

Gransden, in the petty sessional division of Caxton, in the county of Cambridge.

(4.) The parish of West Wrattling, and so much of the adjacent parish of Balsham as is in the occupation of Thomas Burkis, in the petty sessional division of Linton, in the county of Cambridge.

(5.) The parishes of Burwell, and Wicken, and the hamlet of Burwell Reach, in the petty sessional division of Newmarket, in the county of Cambridge.

Carnarvonshire.—The parishes of Llanbeblig, and Llanfairisgaer, in the county of Carnarvon, and the borough of Carnarvon.

Derbyshire.—(1.) The district of St. Thomas' Brampton, which consists of parts of the several parishes, townships, or places of Brampton, Walton, and Newbold, in the petty sessional division of Chesterfield, in the county of Derby.

(2.) The petty sessional division of Derby, except the parish of Osmaston, in the county of Derby.

(3.) The petty sessional divisions of Ashbourne, and Sudbury, in the county of Derby.

(4.) The parish of Crich, in the petty sessional division of Belper, in the county of Derby.

(5.) The petty sessional division of Swadlincote, in the county of Derby.

Dorsetshire.—(1.) The parishes of Turnworth, Winterbourne Clenston, Winterbourne Houghton, and Winterbourne Stickland, in the petty sessional division of Blandford, in the county of Dorset.

(2.) The parishes of Tarrant Keinston, and Tarrant Rawston, in the petty sessional division of Blandford, and the parishes of Preston-cum-Crawford, Tarrant Rushton, and Witchampton, in the petty sessional division of Wimborne, in the county of Dorset.

(3.) The parishes of Chaldon Herring, West Lulworth, and Winfrith Newburgh, in the petty sessional division of Wareham, and Owermoigne, in the petty sessional division of Dorchester, in the county of Dorset.

Durham.—(1.) So much of the county of Durham, as lies between the river Derwent as far as Lintz Ford on the south, the road leading to the Spen on the west, Blaydon Burn stream on the north, and the river Tyne on the north-east, in the township of Winlaton.

(2.) That part of the township of Cockerton which is bounded on the south by the Cockerbeck, on the west by the beck or stream at the west end of the village of Cockerton, on the north by a back lane leading from the west end of that village to the West Auckland-road to the point where the Alma Hotel stands on that road, and on the east by the boundary of the borough of Darlington up to the Cockerbeck, in the south-east division of Darlington Ward, in the county of Durham.

(3.) The petty sessional division of the south-west division of Stockton Ward, in the county of Durham.

(4.) So much of the petty sessional division of the west division of Chester Ward, in the county of Durham, as lies within the following boundaries (namely),—on the south by a stream running to the north of Hedley Edge to New Cornsay, on the east by a road leading from New Cornsay to Clickern-in-Cross-road and thence by Rackwood Side to Browney Stream to Satlay and Cornsay-road on the north, thence on the west to Towlaw over a stream north of Hedley Edge.

(5.) The townships of Penshaw, Newbottle, East and Middle Herrington, West Herrington, and Silksworth, forming the eastern portion of the petty sessional division of Houghton-le-Spring, in the county of Durham.

Essex.—(1.) The whole of the petty sessional division of Beacontree, in the county of Essex.

(2.) The parishes of Borley, Bulmer, Great Yeldham, Sturmer, Foxearth, Ovington, Ridgwell, Toppesfield, and Stambourne, in the petty sessional division of Hinckford North, in the county of Essex.

(3.) The hamlet of Bures, in the petty sessional division of Hinckford South, in the county of Essex.

(4.) The parish of Aveley, in the petty sessional division of Orsett, in the county of Essex.

Gloucestershire.—The parishes of South Cerney, Siddington, and Preston, the tything of Chesterton, in the parish of Cirencester, and the district of the Local Board of Cirencester, in the county of Gloucester.

Huntingdonshire.—(1.) So much of the petty sessional division of Ramsey as lies within the following boundaries (namely),—the Great Northern Railway on the west, Connington brook—"Baouch's Drain," on the north, and the parish boundaries of Woodwalton adjoining Higney fen on the east and south.

(2.) The borough of St. Ives, in the county of Huntingdon.

Lancashire.—The townships of Barton-upon-Irwell, Stretford, Heaton Norris, the hamlet of Mossley, the townships of Tonge, Royton, Chatterton, Thornham, Butterworth, the hamlet of Whitworth lower end, in the hundred of Salford; the townships of Eccles Hill, and Clayton-le-dale, in the hundred of Blackburn; and the township of Ditton, in the hundred of West Derby; in the county of Lancaster, and the boroughs of Accrington, Burnley, and Salford.

Leicestershire.—The county of Leicester, and the borough of Leicester.

Lincolnshire (Lindsey).—So much of the petty sessional division of Spilsby, in the Parts of Lindsey, as is bounded on the north by the road leading from Burgh to Ingoldmells Mill, commencing at the north-west corner of a field called the Far Meadow, the property of Mr. R. S. Stephenson, and proceeding eastwardly so far as the road leading from Ingoldmells Mill to Winthorpe, on the east by the last-named road so far as a cottage in the occupation of Henry Coupland, on the south by a line drawn from such cottage to the south-west corner of a field belonging to Mr. Robert Wright, (adjoining a field called the Far Four Acres belonging to Mr. Samuel Raithby,) and on the west by the fences on the west sides of the following fields all adjoining, namely,—a field belonging to Mr. Ashlin Cutforth, two fields called respectively the Six Acres and Seg Close belonging to Mr. Henry Searby, a field called the Seven Acres belonging to Mr. William Coupland, a field called Guide Post Three Acres belonging to Mr. Charles Acred, and the before-named field called the Far Meadow belonging to Mr. R. S. Stephenson, exclusive of the above-named boundary roads, and which area includes portions of the parishes of Addlethorpe, Ingoldmells, and Winthorpe.

Norfolk.—(1.) The hundred of Freebridge Marsh-
