

chains or thereabouts thereby following in part the course of the River Roch aforesaid to the point a little to the east of the junction of the said river with the stream called or known as Miller's Brook where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke Heywood from a certain small detached portion of the parish of Middleton aforesaid and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts thereby still following the course of the River Roch aforesaid to the point where the same boundary leaves the said river, and extending thence, that is, from the said boundary first northward then north-westward and then south-westward along the middle of the said River Roch for a distance of forty-eight chains or thereabouts to the first-described point at the centre of Hooley Bridge aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke Heywood from the new parish of Saint James Heywood aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the four several cures namely the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood the new parish of Saint James Heywood the new parish of Birkle otherwise Birle or Birtle and the parish of Middleton out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken :

And whereas the patrons of all the four said cures, and the incumbents of three of the same cures, namely the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood the new parish of Saint James Heywood and the parish of Middleton have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the incumbent of the remaining cure that is to say the incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Birkle otherwise Birle or Birtle has offered certain objections or observations to or upon the said scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has notwithstanding such objections or observations as last mentioned been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An

"Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

KINVER.—In the parish church of Kinver, in the county of Stafford ; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth.

IPSTONES.—Forthwith, and entirely, in the parish church of Ipstones, in the county of Stafford ; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth.

CARDIGAN.—Forthwith, and entirely, in the parish church of Cardigan, in the county of Cardigan ; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such earthen graves, as are now existing in the churchyard and as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents and unmarried children, as can be buried at or below that depth.

JEFFREYSTON.—Forthwith, and entirely, in the parish church of Jeffreyston, in the county of Pembroke ; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows,
