THE accompanying Proclamation has been issued by the Governor of the Cape Colony:—

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir Hercules George Robert Robinson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Colony of the Cape of Good Hope in South Africa, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and Her Majesty's High Commissioner, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS his Excellency the Right Honourable Sir Henry Bartle Edward Frere, Baronet, Governor of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, by a Proclamation, No. 14, dated the 26th day of January, 1880, in virtue of the powers vested in him by the Act No. 9 of 1876, did, with the advice of the Executive Council, absolutely prohibit the introduction into this Colony, of all grapes, vines, or cuttings, or portions of vines, plants, tubers, roots, bulbs, or any portion or portions thereof respectively, from any places beyond the limits of the said Colony whatsoever: and whereas it is expedient that the said Proclamation should be repealed and a fresh Proclamation issued under the provisions of the Act No. 27, of 1880: Now, therefore, I do hereby, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the Act first abovementioned, revoke and repeal the said Proclamation No. 14 of 1880, and do, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the aforesaid Act No. 27 of 1880, and with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby proclaim, declare, and make known, as follows:—

The introduction into this Colony, from places beyond the boundaries thereof of all grapes, vines, or cuttings, or portions of vines, trees, plants, tubers, roots, bulbs, or any portion or portions thereof respectively, is hereby absolutely prohibited.

Any person contravening this Proclamation or anything herein contained, shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding £500 sterling, and in default of payment thereof shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding two years, unless such fine be sooner paid.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.
