THE following Despatch from the General Officer Commanding at Natal, with its Enclosures, has been received at the War Office:—
From the General Officer Commanding, Natal,
to the Secretary of State for War.

SIR, *Camp, Newcastle, March 9, 1881.*

IN submitting the accompanying report from Major Fraser, Royal Engineers, the senior effective officer remaining from those engaged on the 27th February, I desired to bring to your notice the good service rendered by this officer. After being the foremost to scale the mountain, he descended again for the purpose of hurrying up the men, and was one of the last staff officers to quit the ridge. While in the act of withdrawing he fell over a rock and injured his hand, but with great endurance and determination he walked from 1 P.M. on Sunday, until 2 A.M. on Tuesday without tasting food, ultimately regaining our lines through the Boer position.

Had Major-General Sir George Pomeroy-Colley survived he would, I have no doubt, have endorsed all that Major Fraser has written with regard to the conduct of both officers and men in the fight on the Majuba Mountain, and therefore, although the result of the action was disastrous, I feel confidence in submitting for favourable consideration the names of those mentioned in the report.

To what has been adduced in that report with regard to the conduct of Captain M'Gregor, 92nd Highlanders, I would in addition bear testimony to the activity he displayed during the march up country, conduct which induced me to recommend him for staff employment to Sir G. Colley, who subsequently informed me that he had decided to appoint Captain M'Gregor to his staff as an aide-de-camp.

From independent sources I have heard much of the conspicuous gallantry displayed by Lieutenant Lucy, 58th Regiment, by Lieutenant Hamilton and Second Lieutenant MacDonald, 92nd Highlanders, by Corporal Farmer, Army Hospital Corps, and by No. 1865, Private John Murray, 92nd Highlanders. I recommend Corporal Farmer to favourable consideration for the Victoria Cross, and Private Murray for Distinguished Service Medal.

Corporal Farmer showed a spirit of self-abnegation and an example of cool bravery which cannot be too highly commended. While the Boers closed with our troops near the wells, Corporal Farmer held a white flag over the wounded, and when the arm holding the flag was shot through, he called out that he had "another." He then raised the flag with the other arm and continued to do so until that also was pierced with a bullet.

From Major Fraser, R.E., D.A.Q.M.G., to the General Officer Commanding, Natal.

SIR, *Newcastle, March 5, 1881.*

I HAVE the honour to report that, at 3.30 P.M. on the 26th February, I was ordered by General Colley to accompany him with a force he proposed to take to the top of the Majuba Height at 9.30 P.M.

This point commands the position of Laing's Nek (see map).

Orders were issued at 8 P.M. for the following to parade at 9.30 P.M. (at B, see sketch), viz.:—

3 companies 92nd Highlanders (Major Hay and 180 rifles.)

2 companies 3-60th (Captain Smith and 140 rifles.)

2 companies 58th (Captain Morris and 170 rifles.)

Naval Brigade (Commander Romilly and 64 rifles.)

The whole were ordered to have greatcoats, waterproof sheets, 3 days' rations, and 6 picks and 4 shovels per company.

I was ordered to lead column, and was furnished with two local guides. The night was bright, but there was no moon. Our line of advance is marked in yellow on the sketch.

We started at 10 P.M. in the following order—viz., 58th, 60th, 92nd, Naval Brigade.

The column halted near "D" at 11 P.M. Two companies 60th were detached, and left with orders to send some men to occupy the top of Imguela, and to cover the general movement. The column then moved northward through a defile as far as "E," where it gained the neck between Imguela and Majuba. The head halted at "X," and I was ordered to fetch a company of the 92nd to "Y," where the General posted it, with instructions to intrench. I reported, from Major Hay, that the rear company 92nd and Naval Brigade were missing, and was told to find them. I did so at "E," and brought them up to "X." At 1.30 A.M., column proceeded to the foot of the mountain, whence we ascended some way without difficulty. The guides were doubtful of the way, but we went straight up along a stone-covered ridge from "H" to (1). (See sketch of hill top). I reached (1) at 3.40 A.M., found hill unoccupied, and took steps to extend the 58th towards (2), to make way for the column. On the General's arrival immediately afterwards, Colonel Stewart and myself were sent down to hurry up the column. The men, heavily weighted as they were, had made extraordinary efforts to reach the top, and were extremely exhausted. On our return they were extended all round the brow, showing on the sky line. The Boers were entirely ignorant of our movements. General Colley forbade firing on some of them below us, but some shots were fired without orders at about 5.45 A.M. 16 men were posted at "H," and a few at (5). The General now organized the defence as follows:—

To the 92nd was assigned the whole brow from (6) by (5), round to between (4) and (3). One company extended, the other in reserve in rear of the ridge (7), (9). One company of the 58th was ordered to hold the brow from (3) by (2) to (1), the other company in reserve with the 92nd. The sailors extended from (1) to (10), keeping a small reserve with the others. The General thought the troops were too exhausted for any systematic entrenchment, but the extended men made cover of stones and turf, &c., and two wells were dug where shown.

We looked down upon the whole position of Laing's Nek, and saw three large Boer wagon laagers in rear of it, at 2,000 to 3,000 yards to north-west; and a fourth about 1,500 yards to west of us. Shortly after 6 A.M., the Boers began a desultory fire. They inspanned their oxen in laagers, and stood ready to go. At the same time, reinforcements, mounted and on foot, kept coming up. We counted 160 men in one party alone. These all worked up skilfully under cover till within 600 yards from the brow, and then kept up a rapid fire on us. Our men fired very slowly and steadily, to save ammunition. About 10.15 A.M., Colonel Stewart and I went with the General to (11), where Commander Romilly stood, to arrange to start the sailors on an intrenchment at (1). Commander Romilly was shot between us by men from below, firing from the south-west. Finding the ground so exposed, the General did not give the order to intrench. The fire somewhat slackened till 11.30 A.M. By this time the Boers had advanced up the steep slopes, which were unseen from our shooting line. They were massed under cover, and then moved up rapidly. Some 15 or 20 of our men were now sent up the rocky peak (6) on our extreme left, and a few sailors were sent to (1) to guard out rear there. Colonel Stewart and myself, and others took the rest of the reserves and reinforced the shooting line about 12 noon, but not finding room for these supports whence they could shoot down the brow, we withdrew and posted them on a second ridge (7, 4) about 12.15 to 12.30 P.M. The sailors at (1) now came running down, saying they were attacked from the east. We sent them back to do the best they could. As the Boers closed General Colley was at (9), Colonel Stewart next him, and I was on the left, towards (7); all in the shooting line. We had succeeded in getting the men to fix bayonets. The attack advanced, firing so rapidly we could only see their rifles through the smoke as they crept up. Ours fired repeatedly, and fell fast. They began to retreat and make for the last ridge (12) about 12.45 P.M. Colonel Stewart ran back to rally them, and failing to do so was returning to General Colley when the latter fell. As the Boers came up to the rocky ridge the remainder of our men fell back after the others.

I now went after our retreating men, walking from the Hollow towards the point (11), feeling too exhausted to catch up the men; as I was near the hollow I saw General Colley, with a few men, moving back near the wells. He turned round to face the enemy, and fell shot through the head by fire from the rocky ridge which we had just left. When I got between (11 and 1) our men were passing over the ridge (1 and 2).

Fresh firing parties now opened on me from below (6), and in seeking shelter I went down the precipitous hill side, 200 or 300 feet.

About midnight of the 26th-27th, a 3rd Company of the 60th, with a small ammunition column, destined by General Colley to come up to us on the afternoon of the 27th, joined the Company at "Y"; there they intrenched. An order was sent from camp about 2 P.M. on the 27th for these companies to retire; after leaving their intrenchments, about 3 P.M.; they were attacked by Boers advancing from Majuba; but were in part covered by the two companies of the 60th under Imguela, and by a troop of dismounted Hussars (15th) sent up from camp; all these troops retreated without much loss.

About 1.30 to 2 P.M., when our retreat was ascertained, 2 guns, and 2 companies of the 92nd

were sent out about a mile north of the camp, so as to check pursuit.

By these means the retreat was partly covered.

I am informed the "assembly" sounded in camp at 3 P.M., and the garrison went into intrenchments.

Throughout the movement, and during the whole of the action, Colonel Stewart seconded the General with great activity and coolness. Commander Romilly, R.N., Major Hay, 92nd Regiment, and Captain Morris, 58th Regiment, all gave him unremitting support.

The following were conspicuous for gallant conduct, viz. :—

Lieutenant Hamilton, 92nd Regiment, and Lieutenant Lucy, 58th Regiment; both were exposed to severe fire during seven hours. Lieutenants Wright and McDonald, 92nd Regiment, behaved with the greatest coolness and courage, and to the last made every effort to turn the course of events. Captain McGregor, 92nd Regiment, exposed himself constantly with the men of his regiment, in addition to performing his duties as Aide-de-Camp. Corporal Farmer, of the Army Hospital Corps, held a white flag over the wounded as the Boers closed near the wells, when he was shot through the arm; he called out he had "another," and held up the flag with his other arm till shot through that also.

Nothing could exceed the devotion of Drs. Landon and Cornish, both of whom lost their lives in the discharge of their duties.

The conduct of the 92nd was excellent throughout; many whose names I cannot recall, or did not know, behaved with coolness, and their shooting was uniformly steady.

I venture to submit that the causes that led to our failure were the following, as regards the fight :—

- (1.) The slopes below the brow of the plateau were too steep to be searched by our fire, and cover existed up to the brow.
- (2.) The rocky ridge we occupied in second line, though the best we had time to hold, did not cover more than 50 yards to its front, as the plateau rolled continuously to the brow.
- (2A.) The men were too exhausted to intrench and hardly fit to fight.
- (3.) When the Boers gained the last ridge ours had to descend almost impassable slopes, and many were shot in doing so.

It is only right I should mention that owing, I presume, to its being constantly patrolled by Boer scouts, the Majuba had not been reconnoitred beforehand. I must also add, that although I saw a few men very short of ammunition, my belief is that many had 20 to 40 rounds remaining before the final attack.

THE following Despatch and enclosures have been received by the Secretary of the Admiralty from Commodore Richards, C.B., commanding on the Cape of Good Hope Station:—
Letter from Commodore Richards, C.B., forwarding Reports from Officers on the Action of 27th February, and bringing to the notice of their Lordships the services of Surgeon Mahon and others.

"Boadicea," off Durban,

March 14, 1881.

SIR,
I REQUEST you will submit, for the consideration of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the enclosed reports forwarded by Lieutenant Ogle, R.N., in temporary command of the Naval Brigade at Head Quarters, on the action at Majuba Mountain on the 27th February.

2. In my letter of the 7th inst., No. 53, I referred to the services of Surgeon Edward Mahon. I now submit the interesting narrative of that officer for the consideration of their lordships, feeling sure that his graphic description of the events of the day will be of interest, and that the modest account which he renders of his own performance of duty in action under circumstances of extreme personal peril, as well as of his subsequent devotion to the wounded during twenty-eight hours of privation, will commend itself to their lordships; and I have much satisfaction in recommending Surgeon Mahon as an officer deserving of especial approbation and reward.

3. The conduct of William Bevis, assistant sick-berth attendant, as reported by Surgeon Mahon, I also submit for the especial consideration of their lordships.

4. Lieutenant Cochrane, the officer who was sent out at daylight in charge of a burying party from all corps, reports that he buried on the summit of the mountain fifty-three men in one grave, ten of the number being men of the Naval Brigade.

A Boer Commandant pointed out to him the bodies of George Hammond and Samuel With-eridge, quartermasters, as of men who remained to the last, and died at their posts. Lieutenant Trower's body was also found on the extreme ridge, shot through the chest, temple, and with left hand shattered.

5. There seems (I regret to say from the reports enclosed) no doubt but that the ball which passed through Captain Romilly's body was an explosive bullet. It is the first mention I have received of the employment of these barbarous missiles by the Boers, and was probably an exceptional case.

The wounded men speak in high terms of the kindness of the Boers towards them after the conflict was over.

March 3, 1881.

SIR,
I HAVE the honour herewith to forward you a more detailed account of the action on Majuba Mountain on 27th February, 1881, written by Sub-lieutenant A. L. Scott.

I also beg to enclose a revised list of the killed and wounded.

I have heard from Mr. Scott that Dr. Mahon behaved with great bravery and coolness in his

care for Commander Romilly. I myself also have observed that he has been most indefatigable in his duties, and especially, I believe, on the night following the action.

I have also heard that Lieutenant Trower was one of the last to retire, and exhibited great coolness to the end.

I have also with much pleasure to report most favourably the way in which Thos. Pyer, first-class signalman, who was sent out to attend the wounded, performed his duties, stopping out a night and a day, and brought in a list of those he had seen of killed and wounded. He also brought in a few articles which the Boers had not taken from Lieutenant Trower.

All the men in the action behaved with great coolness and bravery, and Mr. Scott says he cannot recommend one more than the other.

Commander Romilly was brought into camp the next morning, and placed in his tent. Lieutenant Trower's body was brought in the same morning. T. Lewis, Krooman, came in wounded, and died during the night. The two latter were buried yesterday at the cemetery; the remainder of our killed were buried on the field. The bodies of General Sir G. P. Colley, and two doctors belonging to the medical staff, were buried at the same time as Lieutenant Trower and T. Lewis, Krooman.

The Naval Brigade have lately sent up two 9-pr. field guns and 21 men under Sub-lieutenant Monckton to garrison a newly erected fort on the hill on our right, distant about half a mile; they have also been repairing and improving No. 4 redoubt close to our camp, in which the rocket tubes and rockets have also been placed; and it is at present intended that our whole force, except those with the 9-prs. and 20 men who work the Gatlings in a small round fort close to, should man this redoubt in case of alarm. Our men with one officer take duty now continually as picquets. We have also to furnish a hospital party; and so our hands are full. I am now commencing to take a list of our losses, which are comparatively heavy, many rifles being missing, together with great coats, waterproof sheets, water-bottles, and haversacks.

Report of the Action at Majuba Mountain on 27th February, 1881.

Camp, Mount Prospect,

March 1, 1881.

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to report that 64 petty officers and seamen, armed with rifles, under Commander Romilly, with Lieutenant Trower, Surgeon Mahon, and myself, left the camp at 10 P.M. on February 26, two companies of 58th, 3-60th, and 92nd regiments accompanying us, with Sir G. Colley in command, to occupy Majuba Mountain, on the left front of the camp. The Naval Brigade brought up the rear of the column, and reached the top of the mountain by a precipitous route about 4 A.M. without opposition. The companies of 3-60th rifles were left on a neck of land between the mountain and the camp. On arrival at the top a section of our company was left at the point we ascended, with Lieutenant Trower; the remainder proceeded to the end of the mountain nearest the Boer camp

and were placed in a hollow. At daylight firing commenced, the enemy being seen round the foot of the mountain. The 2nd section of the company Naval Brigade was then sent to line the edge of the mountain in rear. I went with this section; shortly after part of the 58th regiment were withdrawn from the left of the mountain, and replaced by portions of the 1st and 2nd sections of Naval Brigade. Our men were lying down under good cover, firing seldom, as the Boers did not show in force on the left, and generally kept out of range. Lieutenant Trower was near me, and Commander Romilly was with us the greater part of the time. At about 11 A.M. 12 of my men were taken from the left, and sent to the front of the hill. Commander Romilly came over for them, and in returning he was shot through the body whilst standing by the General, the bullet exploding after passing through him. Dr. Mahon, who was close by, at once attended him, and he was carried to the hollow of the mountain out of fire. Lieutenant Trower then took the 12 men over to the other side. The left half company were still in reserve in the hollow. Shortly after this, Lieutenant Trower, who had returned to where I was stationed, ordered me to take charge of six men who were posted on a ledge some 20 feet below the top and on the right side of the mountain, near the path by which we ascended. I remained in this place until nearly one o'clock, my men firing occasional shots at the enemy when they came within range. The firing on the other side of the mountain seemed to be less heavy, and a signal was made to the camp that the Boers were breaking up their encampment. Shortly before one o'clock the firing increased, and I heard several volleys. Some men then passed me, and said that the Boers were on the top of the hill, and our men were being driven back. I at once took my men over to the point where the enemy were attacking; they had not gained the top, but were apparently close up; the 92nd and part of the 58th were firing on them. I could not see the remainder of the Naval Brigade on account of the rising ground; the greater part of them were on the right front of the mountain with Lieutenant Trower. A great number of wounded men were in the hollow. On getting near the general I received an order from him by Mr. Hay, correspondent of the Daily News, to take my men back to their former position. A few minutes after arriving there I saw our forces beginning to retire down both sides of the mountain towards the camp, and the retreat then became general. The Boers had gained the top of the hill, and were coming across in great numbers to cut off the men retreating. I then retired with my six men down the path by which we ascended. The enemy poured a tremendous fire down the sides of the mountain, so that we were obliged to scatter, and make the best of our way out of range. Lieutenant Morgan, of the 58th regiment, came down the hill with me; also W. Kemp, A.B., and Geo. Sponder, ord., both of whom were wounded. On nearing O'Neill's farm, we met several men returning to camp, amongst them a few men of the Naval Brigade who had come down the rear face of the mountain. I waited here a short time to collect stragglers, and then came into camp, arriving a little after 3 P.M. I found that about 20 men of the Naval Brigade had come in, including those who accompanied me. Most of the men lost their arms in retreating, the sides of the mountain being almost perpendicular where they were obliged to come down. The six men who were with me during the latter part of the action all arrived in camp; two of them, Geo. Sponder, ord., and Geo. Bridge,

ord., being wounded. In referring to the rear of the mountain I mean the side facing the camp. The times are approximate, as I had no watch.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to report that on February 26th, at about 10 P.M., I left camp with the column, accompanied by Bevis, the sick-berth attendant, with surgical appliances.

Surgeon Landon, A.M.D., with four of the A.H.C., also being with the troops.

The detachment from Naval Brigade, 64 in number, under Commander Romilly with Lieutenants Trower, Scott, and myself, reached the top of Majuba Mountain at about 4 A.M. on February 27th, the last part of the route being most precipitous. Portions of the 92nd, 58th, with General Colley, first preceded us. Day broke a few minutes after we had gained the summit, and the troops were told off to their respective positions.

Surgeon Landon and myself then chose a position for the hospital near the centre of the plateau, behind a ridge of rocks, and calculated to be out of the enemy's fire. A well was immediately dug near this spot, and a good supply of water was obtained at the depth of three feet.

After about an hour a few shots began to be exchanged, but none of our force were hit for about an hour. A desultory fire continued up to about 11 A.M., up to which time five of the 92nd only had been slightly wounded, and were dressed by Landon and myself. At about 11 A.M. I went over to the west side of the plateau (see diagram) to see how Lieutenants Scott and Trower were getting on. I had hardly been there three minutes when I heard a bullet explode close to us. I heard the General say "Captain Romilly is hit," and turning round saw General Colley kneeling by the side of the Commander, who was lying on the ground about four yards from us. I sent for a stretcher, and proceeded to dress the wound, which I found to perforate the left side of the abdomen and coming out at the loins. The bullet had only passed through soft parts, which accounts for its not exploding inside the body.

I had him carried to the hospital.

From this time up to 12 o'clock the fire continued on all sides in a desultory manner, being much brisker, however, on the east and north-east fronts. At about a quarter to 1 P.M. the Boers' fire, which up to this had been much brisker than ours (I should say they had fired six shots to our one), almost entirely ceased. At about 1 o'clock they advanced in force on the E.N.E. front, and poured in a tremendous fire. Some blue jackets and some of the 58th were sent to reinforce the 92nd, and the Boers retired, but immediately advanced in greater numbers a little more to the left.

The fire now became so hot, and the hospital being partially exposed to it, I had the Commander removed on a stretcher by Bevis and Bone, L.S., to a sheltered spot on the south-west front.

I was returning to the hospital when I saw our force beginning a retreat, which soon became a rout. The Boers gained the rocks just above the hospital in great numbers, and poured a

tremendous fire indiscriminately on everybody they saw. Dr. Landon and two of the A.H.C. were shot down whilst attending to the wounded, the former being mortally wounded.

I then went back to the Commander, and fixed my handkerchief on a stick, and held it up over him, but it was almost immediately shot away, and a hot volley fired all round us. Bevis then fixed a piece of lint on a bayonet, but was immediately twice shot through the helmet. I ordered him to lie down until the last of our men had passed us, and did the same myself. When the Boers had driven our men over the side of the hill, and had got within fifteen paces, I got up with a piece of lint in my hand, and shouted to them that I was a doctor, and had a wounded man with me. Two or three of the younger Boers wanted to shoot us, but were prevented by the elder men. The Boers then got all round us, and opened fire on our men retreating down the side of the hill.

While they were thus engaged, Bevis and myself picked up the stretcher, and carried Commander Romilly back to where the hospital was.

When about half-way across we were surrounded by Boers, who were with great difficulty prevented from shooting the Commander as he lay, they being under the idea that he was either Sir Garnet Wolseley or Sir Evelyn Wood. Having assured them to the contrary I asked to see their Commander, who was pointed out to me (I think it was Ferriera). I asked him protection for the wounded, which was immediately granted. In fact, after the heat of the action, the Boers, especially the elder ones, were most kind in their attention to the wounded, getting them water, and some helping to bind up their wounds. I saw no Boers killed or wounded.

It was now about 2.30 P.M., and Bevis and myself with the two A.H.C. men who were unwounded, set to work to dress the wounded.

All who could walk were allowed by the Boers to make the best of their way to camp, and many did so, but I am unable to estimate the number. The prisoners who were taken by the Boers were made to assist in carrying the wounded from various parts of the hill to the hospital. But they were taken away to the Boer laager at about 6 P.M.

I had sent the Commander with four blue jackets (prisoners) on a stretcher to the spot where we had first ascended the hill. They managed to get him down safely some part of the way, but then three of them were ordered back by the Boers. However, they allowed one man to stay with him, and there they remained all night under a bush. The Commander was found by Dr. Ring, A.M.D. in the morning, not much the worse, and was sent into camp, where he arrived safely.

(I did not know of this till afterwards.)

At about 6 P.M. a thick mist began to come over the hill, accompanied by a drizzling rain.

Bevis and myself searched as much of the hill as we could for wounded, and found two or three, but were eventually compelled to desist on account of the thickness of the mist. I had all the wounded, 36 in number, placed on one spot near the well, and luckily we found blankets and just enough waterproof sheets to cover them all. All we had to give them was water and a little opium, the Boers having taken all our brandy.

It now commenced to rain heavily, and continued to do so without intermission during the whole night, which much aggravated the sufferings of the wounded. It also became bitterly cold towards morning. The darkness also was so intense that it was almost impossible to attempt

to alleviate the sufferings of the wounded without stumbling over them. We had neither lantern nor matches.

Daylight returned at about 5 A.M., and with it also the Boers. I found that four men had succumbed to the inclemency of the weather during the night.

At about 6 A.M. Drs. Babbington and Ring, with medical comforts, stretchers, and stretcher-bearers, under Lieutenant Cochran, arrived.

The dead were collected and placed in a row ready for interment, and the wounded, as many as possible, were placed on the stretchers, and sent down the mountain under my charge. We dressed a few wounded on the side of the hill, who had been lying there all night, but were not able to bring them on with us.

We reached O'Neill's farm, which is turned into a temporary hospital, at about 3 P.M.

I then brought on five ambulances full of wounded into camp, where I arrived at about 5 P.M., 28th February.

I wish to speak most highly of the conduct of William Bevis, sick-berth attendant, for his coolness and courage during the action, and the invaluable assistance he rendered me afterwards during the night, and up to the present time.

I regret to state that Commander Romilly died from mortification of the intestines at 2 P.M. on March 2nd. William Plastine, L.S., is severely wounded in the abdomen, and I have little hope of his recovery. The rest of the wounded are progressing favourably. Five of the slightly wounded have been sent down to the military hospital at Newcastle, viz.:—W. Kemp, G. Bridge, G. Sponder, D. Bone, F. Cross.

under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish; Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the Rector of Saint Vedast and the churchwardens of the united parish of Saint Vedast (otherwise Foster) and Saint Michael-le-Querne, has made a representation, stating that, for the purpose of preventing the vaults under the floor of the church of Saint Vedast, in the city of London, from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the said vaults do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz.:

- (1.) All the unfilled vaults and walled graves to be entirely filled with fresh dry earth and fresh dry charcoal in powder.
- (2.) The whole floor of the church to be then covered with a layer of concrete, nine inches in thickness.
- (3.) The above works to be carried out under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the city of London.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 16 of The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Order of 1881, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Preliminary.

1. This Order may be cited as THE OXFORDSHIRE (MOVEMENT OF ANIMALS) ORDER OF 1881.

2. This Order shall commence and take effect

from and immediately after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.

3. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order.

Prohibition of Movement.

4. No animal shall be moved into the District of the Local Authority of the county of Oxford from the district of the Local Authority of the borough of Banbury.

5. Nothing in this Order affects the transit of animals through the District of the Local Authority of the county of Oxford by railway, without untrucking.

Offences.

6. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person or company moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been so moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Cheshire.—(1.) The township of Seacombe, in the petty sessional division of Wirral, in the county of Chester.

(2.) The township of Sutton, in the petty sessional division of Prestbury, in the county of Chester.

(3.) The township of Haslington, in the petty sessional division of Nantwich, in the county of Chester.

(4.) The township of Tiverton, in the petty sessional division of Eddisbury, in the county of Chester.

(5.) The township of Torkington, in the petty sessional division of Stockport, in the county of Chester.

(5.) The parish of Aveley, in the petty sessional division of Orsett, in the county of Essex.

Gloucestershire.—The petty sessional division of Tewkesbury, in the county of Gloucester, and the borough of Tewkesbury.

Huntingdonshire.—So much of the petty sessional division of Ramsey as lies within the following boundaries (namely),—the Great Northern Railway on the west, Connington brook—"Baonch's Drain," on the north, and the parish boundaries of Woodwalton adjoining Higney fen on the east and south.

(2.) The parishes of Bradley, Great Coates, and Laceby, in the petty sessional division of Grimsby, in the Parts of Lindsey.

(3.) The parishes of Ashby Puerorum, Hameringham, Hagworthingham, Mareham-on-the-Hill, Scafield, and Winceby, in the petty sessional division of Horncastle, in the Parts of Lindsey.

(4.) The parishes of Great Carlton, and Manby, in the petty sessional division of Louth, in the Parts of Lindsey.

(5.) Whereas it is of importance to all classes of Our subjects that the conditions under which persons are permitted to represent themselves as qualified Medical Practitioners should be such as

to afford the best attainable security for their skill and knowledge in Medicine and Surgery.

And whereas powers in relation to the education and examination for a grant of Medical Degrees, Diplomas, or Licences to Medical Practitioners are by various Statutes and Charters vested in certain Universities, Medical Colleges, and other Bodies in the United Kingdom.

And whereas under "The Medical Act, 1858," and the Acts amending the same, the General Council of Medical Education and Registration was constituted, and vested with a superintendence over the exercise of the said powers, and also with entering in a Register of Medical Practitioners, and removing therefrom the holders of certain medical qualifications obtained in the United Kingdom, exclusive of those obtained in Our Colonies or in Foreign States.

And whereas by the last-mentioned Acts certain exclusive privileges were conferred on the persons so registered, and persons not so registered were placed under certain restrictions, disabilities, and penalties.

And whereas divers representations have been made in Parliament, and otherwise, and both from Our subjects in the United Kingdom, and from the Governments of Our Possessions out of the United Kingdom, in relation to the unsatisfactory position of the above matters.
