Rome, Als. 2d On the 8if inftant the Pope fell into a great weaknefsfoccafioned by the return of his Fever. The ioth he received the Extreme Undtion. The inth the Cardinals, that compofe the Congregationof the H , Office, repaired to his Antw Chamber, and the Cardinal Coloredo, Great Penitenciarys eitred ylone into his Chamber, to acquaint him, that thicy wetted his Orders. He chaiged him to give thern the Bethediction In his Name, detiring their Excufe that hagdid not fend for them in, feing he was not in a Condition to featk of publick Affirs. He recommended to them the chuling of a worthy Succelfor, and defired particularly, that the Sums of Money he leff, and which amount to athouts or 6 Millions, might be employed towards the gang of rhe People. The night following, according to 贷eutial Practice, the Prifones, to the number of son, were removed to the Caftle of St. Angelo. The 12 th, about 22 hours, dyed Pope Invocrnt XI. aged 78 Years, and 3 Months, having held the Pontificate I2 Years, 10 Months, and 22 days. Cardinal Cibo, his firt Miniter; gave 'immediately Notice there, of to Cardinal Alitieri, Chamberlain of the Church, who repaired to the Patlace with the Clerks, and orher Officers of the Chamber, and, according to Cuftom, thrice call'd the Pope with a loud Voice, and then ordered an nccount to be drawn up of his Death. He afterywards broke the Fifher's Ring, and caufed the Lead of the Balls to be likewife brake: And having performed this Cerempny, return'd to his Palace, attended by the Pope's Guards, as a Mark of his Authority during the vacancy of the Sec. Cardinal Ciborctired atio to his own Palace, where he call'd together the chicf Cardinals; and difpauched Letters to thofe that arc abfent, to acquaint them with the Pope's Deaih; which was declared to the People by Ringing the Bell of the Capiol. At the fame time the Magitiates af fembled, and, as a Mark of their Ancienr Liberty, retcated fome Prifoners. The 14th the College of Cardinals mer, and madechoice of Dom Livio, the late Pope's. Nephew, to be General of the Church, which was vehernentry oppofed by the Cardinals $d^{\prime}$ EAree and Maldexciostit. The Cardinal of St. Cecile was confirm'd in the Government of this City; and the Sieur Cujani was appoimted Governoiof the Conelave. The 15 th Dom Livio took the Cath of General, and received the Staff of Command. Thie isth at night the Pope wasprivately burried in St. Peter's'Church, (where the Body had layn expofed three days,) amid't ant extraordinsy Concourfe of People. The I8th the Gardinal $d^{\prime}$ Aguire, on the behalf or the Crown of spuin, and the Cordinal $d^{\prime} E$ Efree for France, made the ufual Coniplement to the College of Cardinals: Apd the Cells of the Conclave were diftribured by Lot; the beft falling to the Spanifh Cardiaals. The Cericlave will be opened on 7uefday next.
