"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate within the limits of the parish of Woolwich as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Woolwich which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate within the limits of the parish of Woolwich as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Woolwich.'

"And with the like consent of the said Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of the Holy Trinity situate within the limits of the parish of Woolwich as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Woolwich being:—

"All that part of the parish of Woolwich in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which

is bounded upon the east and south-east by the parish of Plumstead in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south by the new parish of Saint John Woolwich, and upon all other sides that is to say upon the south-west upon the west and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Woolwich from the new parish of Saint John Woolwich aforesaid at the point where Powis-street joins the street or road called or known as Green's-end and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Powis-street for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hare-street and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to its northern extremity and continuing thence in the same direction across High-street and to and along the middle of Nile-street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to the northern end of the last-named street upon the southern bank of the River Thames and extending thence eastward along the said river bank for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts (thereby following the ordinary high water mark) to the boundary which divides the said parish of Woolwich from the parish of Plumstead aforesaid."

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Little London and of the said district parish of Saint Mark Woodhouse should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Souls situate in Blackman-lane Leeds as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon as such Bishop, and also as one of the alternate patrons in right of his See of the vicarage of the said new parish of Little London and with the consent of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone a Member of the Commons House of Parliament, the First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting as such First Lord on behalf of your Majesty, as the other alternate patron (in right of the Crown) of the said vicarage of the new parish of Little London aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon and the said William Ewart Gladstone have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consents of the patrons of the church and vicarage of Saint Peter Leeds who as such patrons are also the patrons of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Mark Woodhouse (in testimony whereof they the said lastly-named patrons have affixed their common seal to this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Little London, and of the said district parish of Saint Mark Woodhouse which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Souls situate in Blackman-lane Leeds as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Souls Leeds.'

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of All Souls Leeds, being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Little London within the original limits of the parish of Saint Peter Leeds in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon and also all that contiguous portion of the district parish of Saint Mark Woodhouse, also within the original limits of the parish of Saint Peter, Leeds, aforesaid which said portions of such new parish and district parish respectively are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint George

patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Froxfield is vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield for the time being.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary within the town and borough of Shrewsbury aforesaid is vested for an estate of inheritance in fee simple without incumbrances in William Nicholson of Basing Park in the said county of Hants Esquire.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twelfth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six and published in the London Gazette upon the following day certain portions of the parish of Bury, of the parish of Rochdale and of the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale all in the county and diocese aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James situate at Waterfoot in the parish of Bury aforesaid, and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James Waterfoot.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint James Waterfoot has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot should be altered by way of extension so that they shall include certain further portions of the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme or representation, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot shall be altered by way of extension, so that they shall include all those portions of the said parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale which are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured pink and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than the said duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council the said portions of the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale so to be included as aforesaid shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Saint James Waterfoot in the

county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester being:—

(1.) All that portion of the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale in the county and diocese aforesaid in which Holt Holme Cotton Mill is situate and which said portion is bounded upon the west and upon the south-west and upon the south-east by the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot or in other words by the River Irwell and on the remaining side that is to say upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot from the said parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale at a point on the southern bank of the River Irwell aforesaid distant two chains or thereabouts north-eastward from Holt Mill Bridge which carries the Bacup and Haslingden Turnpike-road over the said river and extending thence north-westward for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts in a course exactly parallel to the middle of the said turnpike-road and distant therefrom two chains or thereabouts to the boundary near Lonsdale Bridge on the southern bank of the River Irwell aforesaid which divides the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot from the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale as aforesaid.

"(2.) And also all that other portion of the said parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale in which Hare Holme is situate and which is bounded on the west and south-west by the new parish of Saint Mary Rawtenstall in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the south-east by the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot or in other words on the south-west and south-east by the River Irwell aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the north-east by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Waterfoot from the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale as aforesaid at a point on the southern bank of the said River Irwell distant four chains or thereabouts north-eastward of Hare Holme Bridge which carries the Bacup and Haslingden Turnpike-road aforesaid over the said river and extending thence north-westward for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts in a course exactly parallel to the middle of the said turnpike-road and distant therefrom four chains or thereabouts to the point at Hare Holme aforesaid in the middle of the Hare Holme lane where it is joined by the footpath which leads from Newchurch-in-Rossendale and continuing thence still north-westward for a distance of three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said lane to its junction with a certain new road leading past the Board School at Waterside into Dobbin-lane and extending thence that is from the junction of Hare Holme-lane with such new road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts first north-westward then north-eastward and finally north-westward along the middle of the said new road to its junction with Dobbin-lane aforesaid on the boundary which divides the said parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale from the new parish of Saint Mary Rawtenstall aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council;

now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester. *C. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and four years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip situate at Griffin within the new parish of Saint Mark Witton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip situate at Griffin as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Mark Witton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Philip situate at Griffin as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip Griffin.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Philip situate

at Griffin as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

["The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Philip Griffin, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Mark Witton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded on the south and on the east by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Livesey and by the new parish of Saint Luke Blackburn both in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the remaining sides that is to say on the north and on the west by an imaginary line commencing at the point near Throstle Mill in the middle of the River Blackwater where the boundary dividing the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint Paul Blackburn in the county and diocese aforesaid meets the eastern boundary of the said new parish of Saint Mark Witton and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said river for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point in the centre of the bridge which carries Garden-street over the same river and extending thence southward along the middle of the said street for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction at Redlam Brow with the Blackburn and Walton Old Turnpike-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the said turnpike-road for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Greenfield-street and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the wall or fence which forms the northern boundary of the Griffin estate and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the said estate-boundary for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the point where Spring-street joins Spring-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Griffin-street and continuing thence in the same direction that is to say south-eastward and in a direct line for a further distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the River Darwen) to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark Witton from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Livesey aforesaid."

Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twentieth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies

thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed) as follows; viz.:

ST. MARY CRAY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. Mary Cray, in the county of Kent; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without finding water, and without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, to be used only for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents and children of those already interred therein.

NASSINGTON.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Nassington, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented.

YARWELL.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Yarwell, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

BADBY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Badby, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of human remains, and these earthen graves only to be used for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents' children, brothers and sisters of those already interred therein.

NEATH.—Forthwith and entirely in the chapel-yards of Zoar and Maesyrhof, within the borough of Neath, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and that they are only used for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents and children of those already interred therein.

MOULTON.—Forthwith wholly in Moulton churchyard, in the county of Northampton, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

GREAT STAUGHTON.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Great Staughton, in the county of Huntingdon.

ARLESEY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Arlesey, in the county of Bedford; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves, five feet deep and free from water, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of human remains, to be used only for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents and children of those already buried therein.

KIRTON IN LINDSEY.—Forthwith wholly in the old part of the parish churchyard of Kirton in Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves five feet deep which can be opened without the disturbance of human remains; and these exceptions to apply only to the burial of the near relations of those already buried therein, viz.: the widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers and sisters.

BURTON LATIMER.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Burton Latimer, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, interment in which shall take place only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves, in that part of the churchyard which lies on the west side of the entrance pathway to the church, interment in which shall take place only on condition that they can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, and that they be used only for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents and children of those already interred therein.

HELMSLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Helmsley, in the county of York; and in the churchyard, except in the vault therein belonging to Lord Feversham, and in this only on condition that every coffin buried in such vault be enclosed in brickwork or stonework properly cemented.

ST. SEPULCHRE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. Sepulchre, Northampton; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and that burial take place in these only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

SOUTH CAVE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of South Cave, in the county of York; and in the churchyard, except in the vault therein belonging to G. G. Macturk, Esq., burial in which to be permitted only on condition that each coffin buried in such vault be enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

JARROW-ON-TYNE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Jarrow-on-Tyne; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and that burial be permitted in these only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed in stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WELTON.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Welton, in the county of York; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight

hundred and eighty-one, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and in these only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of human remains, these earthen graves to be used only for the burial of widows and widowers of those already interred therein: and except for the burial of the Reverend Thomas Bradley Paget and of Sophia, his wife.

COCKFIELD.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Cockfield, in the county of Durham, and in the churchyard, after the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

RYTON-ON-TYNE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Ryton-on-Tyne; and in the churchyard, after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and that burials take place in these only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves, not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of human remains, and these only to be used for the burial of the widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers, and sisters of those already interred therein.

ROTHBURY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Rothbury, in the county of Northumberland, and also in the old part of the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the old churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the old churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz.:—widows, widowers, parents, and children as can be buried at or below that depth.

OVINGHAM.—Forthwith in the parish churchyard of Ovingham, in the county of Northumberland, and in its addition, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and that burial be allowed in those only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except also in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, and these only to be used for the widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers and sisters of those already interred therein.

ALDBOROUGH.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Aldborough, in the county of York; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except for the burial of Miss Jane Elizabeth Clarke, at her decease.

GREAT AYTON.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Great Ayton, in the county of York; and in the churchyard after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and burials to take place in these

only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

STONELEIGH.—Forthwith in the parish church of Stoneleigh, in the county of Warwick, except in the mausoleum belonging to the Leigh family; and in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and that burial in these be allowed only on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed in stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

LLANGELYNIN.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church and in the original churchyard of Llangelynnin, in the county of Merioneth.

DIDSBURY, MANCHESTER.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. James', Didsbury, in the county of Lancaster; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing, burials may be allowed of members of the families to whom they belong, on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of only so many relatives of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers and sisters, as can be buried at or below that depth.

ST. JAMES', WEDNESBURY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. James', Wednesbury, in the county of Stafford; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In such earthen graves, now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers and sisters, as can be buried at or below that depth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows; viz.:—

In the churchyard of Saint John, Sheffield, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, on condition that the restrictions contained in that part of the Order in Council of the fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, relating to that churchyard be observed.

In the parish churchyard of Woodstone, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Belgrave, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Headington, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Forest Hill, in the county of Oxford, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Wilburton, in the county of Cambridge, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the churchyard of Sidbury, in the county of Devon, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878; (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1878,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The limits of the area which is described in the Order of Council dated the twenty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and

eighty-one, and is thereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, namely—the Petty Sessional Division of Blandford, in the county of Dorset, and the borough of Blandford;—are hereby extended so as to include the area described in the Schedule to this Order, except the lines of railway within that last-mentioned area, as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through that last-mentioned area, without being untrucked within it (with which transit nothing in this Order shall be deemed to interfere); and the area described in the Schedule to this Order, except as aforesaid, is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878.

Whereas subject to the provisions of the special Act, authorizing any tramway, and of "The Tramways Act, 1870," the Local Authority of any District in which any tramway is laid down, may

from time to time make regulations as to the following matters:—

The rate of speed to be observed in travelling upon the tramways.

The distances at which carriages using the tramway shall be allowed to follow one after the other.

The stopping of carriages using the tramways.

The traffic on the road on which the tramway is laid.

And for better enforcing the observance of all or any of such regulations, it is by "The Tramways Act, 1870," enacted that it shall be lawful for such Local Authority to make Bye-laws for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, and from time to time to repeal or alter such Bye-laws, and make

new Bye-laws, provided that such Bye-laws be not repugnant to the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the same are to have effect. And that any such Bye-laws may impose reasonable penalties for offences against the same, not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, with or without further penalties, for continuing offences, not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for any day during which the offence continues, but that all Bye-laws shall be so framed as to allow in every case part only of the maximum penalty being ordered to be paid.
