The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas, in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may

"approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Peterborough hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell
Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the town and county of Leicester and my diocese of Peterborough the vicarage of Saint Nicholas Leicester.

"That adjoining to the parish of Saint Nicholas Leicester aforesaid is an extra-parochial place known by the name of Blackfriars.

"That the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial place resort to the parish church of Saint Nicholas Leicester to which it is contiguous,

"That the population of the said parish of Saint Nicholas Leicester is one thousand six hundred.

"That the population of the said extra-parochial place is two thousand.

"That the net annual value of the vicarage of Saint Nicholas Leicester aforesaid is £233 11s. 0d.

"That the church of Saint Nicholas Leicester aforesaid affords accommodation for 440 persons.

"That it appears to me that the said extra-parochial place known as 'Blackfriars' may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her present Majesty cap. 106 and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty cap. 49 with advantage be permanently annexed to the said vicarage and parish of Saint Nicholas Leicester for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration may be best effected and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consent of the patron to the intent that your

Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

And whereas the scheme and consent referred to in the said representation are as follows :—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

"It is proposed to annex the said extra-parochial place known as 'Blackfriars' the boundaries whereof are well known and defined to the said parish of Saint Nicholas Leicester.

"That such extra-parochial place shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Saint Nicholas Leicester.

"That baptisms churchings marriages and burials of the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial place of Blackfriars shall be performed in the said church of Saint Nicholas Leicester and that the fees for all such offices and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said extra-parochial place and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice and the clerk and sexton shall belong to the incumbent clerk and sexton respectively of Saint Nicholas Leicester and the inhabitants of the said extra-parochial place known as Blackfriars shall be entitled to pews or sittings in the said church of Saint Nicholas Leicester.

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell
Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We the undersigned William Connor by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Peterborough being the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Saint Nicholas Leicester in the county of Leicester and diocese of Peterborough in case the same were now vacant and I the Reverend Thomas William Owen Clerk vicar of the said vicarage do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our consent to the scheme above proposed for annexing the said extra-parochial place known as 'Blackfriars' to the said vicarage of Saint Nicholas Leicester.

And whereas the said Bishop of Peterborough hath transmitted the said scheme to the Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council dated the 12th day of July, 1880, which report is in the words and figures following :—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell, Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That there is in the town and county of Leicester and his diocese of Peterborough the vicarage of St. Nicholas Leicester.

"That adjoining to the parish of St. Nicholas, Leicester aforesaid, is an extra-parochial place known by the name of Blackfriars.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said extra-parochial place known as Blackfriars may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, chapter 106, be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said vicarage and parish of St. Nicholas Leicester.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected which scheme together with the consent thereto in writing of the patron and the incumbent of the said benefice of St. Nicholas Leicester has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consent [before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme, in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas William Lord Archbishop of the Province of York hath in pursuance of the 26th section of the said Act made a report dated the 12th day of June, 1880, to Her Majesty in Council stating:

"That there are in the county and diocese of York the parishes of Stokesley and Great Ayton the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the said parish of Stokesley comprises the township of Easby the boundaries whereof are also well known and defined.

"That the said township of Easby immediately adjoins the said parish of Great Ayton.

"That the population of the said parish of Stokesley according to the last census was two thousand three hundred and the population of the said parish of Great Ayton according to the same census was two thousand and that of the said township of Easby according to the same census was one hundred and twenty-four.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Stokesley is nine hundred pounds and that of the benefice of Great Ayton is one hundred and ten pounds.

"That the Reverend Francis Digby Legard is the incumbent of the said benefice of Stokesley and that the Reverend John Collin is the incumbent of the said benefice of Great Ayton.

"That the said William Lord Archbishop of York is the patron of the said benefice of Stokesley and that George Marwood of Busby Hall in the North Riding of the county of York Esquire is the patron of the said benefice of Great Ayton.

"That the said incumbents and patrons of the said benefices of Stokesley and Great Ayton are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to us that the said township of Easby might advantageously be separated from the said parish of Stokesley and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Great Ayton.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the before mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the said separation and union may be best effected and how the alterations and changes consequent on such separation and annexation may be best effected with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being satisfied on full consideration and enquiry with such scheme he doth by this report to your Majesty in Council certify the same to your Majesty together with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected to the intent that your Majesty in Council in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying the same into effect."

And whereas the scheme and consents mentioned in the said report are in the words and figures following:—

"The SCHEME hereinbefore referred to.

"That so much of the parish of Stokesley as is comprised within the boundaries of the said township of Easby shall be separated from that parish and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Great Ayton and that the vicar of the said parish of Great Ayton shall have exclusive charge of souls over the same.

"That all fees and payments arising from baptisms churchings marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of such portion of the said parish of Stokesley included within the boundaries of the said township of Easby and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice in respect of such portion of the parish of Stokesley shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent of the said vicarage of Great Ayton.

"That the inhabitants of the said township of Easby shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Great Ayton aforesaid.

"That from and after the date hereof the tithes arising out of lands situate within the said township of Easby commuted at the sum of one hundred and seventy-seven pounds six shillings and eight pence belonging to the benefice of Stokesley which said lands and tithes are more particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed shall belong to and become part of the endowment of the said benefice of Great Ayton.

"That in case this scheme should be carried into effect upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the said scheme the advowson and patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the said new vicarage of Great Ayton shall as to the right of nomination to the same vicarage which shall accrue upon the avoidance of the same vicarage happening next after such date and as to every alternative turn or right of nomination to the same vicarage which shall afterwards accrue be transferred from the said George Marwood and from all other persons (if any) who if the transfer hereby recommended and proposed were not made would be at any time entitled thereto and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William Archbishop of York and his successors Archbishops of York for ever.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of *Matfen* in the county of *Northumberland* and in the diocese of *Durham*.

"Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Matfen* is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession in *Sir Edward Blackett* of *Matfen Hall* in the said county of *Northumberland*, *Baronet*, and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the said *Edward Blackett* is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Matfen* now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the bishop for the time being of the said diocese of *Durham*.

"And whereas the Right Reverend *Joseph Barber* now Bishop of the said diocese of *Durham* is willing to accept for himself and his successors in the Bishoprick of *Durham* the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said *Joseph Barber* Bishop of *Durham* has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of *Matfen*

which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the new parish of *Matfen* (being the parish or district in or in respect of which the said right of patronage and advowson arises and exists) by rendering the said benefice more eligible than it is at present for augmentation out of funds under our control.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said *Edward Blackett* (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said *Joseph Barber* Bishop of the said diocese of *Durham* (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Matfen* so vested in the said *Edward Blackett* as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said *Edward Blackett* and from his heirs and assigns to the said *Joseph Barber* or other the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of *Durham* as such Bishop and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said *Joseph Barber* or other the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of *Durham* and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of *Durham*.

BRYNMAWR.—Forthwith wholly in the chapels and chapelyards of Libanus (Worcester-street), the Primitive Methodists' (Orchard-street), Tabor (Davies-street), and Bethesda (Alma-street); forthwith in the chapel and chapel-yard of Rehoboth (King-street), except in a walled grave in the chapelyard for the interment of Mr. Thomas Owen, the coffin when buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; forthwith wholly in the Chapels of Calvary (King-street), and Zion (Clarence-street); and in the chapelyards, except for the interment of the widowers, widows, parents, and unmarried children of those already buried therein.

OWSTON.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Owston, in the county of Lincoln; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, existing on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and none but the members of the families of those already buried to be interred therein.

WELWYN.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Welwyn, in the county of Hertford; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of human remains, to be used only for the burial of the widows, widowers, brothers, and sisters, parents, and children of those already buried therein.

WOODSTONE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Woodstone, in the county of Huntingdon; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and none but the relations of those already buried to be interred.

EPWORTH.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Epworth, in the county of Lincoln; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirteenth day of September next:
