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Venice, September 30.

**T**HE Senate have given out this week several Commissions for new Levies, which are to be made in Germany. A new Convoy is preparing, to be sent to the Levant. We hear from *Dalmatia*, that the Proveditor-General *Molino* having advanced with the Forces under his Command towards *Narenta*, he had on the 17th Instant attack'd the Bourg of *St. Stephen*, where the Turks, who had received a Reinforcement of 3000 Men under the Command of the Bassa of *Arcegovina*, had intrench'd themselves, but the Morlacks giving way, the Venetians thought fit to retire, which they did in very good order to the Port of *Opuzch*, with the loss of about 30 Men, of which number was the *Sieur de Hilaire* who commanded the Van-guard. Of the Enemy above 100 were killed.

*Warsaw, Sept. 18.* The Palatin of *Russia*, great General of *Poland*, having with the advice of the principal Officers of the Army resolv'd to attack *Camniec*, the Capital City of *Podolia*, where he was inform'd there were not then above 1500 Turks in Garrison, the Forces as well of *Lithuania* as *Poland* set down before it on the 20th of the last month. On the 22th the Trenches were opened, and two Batteries rais'd against the new Cittadel; The Cannon began to play on the 26th, which having made large Breaches, Orders were given for an Assault on the 6th Instant in the Evening, but the Enemy being advertis'd thereof, were so well provided for their defence, that the Troops that made the Attack were repuls'd with great loss. This ill Success was followed by another the next day, for the Turks making a strong Sally, beat the Lithuanians out of the Trenches, which they fill'd up, and took and carried back with them into the Town 7 pieces of Cannon, and about Fifty Prisoners. The 8th a Council of War being held, it was resolv'd to raise the Siege. And the same day the Army decamp'd, and retir'd towards *Jasloviecs*.

*Ratisbonne, Sept. 27.* The matter about the re-establishment of the Imperial Chamber, which was heretofore settled at *Spire*, is at last concluded, the Estates of the Empire assembled here having resolv'd to remove it to *Weslar*, and appointed the Electors of *Mentz* and *Trier*, the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, and the Magistrates of *Francfort* their Commissioners for adjusting all things relating thereto, and particularly for what concerns the free Exercise of Religion.

*Cambridge, Oct. 8.* On Sunday last the Vice-Chancellor, the Heads of Colleges, and Doctors in all Faculties, with several Regents, and Non-Regents, in their proper Habits, wait'd upon His Majesty at *Newmarket*, being introduced into His Royal Presence by his Grace the Duke of *Somerset*, Chancellor of the University. The Reverend Dr. *Cowell*, Vice-Chancellor, address'd himself to His Majesty in a proper and Elegant Speech, Congratulating the glorious Successes His Majesty had been bless'd with in His Endeavours

to Rescue this Church and Nation from the imminent Dangers that threaten'd both, and which were more particularly pointed against, the Universities; and concluded with an humble Recommendation of Themselves to His Majesties Protection, wherein the Protestant Religion had so much concern. To which His Majesty was pleas'd to return in Answer, That as God had bless'd him in this Undertaking, so he should faithfully discharge His Trust in preserving the Church of England, and giving all Protection and Favour to the Universities. They then wait'd upon His Majesty to Church, and at their return from thence, were conducted to the King's House, where, by Directions from His Majesty, they were Received, and splendidly Entertain'd at Dinner by Sir *James Forbes* Clerk of the Green-Cloth.

The next day His Majesty was pleas'd to make a Visit to the University, and arriv'd here in the morning, being met without the Town by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Corporation in their Formalities, who Complemented His Majesty by Mr. *Peys* their present Mayor, and made a Preface of a large Bason and Ewre. They march'd before him into Town, at the Entrance whereof His Majesty was received by Rows of Scholers according to their several Degrees on each side of the Streets leading to the Publick Schools, and amidst the loud Acclamations of all sorts of Persons. His Majesty alighting at the Schools receiv'd there the publick Thanks of the University by the Vice-Chancellor and their Orator, for the great Honour that was then done them, and an extraordinary Commencement being held on this signal Occasion for Conferring Degrees on Persons of Worth in all Faculties; Mr. *Kiddar* and Mr. *Pelling* were created Doctors in His Majesties presence, being presented by the *Regius* Professor Dr. *Beaumont* with that unimitable Elegancy which is so peculiar to him.

From the Schools His Majesty walk'd to *King's-College*, where Mr. *Layton*, a Fellow of that Society, declaring in his Speech the Apprehensions they were under lest they might have offend'd His Majesty by a late Petition wherein they only mention'd one single Person as duly qualify'd to succeed in the Vacancy of their Provost, and humbly beseeching His Majesties favourable Construction of that matter; His Majesty was pleas'd (that none might be left there doubtful of His Favour) graciously to assure them, That He willingly granted all they desired or could wish, and that they might admit Dr. *Roderick* to be their Provost as soon as they pleas'd; which they receiv'd with the greatest Joy and Gratitude imaginable.

After that His Majesty went to *Trinity-College*, and in the first Court thereof was Congratulated by the Honourable Dr. *Montague* the Master, and in the second by Mr. *Norris* a Fellow of that College, and with a Copy of English Verses in the new built Library, the Structure whereof His Majesty was very well pleas'd with; and here His Majesty was pleas'd to accept of a Dinner provided by the University in the College-Hall, where at the upper end was a Table rais'd 5 steps above the Floor, at which sat His Majesty, and at one end his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, who attend'd him hither, and at the other Tables on each side of the Hall were their Excellencies the Spanish and Dutch Ambassadors, with several other Foreign Ministers, together with the Nobility and principal Gentry in great numbers. All which His Majesty was graciously pleas'd to accept, sending from Table a Message to his Grace the Chancellor, That He Drank to him, and wish'd prosperity to the University of *Cambridge*. Immediately after Dinner His Majesty return'd to *Newmarket* through infinite throngs of People, who crowd'd from all parts to have the happiness of seeing His Majesty.

*Ludlow, Oct. 9.* The Right Honourable the Earl of *Maclefeld* having been lately at *Bristol*, *Gloucester*, *Hérford*, *Lemster*, and other places within his Lieutenantcy, was receiv'd with great Kindness by the Gentry, and Respect

by the Commonalty. The Militia of *Wales* also have unanimously declared their Loyalty to Their Majesties King *William* and Queen *Mary*, their Resolution to defend the Protestant Religion, and their great Satisfaction in having his Lordship their Lord-Lieutenant.

*Plimouth, Oct. 8.* Yesterday came in here Their Majesties Ships the *Forefight*, Captain *Jones*, and the *Mordant*, Captain *Tyrrel*, Commanders. They give an account, that cruising with the *Lively* (a small Frigate that was lately taken from the French) to the Westward, they descried on the 4th Instant about Noon, 28 Leagues S. W. of *Scilly*, 12 Sail standing S. S. W. and thereupon stood towards them, to discover what they were, and about an hour after came within Shot of them, when finding them to be French Men of War, they bore away, firing their Stern Chace. About 3 in the afternoon two of the French Ships, whilst the rest chased the *Forefight* and the *Mordant*, came up with the *Lively*, and giving her a Broad-side, shot down her Main Topmast, and afterwards took her. And between 4 and 5 the French, upon a Signal from their Commandant, gave over the Chase. The *Mordant* saw afterwards 17 Sail more on her Larbord-side, standing to the Southward, but could not discern what they were. It's probable they were the Squadron under the Command of the Lord *Berkeley*.

*Chester, Oct. 9.* By a Person who came from our Army on the 4th Instant, we understand, that the Troops were in a very good condition, and Provisions very plentiful in the Camp; That the Forces from *Scotland* were not yet arrived, but hourly expected at *Carlisle*; And that the Irish Army continued encamped within 3 or 4 miles of *Dundalk*.

We have this following account of the treacherous Conspiracy lately discovered in our Camp, which was carried on by some French Papists.

A Captain in one of the French Regiments being informed by one of his Soldiers, that 4 other Soldiers and a Drummer, who were Papists, designed to go over to the Irish Army, he caused them to be seized, and found Letters about one of them to Monsieur *d'Avaux*, who being Examined, declared he had the Letters from one *Du Plessy* likewise a Papist, who now served as a private Soldier in one of the French Regiments, though he had been formerly a Captain of Horse in *France*; from whence he was forced to retire on account of a Murder he had committed there. *Du Plessy* being seized, upon his Examination confessed, that he had written to the late King and to Monsieur *d'Avaux*, giving them an account, that there were divers Papists in the French Regiments, and promising to bring them over to the Irish Camp, upon condition he might have the Command of them, and his Pardon in *France*. He and his five Accomplices were thereupon brought to their Trial before a Council of War, where Sentence of Death passed upon them; and they were executed accordingly. After which the three French Colonels made strict enquiry what Papists there were in their Regiments, and found about 150, who by order of the General were secured, and sent Prisoners to *Carlisle*. Most of these had deserted the French Service this Summer, and passing to *Holland*, and thence to *England*, upon the report that 3 French Regiments were levying here, had listed themselves in the same; the Officers raising their Companies in so much haste that they had not time to examine them very strictly.

*Hampton-Court, Oct. 10.* His Majesty returned hither this Evening from *Newmarket*,

*Whitehall, Oct. 12.* His Majesty in Council having been pleased to appoint the Cities of *London*, *Bristol*, *Chester*, and *Carlisle*, to be the places where all Horses are to be brought that shall be seized in pursuance of a late Act of Parliament, in the possession of, or belonging to Papists or reputed Papists: There are to give notice, that there are appointed to receive such Horses as aforesaid at *London*, Mr. *John Freeman* and Mr. *James Becker*, at the *Dog and Partridge* in *Piccadilly*. At *Bristol*, such Persons as shall be appointed by Mr. *Robert Henley Merchant*. At *Chester*, such Persons as *Sir John Morgan* the Governor there shall appoint. At *Carlisle*, Mr. . . . *Davidson* the Store-keeper of that Garrison.

*Hicks's-Hall, Oct. 11.* *Elizabeth Taddell*, living near Turnstile in *Holborn*, was Indicted and Convicted of Uttering [for Advantage] of Clipp'd-Money in Exchange for Guinea's, &c. and was fined 60 l. *Joshua Willer*, a Journeyman Linnen-Draper in *Cheapside*, whom she had seduced to Exchange several Sums of Money, was also Bound to the Good-behaviour. *Elinor Weaver* of *Red-Lyon-Fields*, convicted of having Clippings, Shears, and Files found about her, is to be Whipp'd from the Kings-Gate to *Holborn-Bar*. *John Nicholson*, convicted of having Clippings and Clipping-Tools found in his House, was Fined 10 l. and is also to be Whipp'd from his House on *Saffron-Hill* to *Holborn-Bar*.
