1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The following area (namely),—the borough of Beverley, in the East Riding of the county of York,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

(PORT OF ARDROSSAN.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Ardrossan, in the county of Ayr, as a foreign animals quarantine station:

All that space situate at the south-east quay of the Ardrossan Wet Dock, in the parish of New Ardrossan, in the county of Ayr, included within a line commencing at a point at the edge of the quay wall of the said Dock about one hundred and sixty-eight feet west of the east corner of the said Dock, thence at a right angle in a southerly direction for about fifty-two feet, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction for a distance of about twenty-one feet, thence at a right angle in a northerly direction for a distance of about fifty-two feet, thence along the edge of the quay wall of the said Dock in an easterly direction for a distance of about twenty-one feet

to the point aforesaid situate one hundred and sixty-eight feet west of the east corner of the said Dock.

SCOTLAND (MOVEMENT OF ANIMALS)
No. 5 ORDER OF 1881, AMENDMENT.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 11th day of August, 1881.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Preliminary.

1. This Order may be cited as **THE SCOTLAND (MOVEMENT OF ANIMALS) No. 5 ORDER OF 1881, AMENDMENT.**

2. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the twentieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.

3. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order.

Movement from Northumberland or Cumberland or Berwick-upon-Tweed.

4. Notwithstanding anything in Article 4 of The Scotland (Movement of Animals) No. 5 Order of 1881, animals may be moved by land from a farm or premises in the District of the Local Authorities of the counties of Northumberland or Cumberland or the borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed, not in a place or area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, to a farm or premises in Scotland, with a licence of the Local Authority of the district in Scotland into which the animals are to be moved, which licence shall not be granted until satisfactory evidence has been adduced to that Local Authority that the animals to be moved—

(i.) either have been bred on the farm or premises from which they are to be moved,

or have been pastured or fed thereon for a period of at least one month: and

- (ii.) have not been exposed in any market, fair, exhibition, or public sale in England or Wales: and
- (iii.) are not affected with foot-and-mouth disease, and have not been in contact with animals affected with or suspected of that disease.

Offences.

5. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person or company moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been so moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(PORT OF FALMOUTH.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 12th day of August, 1881.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Falmouth, in the county of Cornwall, as a foreign animals wharf:

All that piece of land within the borough of Penryn, in the county of Cornwall, situate between Commercial-road and the Penryn River, and included within a line commencing at a point on the southern end of the said river, and extending from the edge of the said river for a distance of one hundred and twenty feet six inches in a south-westerly direction bounded partly by a wooden fence and partly by a stone wall, thence in a north-westerly direction along the said Commercial-road for a distance of sixty-nine feet six inches bounded by the wall and door of the newly erected sheds, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of one hundred and two feet to the water's edge bounded by a stone wall separating the said piece of land from the newly erected quay of Mr. James Mead, and thence in a south-easterly direction for a distance of seventy feet six inches along the quay wall to the point first above-mentioned, all which space is edged pink on the plan of the said foreign animals wharf deposited for the purposes of this Order at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Penryn.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All Treasury Warrants at any time heretofore made relating to the conveyance by post of postal packets (which term in this Warrant means and includes all letters, post-cards, newspapers, packets of commercial papers, packets of printed papers, and pattern or sample packets), between the United Kingdom and the West Indian Colonies of Barbadoes and St. Vincent (of the Windward Islands), and also between any British Colony or Foreign Country and the West Indian Colonies of Barbadoes and St. Vincent (of the Windward Islands), are hereby annulled to the extent to which such Warrants respectively relate to the several matters aforesaid.

2. The rates of postage and additional sum for registration now chargeable and payable by the authority of the Treasury Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, or the schedules thereunder written on postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to Jamaica, to or from any other country or place, and all regulations and conditions as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post now in force and applicable thereto shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to the West Indian Colonies of Barbadoes and St. Vincent (of the Windward Islands), to or from any other country or place, in the same way as if the West Indian Colonies of Barbadoes and St. Vincent (of the Windward Islands) had been named in such before-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, or the schedules thereunder written.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of September, 1881.
