The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirtynine, of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirtyfourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures follow-

England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-four of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the district chapelry and new parish of Woolton Hill in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the said district chapelry and new parish of Woolton Hill is a cure taken out of the parish of East Woodhay in the said county of Southampton and diocese of Winchester and the advowson of the rectory and parish church (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of East Wood-hay aforesaid is vested in the Bishop of Winchester for the time being in right of his See.

"And whereas the advowson of the suid district chapelry and new parish of Woolton Hill and of the church thereof (which said church and cure are hereinafter called 'the said benefice of Woolton Hill ') is vested in the rector of the said benefice of East Woodhay for the time being.

"And whereas the said benefice of East Woodhay and the said benefice of Woolton Hill are (each of them) now full of a Clerk.
