OFFICE OF THE CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY.

Order of the Lord Chancellor under the "Great Seal (Offices) Act, 1874."

WHEREAS it is provided by the Great Seal Act, 1880, that after the commencement of that Act, every Warrant for the passing of Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, which is required by the Great Seal Act, 1851, to be prepared by Her Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor-General for the time being, or one of them, shall be prepared by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and whereas it is provided by the Great Seal (Offices) Act, 1874, that the Lord Chancellor, with the concurrence of the Treasury, may, from time to time by order, appoint, increase, reduce, add to, or abolish the fees to be taken in the office of or by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, or by any of his officers, now I, the Right Honourable Roundell, Baron Selborne, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, by virtue and in exercise of the powers for this purpose given to me by the 9th section of the last-mentioned Act, do hereby direct that, in addition to all other fees now payable to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery there shall be payable to him, on and after the 1st of September, 1881, the fees set forth in the Schedule annexed to this Order, in lieu of the fees heretofore payable to the Clerk of the Patents to the Attorney and

Solicitor-General in respect of Warrants for Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal. Given under my hand this 8th day of August, 1881.

Notice under the "Public Offices Fees Act, 1866."

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction, consisting of certain yearly inappropriate tithes commutation rent-charges, amounting together to one hundred and forty pounds, which have been permanently secured to the vicarage of Stapleton, in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, grant to the Incumbent of the said vicarage of Stapleton and to his successors,
