

"The said parish of Brentor with the said districts annexed shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Brentor was subject to before such annexation and the incumbent of the said parish of Brentor with the said districts annexed shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same parish and districts.

"The incumbent of the parish of Lamerton shall be discharged from all cure of souls within the district of North Brentor and the incumbent of the parish of Mary Tavy shall be discharged from all cure of souls within the district of North Black Down.

"The whole of the first fruits tenths and other ecclesiastical dues now payable by the incumbent of Lamerton with the district of North Brentor shall continue payable by the incumbent of Lamerton as separated from the same district.

"The whole of the first fruits tenths and other ecclesiastical dues now payable by the incumbent of Mary Tavy with the district of North Black Down shall continue payable by the incumbent of Mary Tavy as separated from the same district.

"The inhabitants of the parishes of Lamerton and Mary Tavy as respectively separated from the said districts shall respectively be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish churches thereof respectively and the inhabitants of the parish of Brentor with the said districts annexed thereto shall be liable for the repairs of the parish church of Brentor and the said chapel of ease annexed thereto and the inhabitants of the said districts respectively shall be discharged from the repairs of the parish churches of Lamerton and Mary Tavy respectively.

"From and after the proposed separation shall take effect the patronage of each of the said benefices as altered by this scheme shall remain and be vested in the same person or persons in whom the patronage of such benefices as at present constituted is now vested and for the like estate or estates interest or interests.

"We consent to the above scheme,

"*Bedford*, Patron of Brentor.

"*John Tremayne*, Patron of Lamerton.

"*John F. Buller*, Patron of Mary Tavy.

"*Henry John Phillpotts*, Incumbent of Lamerton.

"*Walter Champernowne*, Incumbent of Mary Tavy."

And whereas the said Bishop of Exeter hath transmitted the said scheme to the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme, hath certified the same and such consents as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council dated the 16th day of July 1880; which report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend Frederick Lord Bishop of Exeter has represented unto us (amongst other things)

"That there is in the county of Devon and diocese of Exeter the parish of Brentor which is a vicarage in the patronage of the Most Noble Francis Charles Hastings Duke of Bedford and is now vacant.

"That the said parish is shown on the map annexed to the said representation and is thereon coloured blue.

"That the parish of Brentor adjoins and intersects the parish of Lamerton in the county and diocese aforesaid and separates that portion of the parish of Lamerton which is coloured pink on the said map (hereinafter referred to as 'the District of North Brentor') from the other portion of the same parish which is thereon coloured green.

"That the Reverend Henry John Phillpotts is incumbent of the said vicarage of Lamerton and John Tremayne of Heligan near St. Austell in the county of Cornwall Esquire is patron thereof.

"That the said parish of Brentor also adjoins that portion of the parish of Mary Tavy in the county and diocese aforesaid which is delineated on the said map and therein coloured yellow hereinafter referred to as 'the District of North Black Down.'

"That the Reverend Walter Champernowne is incumbent of the rectory of Mary Tavy aforesaid and John Francis Buller of Morval in the county of Cornwall Esqre is the patron thereof.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the district of North Brentor and the district of North Black Down may be advantageously separated from the said parishes of Lamerton and Mary Tavy respectively and be united to the said parish of Brentor.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices to be affected has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.
