. The guns, however, were too far off to render efficient assistance to the storming party, and as the nature of the ground left me no alternative but to use them at very long ranges or to bring them quite close, I moved them over to the village itself and got them into such a position as to enable them to deliver a fire at about 100 yards directly into the front breastworks, but they were too light to do much harm, as we could see the enemy repair any damage almost as quickly as it was done. Under cover of the fire one or two assaults were made gallantly, led by Colonel Nuttall, C.B., but were unsuccessful; and after a further continued artillery fire as evening was setting in and the guns were without ammunition, I determined on delivering a final assault and then closing operations for the day. This assault, again led by Colonel Nuttall, proved most fatal, and our loss in officers was the gallant Major Cock, my Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General, mortally wounded, Lieutenants Ridgeway and Forbes dangerously so, and the Subadar-Major and many of the flower of the native ranks of the 44th killed and wounded. As the losses of the storming party had now been unusually heavy—one-fourth of the whole engaged,—as the gun ammunition was exhausted, and as night was closing in, I determined to hold on to the ground we had gained, to entrench myself there, and to renew the attack in the morning. I accordingly called in the 43rd, who had captured a sunga in the rear of the enemy's position, and I made arrangements for getting more gun ammunition from Suchema. About 10 P.M. howls and yells were heard in the enemy's works and bursts of flames arose in their position, and I anxiously awaited an assault, or else concluded that they were evacuating their stronghold; about 12 o'clock all was silence. At dawn I sent out a few scouts to reconnoitre, and as these men gradually advanced without molestation, others followed, and it was evident that the enemy under cover of the great conflagration had evacuated their position during the night, and effected their escape to the upper heights of the Bural Mountains some 8,500 feet, where they had previously erected similar works to those at Konoma, but where I have not thought it necessary to follow them, as I feel sure they must either perish from cold, starvation, and want of water, or else submit to our terms. Dead Nagas were lying all around, and men from friendly villages informed me that the enemy acknowledge a loss of over 70 killed and wounded, but I have reason to think that their losses were much heavier.

5. Could the assault have been delivered from the south, no doubt the work would have been easier, and greater damage inflicted by the guns; but as the enemy had other forts higher up the hill, the guns would have been placed between two fires, to say nothing of the very great difficulties to be encountered in getting them there, as the coolies carrying them would have had to pass through a very heavy musketry fire for over a mile. The valley through which the only route lay is terraced for cultivation, with drops from terrace to terrace of from three to eight feet, and is not more than 1,000 yards across at its widest point, and is thoroughly commanded by the village of Konoma on the one side, and on the other by mountain sides covered in parts with dense jungle which held Naga skirmishers.

6. Where all behaved with such extreme gallantry and self-devotion, it would be almost invidious to make distinctions, but I cannot help particularly mentioning the brave Colonel Nuttall, who was always the first to lead and the last to withdraw when an assault had been made; the late gallant and much lamented Major Cock and Lieutenant Ridgeway also behaved most gallantly, and the manner in which Lieutenant Mansel, R.A., assisted by his three bombardiers (John Watts, H. McAndrew, and Thomas Portman), served the guns brought up under the very walls of the enemy with little or no cover, elicited most deserved admiration from all.

7. To the Medical Staff, Deputy Surgeon-General DeRenzy, Surgeons O'Brien and Campbell, my best thanks are due, as they frequently had to perform their errand of mercy under heavy fire, and their arduous duties were most nobly and ably performed.

8. I cannot conclude this despatch without expressing my deep gratitude and indebtedness to the following Political Officers who accompanied the force, as in addition to their own duties they have on every occasion joined the troops in active operations and proved themselves thorough soldiers at heart.

Colonel Johnstone, Political Officer of Muni-pore, as his Excellency is already aware, relieved the beleagured garrison of Kohima with the Maharajah's troops. On my arrival at Suchema, he joined my camp and personally accompanied me throughout the operations against Konoma, providing and taking entire charge of the transport train for the carrying of the guns—a most arduous duty on the hills on which they had to act, and which he alone could have performed, as the men were Kookies brought by him from Muni-pore; the labour performed by these little hill-men was incredible and invaluable; two of them were wounded. Throughout the latter assault on the village, Colonel Johnstone was at my side and joined in the last attack, and when operations for the day were over, he volunteered to return to Suchema to bring up more gun ammunition for the next day's proceedings (our supply having been expended in the day's operations), which was a most dangerous duty, as the road might have been beset with Nagas. Colonel Johnstone's admirable arrangements for the supply of local transport have elicited the praise and thanks of every one, and I feel sure that his valuable services will not fail to receive the thanks of the Government.

Captain Williamson, Inspector-General of Police, also joined my camp with Colonel Johnstone, and from his personal knowledge of the country he has been of the greatest service to me. He further joined in the attack on Konoma, attaching himself to Major Evans' detachment with a small body of Frontier Police, and succeeded in harassing the rear of the enemy. He was the first who proposed returning to Suchema to bring up a fresh supply of gun ammunition; and he and Colonel Johnstone both did so at dawn the following morning.

Lieutenant Maxwell, Assistant Commissioner, has also been with my camp, but was not present at the assault on Konoma, owing to wounds he had received in the attack on Sephema; but his services have been most valuable.

9. I feel that a special tribute is due to the late gallant Major Cock, my Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, who was one of the bravest officers in our army, and as a staff-officer unsurpassed by any. His loss to me, both publicly and privately, is irremediable, and his melancholy death has cast a

gloom over the whole camp, and I am sure it will be participated by many through India.

From Lieutenant E. Raban R.E., Assistant Field Engineer Naga Hills Field Force, to the Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General Naga Hills Field Force.

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith a rough sketch plan* showing the defences of Konoma. I regret that I had neither the time nor the instruments necessary to enable me to make a regular survey of the position. Nothing but a very detailed survey would convey an adequate idea of the strength of the place.

2. The village of Konoma occupies a camel-backed hill at the end of a spur from the Burail Mountain Range. The position is extremely strong naturally, and the Nagas have shown wonderful ingenuity in improving, to the greatest possible extent, their natural advantages; the result was a position, which in the absence of guns of position, was simply impregnable from the north (the direction from which the attack was made) except to a determined assault. In point of fact, the very determined assault made under the Brigadier-General's own command failed to drive the Nagas from the main position, even after it had been shelled for several minutes at a range of about 100 yards by the 7-pr. mountain gun; and though the position would without doubt have been captured the next day, had the Nagas not evacuated it, the fact that it would have required two days to capture the place shows how strong it was.

3. The slopes of the hill-side being exceedingly steep, the houses of the village are built on terrace sites, half excavated in the hill and half built up with the spoil. The terraces are riveted with stone walls, which are often as high as 10 or 12 feet. Up the crest of the hill terraces are similarly cut wide enough to allow of one house being built on them, and the crest has thus become a series of long narrow steps bounded in some

places by the terracing at the sides, and at others by the steep slope of the hill.

4. The defences occupied the highest part of the hill, and extended some way down the camel-backed slope on each side. They were most carefully constructed, so that the interior of each could be commanded by the fire of the one above it.

5. The path of the assaulting column was closely confined to the crest by the very steep terracing and by most elaborately constructed entanglements and arrangements of pangies; and on the approach, thus confined, a very heavy fire was maintained from most carefully constructed loopholed defences. The loopholes were perfect examples of what they should be. It was impossible to fire in any but the right direction from many of them, and the men using them were entirely under cover.

6. The first portion of the regular defences (A) consisted of two houses on a terrace with a stone tower between them. On the stone tower had been constructed a lofty watch-tower of timber and stone. Nearly all the thatch had been removed from one house, and on the other it had been carefully covered with planks to render it bullet and fire proof. The approach to the terrace was by a very elaborate, covered, narrow spiral staircase (B), up which one man only could advance at a time. The height of the revetment of the terrace at the lowest part (near B) was about 10 feet, but a wall of stones, planks, and earth, about 6 feet high, had been constructed round the houses on top of the revetment, so that the effective height of wall as a protection from assault was about 16 feet. The front of the position was well flanked. This position was captured by the 44th Native Infantry, under Colonel Nuttall, C.B., comparatively early in the day by assault, through and over the staircase, I believe. No advance beyond this point was accomplished during the day, and it was occupied by the troops at night.

7. From A the position rises in a series of high terraces, the walls of which were carefully constructed and loopholed to the central post (C) at the top of the hill. Each terrace was thoroughly swept by the fire of the one above it, except just at the foot of the revetments which were sometimes not under fire. It was impossible to work round to the flanks to avoid the fire, as on the east the hillside was too steep, and was moreover enclosed by a stone wall, and on the west the ground was completely enclosed by the strong walls of planks and earth shown in the plan, which were too strong to be removed under fire without proper tools; moreover, the ground below the west wall was thickly set with pangies and entanglements, so that any advance there could only have been made at slowest possible pace under heavy fire.

8. The difficulty of the attack from A up-hill is shown by the fact that an assault delivered in the evening under the personal direction of the Brigadier-General and led by nine British officers failed even though the 7-pr. mountain gun had been shelling the first terrace (D) for several minutes from one of the houses at A. Had it succeeded, the troops would have found themselves on a terrace swept by fire from above, and it would have been necessary to push on the assault at once from terrace to terrace until the central post at C was captured; it is very doubtful whether there were enough officers and men present to allow of this being done, for three British officers fell in the unsuccessful assault.

9. From C the ground falls again to the south; here there were three defensible barricades on

three terraces, and the whole ground was thickly pangied and otherwise prepared with obstacles. The crest of the hill was very narrow here, and the ground was well under fire from the position C.

10. I find it difficult to express in words the strength of the whole position from the north. Even had the village and its paths been very much better known than they were, it would have been quite impossible for an attack from the north to have been made in any other way than it was, namely, by direct assault. It was absolutely necessary to advance up the carefully-defended and enclosed crest of the hill.

An attack from the south would have been far easier, but the plans of the Brigadier-General did not, I believe, allow of this. The mountain guns could have been used with much effect from the slopes of the mountain spur overlooking Konoma, and the troops might have advanced under their fire.

I may add that the Nagas had carefully burnt many houses, and taken the roofs off others, so as to give a clear field of fire and to prevent their being burnt or smoked out.

From Brigadier-General J. L. Nation, Commanding Naga Expeditionary Force, to the Quarter-master-General in India.

IN forwarding my despatch on the operations against the Naga village of Konoma, I think it is as well to append a few explanatory notes of the state of affairs for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, to be placed before Government, should he approve.

The village of Konoma has always been considered the most formidable, both as regards position, number of muskets, and fighting powers, among the Angami Nagas, and this mountain fastness looked upon as impregnable. Under these conditions, they lorded it over all the surrounding smaller villages, who are all more or less bound to assist them in their forays and misdeeds.

On the murder of Mr. Damant, our Political Officer, all the smaller adjoining villages were, of course, considered bound to join the Konoma people in cutting off and murdering the fugitives, as also in assisting in beleaguering our garrison at the district head-quarters at Kohima. From the moment of the relief of this garrison by Colonel Johnstone from Muni-pore, if not at an earlier date, it is presumed that the already formidable works at Konoma were put into a still more defensible state, till they were looked upon by them as actually beyond our powers of capture, and so certain must they have felt on this point, that no endeavour had been made to conceal or remove this season's rice, which to some thousands of maunds we found and captured in the village.

As our troops advanced into the country, and they (rebels) were frustrated in the capture of Kohima, all the fighting men, or "young braves," as they are called, of every offending village, retired to Konoma, where the great trial of our strength was to take place, and it is estimated that there were some 3,000 men, 600 or 700 of whom were armed with firearms of kinds, and the rest with spears, war dous, &c.

A description of the works of Konoma has been so fully given by Lieutenant Raban, R.E., attached to the force, that I consider it unnecessary to repeat it here; and as there is no other village in the Angami Naga country which can in any way approach Konoma in its defences, I have no hesitation in saying that I consider any great

armed opposition to our troops as being improbable, and the moral effect of our assault and capture of Konoma is already beginning to tell on the country. Of course, as in all savage warfare, our convoys and communications are incessantly being fired on, and we occasionally lose a man or two, but this in my opinion can only be remedied by time. The trials and privations of the people must be great, as they and their families have taken to the mountains, where there is little or no food to be had; and they must every now and then fall among hostile villages, who will avenge old scores by murdering them as soon as they know it is not in their power to retaliate. On the site of Konoma I had strongly posted 200 men, who, according to the instructions of Government, are daily employed in demolishing every trace of what once formed this great stronghold and to keep in check the large body of men who escaped to the Buraill Mountains (8,500 feet high), till such time as hunger and cold shall bring them to terms. On looking down on the works at Konoma from the highest point of the defences, I can only say that I consider its capture with the small force at my disposal was only the act of Providence aiding the valour of our troops, as, had the enemy been as determined and stout-hearted as our little Goorkhas, it would, as the Field Engineer expressed to me, have taken 3,000 men supplemented with heavy siege artillery to have carried the place. I regret very much the absence of a good draughtsman or photographer with the force, to give his Excellency anything like a fair idea of the formidability of the works, but I can only say that I consider the assault and capture of Konoma as one of the most brilliant feats of arms that has taken place for many years, and is one more instance of the gallantry and devotion of our native soldiers when led by daring and determined British officers. Our losses, as will be seen by the returns, were unprecedentedly high, but the 44th Sylhet Light Infantry covered themselves with glory, and the moral effect of the fall of the mountain fastness of Konoma is greater, and worth it, and I trust the Government may have no anxieties as to the future, or move more troops than I may solicit, as I think the pacification of the country is now only a matter of time; but the policy must be firm and entire disarmament compulsory.

Should his Excellency concur with me in the great gallantry displayed by the troops, I beg most respectfully that I may be permitted to suggest what rewards would be most valued by the troops engaged, and that the same may meet with his approval and recommendation to Government.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 22nd of March, 1880, in the words following, viz:—

"Whereas we are of opinion that it is expedient to make certain changes in the provisions for the award of Good Service Pensions contained in Articles 1982 to 1986 of the Regulations for the Government of your Majesty's Naval Service, with a view of rendering the award of such pensions more equitable, we would humbly submit to your Majesty the following proposals, viz:—

"(1.) That we be empowered to confer the

Flag Officers' Good Service Pensions of £300 a year on Officers whether on the Active or the Retired List, provided in the case of Retired Officers that retirement has taken place after attaining Flag rank, and that the retired pay together with the Good Service Pension shall not exceed the half-pay of an Admiral of the Fleet.

"(2.) That article 1986, paragraphs 1 and 2, viz.:

"1. Should any Flag Officer holding a Good Service Pension be in receipt of or be appointed to Full Pay (not including service on Committees or any temporary employment of a like nature) or Civil Salary, or become entitled to a Civil Pension exceeding the value of his Good Service Pension, the latter pension shall be suspended so long as he receives such Pay, or Salary, or Civil Pension; and the vacancy thus occasioned may be filled up; but as a rule it is not intended that more than one such supernumerary pension shall be in existence at the same time

"2. When such employment shall have ceased the Officer shall resume his Good Service Pension although the List be full; but in such case the next vacancy shall not be filled up."

be cancelled except as regards Civil Pension, and that a Flag Officer be allowed to receive his Good Service Pension notwithstanding appointment to Full Pay or Civil Salary.

"(3.) That the Regulation whereby an Officer is ineligible to hold a Good Service Pension should he become Admiral of the Fleet on the Active List, Governor of Greenwich Hospital, or Naval Aide-de-Camp to your Majesty be maintained.

"(4.) That an Officer promoted in pursuance of your Majesty's pleasure to the rank of Admiral of the Fleet on the Retired List under the provisions of the Order in Council of 22nd of February, 1870, Section X, para. 7, shall, in consideration of the rank not carrying increase of Retired Pay, be allowed to retain the Good Service Pension or if not in possession of one shall be eligible for it.

"(5.) That Lieutenant-Colonels and Colonels of Marines shall in future be subject on retirement to the rule in force as regards Captains of the Royal Navy, viz.: They shall be allowed to receive in Retired Pay together with Good Service Pension a sum not exceeding £600 a year, but should the two together exceed that sum they shall be retired on £600 a year relinquishing the Good Service Pension.

"We would represent to your Majesty that the Lords of your Majesty's Treasury have concurred in these proposals."

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
