

**A**T the Court at *Windsor*, the 28th day of *June*, 1880.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-second day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlinghow in the new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

“Whereas at extremities of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill, of the new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the parish of Batley in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such cures respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill of the said new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe and of the said parish of Batley should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlinghow as aforesaid.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Gateward Davies the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Batley, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron both of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill and also of the vicarage of the said new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe and with the consent of the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Wilton as the alternate patron of the said vicarage of the parish of Batley aforesaid and with the consents of Barwell Ewins Bennett of Marston Trussel Hall in the county of Northampton Esquire, and of the Honourable Algernon William Fulke Greville of number 52 Great Cumberland-place in the county of Middlesex, late a Captain in your Majesty's First Regiment of Life Guards surviving Trustees acting under the will (which has been duly proved) of the Right Honourable James Thomas Earl of Cardigan deceased as the other alternate patron of the said vicarage of the parish of Batley aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed

this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill of the said new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe and of the said parish of Batley which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlinghow aforesaid and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Carlinghow.’”

“We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“SCHEDULE.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Carlinghow, being:—

“All those several contiguous portions of the new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill of the new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe and of the parish of Batley all in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point on the south-western side of White Lee-road at the south-western end of Smithies Moor where the boundaries of the Parliamentary borough of Dewsbury of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill of the new parish of Saint James Heckmondwike in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe aforesaid all meet and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Heckmondwike from the new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe aforesaid for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the western side of White Lee Common and following in part the course of Waste-lane) to the point at Dale-lane Top where the said Waste-lane is joined by a road which connects it with White Lee-road aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said connecting road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the said White Lee-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘C. St. J. C. C. 1880 No. 1,’ and placed at or near to the junction of the said White Lee-road with the road which leads to the house or houses called or known as White Lee that is at the southernmost of the two angles made by the sides of the roads thus joining and extending thence that is from the said boundary-stone in a south-easterly direction and in a straight line for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing Coal Pit-lane) to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘C. St. J. C. C. 1880 No. 2,’ and placed on or near to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Staincliffe from the parish of Batley aforesaid at the point at or near to Oldroyd's-buildings where the footpath leading from Healey to Carlinghow leaves the footpath leading from Healey to Batley and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned boundary-stone still eastward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘C. St.
