The township of Seacombe, in the petty sessional division of Wirral; (2.) the township of Sutton, in the petty sessional division of Prestbury; (3.) the township of Haslington, in the petty sessional division of Nantwich; (4.) the township of Tiverton, in the petty sessional division of Eddisbury; and (5.) the township of Torkington, in the petty sessional division of Stockport, shall continue to be and each is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England, on Thursday, the 5th proximo, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Act 40 Vic., cap. 2, to the amount of £1,476,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1,000, £5,000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 10th day of May, 1881, and will be payable at three or six months after date (at the option of the persons tendering), viz.—on the 10th August or 10th November next, respectively.

3. The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.
