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BRIGANDAGE.

THE following Circular has been addressed by Earl Granville to Her Majesty's representatives abroad, informing them of the decision of Her Majesty's Government to make no pecuniary advances in future to ransom British subjects, when in no public character, in the event of their being captured by Brigands:—

Foreign Office, July 22, 1881.

TWO recent cases of brigandage in European Turkey which led to the capture of Colonel Synge and Mr. Suter, and their subsequent release on payment to the brigands of heavy ransoms advanced by Her Majesty's Government, have forced Her Majesty's Government to consider the principles which should govern their conduct in similar cases in future, and they have come to the conclusion that where British subjects are captured by brigands, when in no public character, but in pursuit of their own pleasure or business, no advance whatever for the purposes of ransom should, under any circumstances, be made from the British Exchequer.

I have accordingly addressed the instructions, of which I enclose a copy, to Her Majesty's Ambassador at the Porte, desiring him to make it known to British subjects who may be residing, or who may hereafter take up their abode, in any of the provinces of Turkey where brigandage prevails, that they do so at their own risk, and that Her Majesty's Government cannot in future undertake to make pecuniary advances to ransom them from the hands of brigands in the event of their being captured, or to relieve them from the dangers they may incur from a residence in Turkish territory.

The principle thus laid down applies to British subjects not only in the Ottoman Empire, but in other countries, and it is desirable that the decision of Her Majesty's Government should be universally known.

I have, therefore, to request to take such steps as you may think most effectual for giving it the widest publicity in your power.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such Power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Danish subjects) who desert from British merchant ships in territories belonging to His Majesty the King of Denmark, will be given under an Agreement between the Governments of Great Britain and Denmark, signed at London on the 21st of June, 1881.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of Denmark within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their re-

spective ships ; provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is further pleased to order and declare that upon and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, the Order in Council relating to Seamen who desert from the merchant ships belonging to the subjects of the King of Denmark made, by virtue of the said Act, on the 13th day of June, 1853, and published in the London Gazette on the 14th day of June, 1853, shall be revoked, and the same is hereby revoked accordingly.

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS, by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction in and over Cyprus :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts 1843 to 1878, or otherwise, in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order may be cited as The Cyprus Extradition Order in Council, 1881.

EXTRADITION FROM CYPRUS.

A.—GENERAL POWER.

2.—(a.) In the circumstances, and under the conditions, in this Order appearing and prescribed, persons found in Cyprus, and accused or convicted of offences committed in foreign countries, or in any part of the Ottoman dominions other than Cyprus, shall be given up to the respective Governments of those countries, or to the Ottoman Government, as the case may be, for trial there, or, in the case of persons so convicted, for the purpose of undergoing lawful punishment for the offences of which they were so convicted.

(b.) In every case the offence must be an offence which, if committed within British jurisdiction, would be an offence comprised in the First Schedule to this Order : and every such offence is in this Order referred to as a scheduled offence.

(c.) The list of scheduled offences shall be construed according to the law of Cyprus, relating to British subjects, as that law existed, in case of an offence committed before the British occupation of Cyprus, at the date of this Order ; and as that law existed, in case of an offence committed since that occupation, at the date of the alleged offence, —whether the same existed at common law, or under Statute or Ordinance made before or after the passing of this Order.

B.—PERSONS ACCUSED.

Request to High Commissioner.

3.—(a.) If a person, being or being alleged to be in Cyprus, is alleged to be a fugitive from a foreign country, or from any part of the Ottoman dominions other than Cyprus, and to be under prosecution there for a scheduled offence ; and

(b.) If a request for his extradition is made to the High Commissioner by the Government of that foreign country, or by the Ottoman Government, through a person recognized by the High Commissioner as a Consular or other officer of the requesting Government, authorized in that behalf ; and

(c.) If the request is accompanied (i.) by a warrant of arrest or other equivalent judicial document, issued by a judge, magistrate, or other person lawfully exercising jurisdiction in the country from which the person whose extradition is sought is alleged to be a fugitive, and (ii.) by depositions or statements taken or made on oath or affirmation before such a judge or magistrate, and authenticated as prescribed by this Order, clearly stating those acts, and containing a description of the person claimed, and any particulars that may serve to identify him ;

(d.) The High Commissioner may, if he thinks fit, signify the request to the High Court.

Warrant of High Court.

4. Thereupon, and on such evidence being adduced as would, in the judgment of the High Court, justify the issue of a warrant for the apprehension of a British subject charged before it with an indictable offence, the Court may, if it thinks fit, issue a warrant for the apprehension, for purposes of this Order, of the fugitive.

Jurisdiction of Court.

5. On and after the issue of the warrant, as well before as after the fugitive is brought before the High Court thereon, the Court shall have the like jurisdiction and powers as in case of a British subject charged before it with an indictable offence.

Foreign Evidence.

6.—(a.) Foreign or Ottoman depositions and statements taken or made on oath or affirmation, and copies thereof, and foreign or Ottoman warrants or other judicial instruments authorizing apprehension, and foreign or Ottoman certificates of conviction or judicial instruments stating a conviction, shall be receivable in evidence under this Order, if authenticated, to the satisfaction of the High Court, in manner provided by law independently of this Order, or in manner following :

(i.) If the depositions, statements, or copies purport to be certified as originals or as true copies by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the country where they were taken ; or

(ii.) If the warrant, certificate, or judicial instrument purports to be signed by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the country where it was issued ; and

(iii.) If every deposition, statement, copy, warrant, certificate, or judicial instrument is proved by the oath of a witness, or is sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or other Minister of State, of the country where it was taken or issued ; for which purpose judicial notice shall be taken of that seal.

(b.) Such depositions and statements shall be receivable in evidence, whether they are taken or made in the particular charge or not, or in the presence of the person charged or not.

7. The fugitive shall not be liable to interrogation by or before the High Court ; but he may, if he thinks fit, tender himself to be sworn and examined as a witness on his own behalf ; and thereupon he may give evidence in the same manner, and with the like effect and consequences, as regards cross-examination and perjury and otherwise, as any other witness.

Committal for Extradition.

8.—(a.) If the High Court is satisfied that the

person brought before it is a fugitive, as alleged ; and

(b.) If the foreign or Ottoman warrant, or other judicial instrument authorizing his apprehension is authenticated as required by this Order ; and

(c.) If such evidence is adduced as subject to the provisions of this Order, would, in the judgment of the Court, justify a committal for trial if the fugitive had been a British subject, and the offence of which he is accused had been committed in Cyprus ;

(d.) The Court shall commit the fugitive to prison, for extradition ; but, otherwise, shall discharge him from custody.

C.—PERSONS CONVICTED.

Application of foregoing Provisions.

9.—(a.) If a person, being or being alleged to be in Cyprus, is alleged to be a fugitive from a foreign country, or from any part of the Ottoman dominions other than Cyprus, and to have been convicted there of a scheduled offence ; and

(b.) If a request is made for his extradition in manner aforesaid ;

(c.) The course of proceeding shall be as prescribed in the foregoing provisions of this Order ; except that—

(i.) The judicial documents accompanying the request shall clearly state the offence, and the place and time of conviction ; and

(ii.) The evidence to be adduced before the High Court shall be such as, in the judgment of the Court, to prove the fact of conviction.

D.—PERSONS ACCUSED OR CONVICTED.

Habeas Corpus.

10.—(a.) A person committed for extradition under this Order shall have a right to apply to the High Court for a writ of habeas corpus, or an order in the nature thereof.

(b.) If he so applies, he shall not be given up before the decision of the Court on the return to the writ or order.

Proceedings on Committal.

11. On committal, the High Court shall inform the fugitive that he will not be given up before the expiration of fifteen days from committal, and that he may, at any time before he is given up, apply to the Court for a writ of habeas corpus, or an order in the nature thereof ; but the fugitive may then and there waive his right so to apply, and in that case he may be given up before the expiration of that time.

12. On committal, the Court shall forthwith send to the High Commissioner a certificate thereof and of such waiver as aforesaid (if any), and such a report on the case as the Court thinks fit.

Order for Extradition.

13. Where a fugitive is committed for extradition, the High Commissioner, after the expiration of the time limited in this behalf by this Order, or sooner, in case of such a waiver as aforesaid, may, if he thinks fit, issue an order directing that the fugitive be given up to a person therein described, being in the High Commissioner's opinion, authorized to receive the fugitive on behalf of the requesting Government.

Removal from Cyprus.

14.—(a.) The person to whom the fugitive is by such Order directed to be given up may receive the fugitive in Cyprus, and hold him in custody there, and convey him out of Cyprus.

(b.) The High Commissioner shall cause all lawful and reasonable assistance in that behalf to be afforded to that person.

(c.) If the fugitive escapes in Cyprus out of the custody of that person, he may be retaken as a

British subject may be retaken in Cyprus on an escape.

Property in Possession of Fugitive.

15. Everything found in the possession of the fugitive on his apprehension, including not only property obtained by him by fraudulent bankruptcy, or otherwise unlawfully, but also everything that may serve as evidence of the offence in question, shall, if the High Court thinks fit, be seized, and saving the rights of third parties, be given up either with the fugitive on his extradition, or without him if, by reason of his escape or death, the extradition, though granted, cannot be carried into effect.

E.—RESTRICTIONS ON EXTRADITION.

Political Offences.

16. A fugitive shall not be given up if the offence in question is, in the judgment of the High Commissioner, or of the High Court, of a political character.

17. If, at any time during the proceedings for extradition, it is shown to the satisfaction of the High Commissioner that the offence in question is of a political character,—or that the request for extradition is made with a view to the trial or punishment of the fugitive for an offence of a political character,—the High Commissioner shall refrain from signifying the request to the High Court, or shall issue an order directing that the fugitive be discharged from custody (as the case may require).

18. The High Court shall, at any time during the proceedings for extradition, receive any evidence tendered to show that the offence in question is of a political character,—or that the request for extradition is made with a view to the trial or punishment of the fugitive for an offence of a political character,—and if, by that evidence, or otherwise, the Court is, at any time during the proceedings for extradition, satisfied that the offence is of that character,—or that the request is made with that view,—the Court shall refrain from issuing a warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive, or shall discharge him from custody (as the case may require).

Limitation of Time.

19. A fugitive shall not be given up, except on such waiver as aforesaid, before the expiration of fifteen days from his committal for extradition.

20. If a fugitive committed for extradition is not given up and conveyed out of Cyprus within two calendar months from the committal,—or from the decision against him on the return of a writ of habeas corpus or of an order in the nature thereof,—then, on application to the Court by him or on his behalf, at any time after the expiration of those two months, and on proof of reasonable notice of the application having been given to the High Commissioner, the Court may, if it thinks fit, order that, unless good cause be shown to the contrary, within a time limited by the Court, the fugitive be discharged from custody ; and the Court may afterwards, if it thinks fit, discharge him from custody accordingly.

Trial for Offence in question only.

21. A fugitive shall not be given up unless the High Commissioner is satisfied that provision is made by the law of the country of the requesting Government, or by lawful arrangement with that Government, to the effect that the fugitive shall not be detained or tried in that country for any offence committed there before his extradition, other than a scheduled offence proveable by the facts on which his extradition is grounded, unless and until he has been restored, or had a reason-

able opportunity of returning, to a place within British jurisdiction.

22. A fugitive shall not be given up if he has been tried in Cyprus for the offence in question, or is under prosecution there for that offence.

23. A fugitive shall not be given up if, at any time during the proceedings for his extradition, it is shown to the satisfaction of the High Court, that since the commission of the offence in question, he has, according to the law of the country of the requesting Government, acquired, by lapse of time or otherwise, exemption from prosecution or punishment in that country for the offence in question.

24. A fugitive who is under prosecution in Cyprus for an offence other than that in question, —or who is undergoing in Cyprus punishment under a conviction there for an offence other than that in question,—shall not be given up before he has been lawfully discharged in respect of that prosecution or conviction, by acquittal, or on expiration of his term of punishment, or otherwise.

F.—GENERAL APPLICATION OF FOREGOING PROVISIONS.

25. This Order applies whether the offence in question was committed before or after the passing of this Order.

26. This Order applies whether there is or is not concurrent jurisdiction in any Court in Cyprus in relation to the offence in question.

27. A fugitive is liable to be given up, notwithstanding the existence of any civil obligations contracted by him in Cyprus, or any detention or proceedings there, which he is undergoing, or to which he may be subject, in consequence of such obligations.

28. For purposes of this Order, every colony, dependency, and constituent member of a country, and every vessel of that country, is part of that country, and every vessel of any part of the Ottoman dominions, other than Cyprus, is part of those dominions.

29. This Order applies whether the fugitive is or is not an Ottoman subject or a British subject.

30. For purposes of this Order, a fugitive accused or convicted of having counselled, procured, commanded, aided, or abetted, the commission of an offence, or of having been accessory thereto, before or after the fact, is a fugitive accused or convicted (as the case may be) of having committed that offence, provided that such counselling, procuring, commanding, aiding, or abetting, or being accessory, would be an indictable offence if committed by a British subject in Cyprus, and would also be punishable as an offence by the law of the country of the requesting Government.

31. For purposes of this Order, a foreign conviction by default, or on contumacy, is an accusation only, and not a conviction.

G.—APPREHENSION IN ANTICIPATION OF REQUEST.

32. Where it is shown to the satisfaction of the High Court that there are reasonable grounds for believing that a person who is in Cyprus is a fugitive from a foreign country, or from some part of the Ottoman dominions other than Cyprus, and is accused or has been convicted of a scheduled offence committed there, and that a request is about to be made for his extradition, the Court may, if it thinks fit, issue a warrant for his apprehension, and for his being brought before the Court, with a view to his detention until reasonable opportunity for a request has been given; and, thereupon, the Court may, if it

thinks fit, either remand him to custody for a reasonable time, and so from time to time, or at any time, discharge him from custody.

H.—GENERAL.

Judicial Commissioner.

33. In all proceedings relating to extradition the High Court shall act by the Judicial Commissioner.

Evidence to show not scheduled Offence.

34. At any time during proceedings for extradition, the High Commissioner, or the High Court, shall receive any evidence tendered to show that the offence in question is not a scheduled offence.

Treatment after Committal.

35. A person committed for extradition shall at all times during the proceedings for his extradition be treated in custody in the manner in which a British subject, charged before the High Court with an indictable offence, is entitled by law to be treated in custody, during a remand.

Orders of High Commissioner.

36. Every order of the High Commissioner under this Order shall be obeyed and acted on by the High Court, and by all keepers of prisons, constables, and others, without question.

Writing; Signature; Seal.

37. Every request for extradition, and every signification, warrant, certificate, and order under this Order, shall be in writing, signed by the person making or issuing the same, or some other person lawfully authorized in that behalf, and sealed, in the case of an instrument made or issued by the High Commissioner, with his official seal, and in the case of an instrument issuing from the High Court, with the seal of the Court.

Forms in Schedule.

38. The Forms in the Second Schedule to this Order may be used, with variations and additions according to circumstances, in cases to which those Forms refer, and when so used shall be valid and sufficient in law.

EXTRADITION TO CYPRUS.

39.—(a.) With a view to a request to be made by the High Commissioner to a foreign Government or to the Ottoman Government for the extradition of a fugitive, the High Court may, if it thinks fit, on a suggestion on behalf of the High Commissioner, and on a sworn information, issue its warrant for the apprehension in Cyprus of the fugitive.

(b.) But the High Court shall not so issue its warrant if it appears to the Court that the offence in question is of a political character, and the Court shall receive any evidence tendered in that behalf.

(c.) The High Court may also, if it thinks fit, from time to time, as well after as before the issue of the warrant, take and certify any supplementary evidence tendered in aid of the proceedings for obtaining the extradition.

40. In case of the extradition of any person to Cyprus by the Government of a foreign country or by the Ottoman Government—

(i.) he shall not be triable or punishable in Cyprus for an offence of a political character; and

(ii.) he shall not be triable in Cyprus for any offence committed within British jurisdiction before his extradition, other than a scheduled offence proveable by the facts on which the extradition is grounded, unless and until he has been restored to the country by whose Government he was given up, or has had, in the judgment of the High Commissioner, reasonable opportunity of returning thereto.

TAKING OF EVIDENCE FOR FOREIGN
PROSECUTION.

41.—(a.) Where it is shown to the satisfaction of the High Commissioner that a criminal prosecution is pending before a foreign Court, or a Court in any part of the Ottoman dominions other than Cyprus, he may, if he thinks fit, issue an order requiring the High Court to take evidence for the purposes thereof,—provided that he is satisfied that the offence in question is not of a political character, and that the evidence is not sought with a view to the trial or punishment of any person for an offence of a political character.

(b.) Thereupon, the Court shall take the evidence of every witness appearing, as on a charge before the Court of an indictable offence, and shall certify at the foot of the depositions or informations that they were so taken; save that the evidence may be taken in the absence of the person, if any, charged, and the fact of his presence, or of his absence, shall appear on the depositions or informations.

(c.) For that purpose any person in Cyprus, after payment or tender to him of a reasonable sum for his expenses, shall be compellable to appear, and give evidence, and produce documents, as on a charge before the Court of an indictable offence.

(d.) The Court shall send the depositions or informations to the High Commissioner, with such a report, if any, on the case, as the Court thinks fit.

(e.) If any person wilfully gives false evidence under this Article he shall be guilty of perjury.

APPLICATION TO CYPRUS OF FUGITIVE
OFFENDERS' ACTS.

42.—The Fugitive Offenders' Act 1843, or so much thereof as is for the time being in force, and any enactment for the time being in force, amending or substituted for the same, are hereby extended to Cyprus with the following adaptations, namely:—

(a.) In sections 2 and 6 of the Fugitive Offenders' Act 1843, the High Court of Justice, acting by the Judicial Commissioner, shall be deemed to be substituted for a Judge of a Superior Court in a Colony.

(b.) In sections 3, 5, and 6 of the same Act, the High Commissioner shall be deemed to be substituted for the Governor of a Colony.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

"And whereas the said Henry George Earl of Ravensworth is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Tanfield now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Durham.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Joseph Barber now Bishop of the said diocese of Durham is willing to accept for himself and his successors in the bishoprick of Durham the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Joseph Barber Bishop of Durham has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas the said annual grant of fifty pounds will be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“And whereas the Reverend William Walter Kirby rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parochial chapelry of Saint Mary Barnsley aforesaid as Chairman of the Association for administering the said Saint Peter's Church Endowment Fund, and also as a contributor to the same fund, and John Tyas, of Regent-street, Barnsley Solicitor, with Richard Carter of Huddersfield-road, Barnsley, Manufacturer, being the two honorary secretaries of the said Association, and being both subscribers to the same fund, and George Guest, of Market-hill, Barnsley, Grocer, as Treasurer of the said fund, and also as a contributor to the same have each acting for himself, and also for the other contributors to the said fund nominated to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners the said William Walter Kirby, as rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parochial chapelry of Saint Mary, Barnsley aforesaid, and his successors in the said rectory as the person or persons to whom it is desired that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Mary, Barnsley which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Peter, Barnsley.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William Walter Kirby, rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Mary, Barnsley, and by his successors rectors of the same rectory for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of

them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Peter, Barnsley, being:—

"All that part of the parochial chapelry of Saint Mary, Barnsley, within the original limits of the parish of Silkstone, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parochial chapelry now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-east by the chapelry district of Monk Bretton in the said county of York, and in the diocese of York, on the south-east partly by the new parish of Ardsley and partly by the new parish of Saint Thomas Worsborough Dale, both in the last-named county and diocese, on the south-west partly by the new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, in the said county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon aforesaid, and upon all other sides that is to say upon the remaining part of the south-west and upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, from the parochial chapelry of Saint Mary Barnsley aforesaid, at the point where the street called or known as Newland is joined by the street called or known as Cheapside, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction at the southern corner of the open space called or known as May Day Green with the roadway which leads across the said open space and extending thence northward for a distance of three-and-a-half chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said roadway to its junction with Jumble-lane, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of seven-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Swin-hill Field-road, and continuing thence still eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of sixteen-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to its eastern end at the entrance to the Queen's Public Pleasure Grounds, and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts thereby crossing the said Queen's Public Pleasure Grounds, to the Barnsley Canal Junction where the Dearne and Dove Canal joins the Barnsley Canal, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the last-named canal for a distance of four-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the aqueduct which carries the same canal over the River Dearne which boundary divides the said parochial chapelry of Saint Mary, Barnsley, from the chapelry district of Monk Bretton aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbent of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Mary Barnsley out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same

and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Durham which said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge was sometime part of the parish of Warden in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge is now vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Warden.

"And whereas the Reverend George Cruddas Clerk in Holy Orders is the present vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Warden.

"And whereas a certain sum of one hundred pounds sterling has been paid by the said George Cruddas to the credit of our account at the Bank of England in augmentation of the endowment of the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge and we have in respect of the said capital sum agreed and undertaken to pay to the vicar or incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge (being duly licensed to the same benefice) the yearly sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said George Cruddas has of late made to our satisfaction other and large benefactions in favour of the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge and the said capital sum of one hundred pounds sterling has been so paid by him as aforesaid upon the specific understanding and condition that a transfer of the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge from the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Warden (in whom the same is now vested as aforesaid) to the Bishop of the said diocese of Durham or to the Bishop for the time being of any other diocese within which the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge may from time to time be situate shall be effected by the agency of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"And whereas the said George Cruddas is the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Warden of which vicarage he is also the incumbent as aforesaid.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Joseph Barber, now Bishop of the said diocese of Durham is willing to accept for himself and his successors the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts recited in the hereinbefore mentioned Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas it appears to us that the transfer of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the new parish of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge being the parish or district in or in respect of which the said advowson right of patronage and presentation arises or exists.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said George Cruddas the patron and also the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Warden as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge now vested in the said George Cruddas as such vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Warden as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said George Cruddas and from his successors vicars or incumbents of the said vicarage of the parish of Warden aforesaid to and shall be absolutely vested in and exercised by the said Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham and his successors Bishops of Durham.

"Provided always and we further recommend and propose that if at any time hereafter the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge shall cease to be within the diocese of Durham and shall become and be within some other diocese then and thenceforth the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Cuthbert Haydon Bridge shall be absolutely vested in and exercised by the Bishop for the time being of that other diocese and not by the Bishop of Durham.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme,

and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, situate at Everton, within the limits of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint George situate at Everton as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint George, situate at Everton as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint George, Everton.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint George, situate at Everton as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Thomas Hornby, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill shall continue

to be such vicar or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint George, situate at Everton as aforesaid; shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Thomas Hornby; and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint George, Everton, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Liverpool comprising and consisting of a portion of the territory which has been hitherto called or known as the Conventional Ecclesiastical District of Saint George Everton, which said part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill aforesaid is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such part from the particular district of Saint Peter, Everton, in the said county and diocese at the point where Netherfield-road South is joined by Netherfield-road North, and by the road called or known as George's-hill, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cochrane-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Heyworth-street upon the boundary which divides the said part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the district chapelry of Saint Saviour Everton, in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence alternately northward and eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts, thereby following the course of the streets or roads called or known respectively as Heyworth-street aforesaid, Friar-street, Monk-street, Springfield, Mere-lane, and Breckfield-road North, to the point at the junction of the last-named road with Granton-road, where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the same part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Everton, in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward then north-eastward and then westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts, thereby following the course of the streets or roads called or known respectively as Breckfield-road North aforesaid, Beacon-lane, and Calder-street, to the point, at the junction of the last-named street with Sherlock-street, where the said last-mentioned boundary leaves Calder-street aforesaid, and extending thence, that is from the said last-mentioned boundary, westward along the middle of the said Calder-street for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint Domingo-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four and a half-chains or thereabouts to its junction with Melbourne-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-

named street for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point at the junction of the same street with Netherfield-road North aforesaid, upon the boundary which divides the said part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the chapelry district of Saint Mary, Kirkdale, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of four and a half-chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of Netherfield-road North aforesaid to the point at the junction of the last-named road with Thomaston-street where the said last-mentioned boundary leaves Netherfield-road North aforesaid, and continuing thence still southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-six chains, or thereabouts (thereby following the boundary which divides that part of the said parish which has been hitherto called or known as the Conventional Ecclesiastical District of Saint George Everton as aforesaid from that part of the same parish which is now called or known as the Conventional Ecclesiastical District of Christ Church, Everton) to the point at the junction of the said Netherfield-road North with Opie-street, upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Peter, Everton, from that part of the said parish of Walton-on-the Hill which has hitherto been called or known as the Conventional Ecclesiastical District of Saint George Everton as aforesaid, and continuing thence still southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts (thereby continuing to follow the course of Netherfield-road North aforesaid) to the first-described point at the junction of the last-named road with Netherfield-road South and with the road called or known as George's Hill as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows; viz.:—

In Moulton churchyard, in the county of Northampton, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Ipstones, in the county of Stafford, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Woodstone, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Trefonen, in the county of Salop, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Newlyn East, in the county of Cornwall, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Welwyn, in the county of Herts, to the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the churchyard of the parish of Epworth, in the county of Lincoln, to the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the churchyard of the parish of Barrow, in the county of Suffolk, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Owston, to the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the parish churchyard of Headington, Oxfordshire, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

In the churchyard of the parish of Cockfield, in the county of Durham, to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty one. *C. L. Peel.*

KILKENNIN.—Forthwith, and entirely in the church of Kilkennin, in the county of Cardigan, and also in the churchyard thereof except as follows: (a) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented: (b) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz.: widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth: (c) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they have been allotted, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

LLANBADARN-TREVEGLWYS.—Forthwith, and entirely in the church of Llanbadarn-Tre-veglwys, in the county of Cardigan; and also in the churchyard thereof, except as follows:—(a) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz.: widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth: (b) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they have been allotted, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

HAWKESBURY.—Forthwith, and entirely in the parish church of Hawkesbury, in the county of Gloucester, and also in the churchyard thereof, except as follows:—In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

TYLDESLEY-CUM-SHAKERLEY.—Forthwith, and entirely in St. George's Church and the Lady Huntingdon and Wesleyan Chapels in the parish of Tyldesley in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard and the chapel-yards, except as follows:—(a) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the above-named burial grounds, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented: (b) In such earthen graves now existing in the above-named burial grounds, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz.:—widows, widowers, parents and unmarried children, as can be buried at or below that depth: (c) In such reserved grave spaces (as have never before been buried in, and when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many

members of the families to whom they have been allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

HERNE.—Forthwith, and entirely in the church of Herne, in the county of Kent; and also in the churchyard thereof, except as follows:—

(a) In such vaults and walled graves, as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented: (b) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth.

FIFEHEAD-NEVILLE.—Forthwith, and entirely in the parish church and churchyard of Fifehead-Neville, in the county of Dorset.

ST. AUSTELL.—Forthwith, and entirely in the parish church and churchyard of St. Austell, in the county of Cornwall.

HURLEY.—Forthwith, and entirely in the parish church of Hurley, in the county of Berks; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:

(a) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(2.) The parishes of Crick, and Yelvertoft, in the county of Northampton.

(3.) The parish of Stanford, in the petty sessional division of Daventry, in the county of Northampton.

Oxfordshire.—(1.) So much of the Bullington petty sessional division, in the county of Oxford, as is bounded on the west by the Oxford and Henley main-road, and on the south by the high-road leading from the Golden Ball to Chislehampton, and on the east by the high-road leading from Chislehampton to Temple Cowley, and on the north by the high-road leading from Temple Cowley through Church Cowley to the junction of that road with the Oxford and Henley main-road near Rose Hill.

to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, and all regulations and conditions as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post, now in force and applicable thereto, shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to the Republic of Guatemala to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, in the same way as if the Republic of Guatemala had been named in such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, or the schedules thereunder written.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, 1881.

Warwickshire to wit.

AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Warwick, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 28th day of June, in the year of our Lord 1881.

Whereas, by a Final Order made at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden

at Warwick, in and for the said county, on the 30th day of June, 1863, it was directed that, under the provisions of the Statute 25 and 26 Vict., c. 61, the following parishes and hamlets, that is to say, Alveston, Fulbrook, Hampton Lucy, Loxley, Snitterfield, Wolverton, Aston Cantlow, Atherstone-on-Stour, Bickmarsh,

Billesley, Binton, Easington and Fulready, Grafton, Luddington, Drayton, Witchurch with Bruton, Crimscoate and Wimpstone, in the county of Warwick, and Alderminster, in the county of Worcester, be constituted a Highway District to be called the "Stratford-upon-Avon Highway District;" and whereas, by an Act passed in the 42nd and 43rd years of the reign of Her present Majesty, called the "Stratford-upon-Avon Borough Act, 1879," it was enacted from and after the 25th day of March, 1880, such part of the district of the Local Board of Health of Stratford-upon-Avon as was not thereby included in the extended borough, should form part of the district of the Highway Board of Stratford-upon-Avon.
